

UCLA — As a true freshman last season, Afflalo (A-fla-lo) was one of two players, joining freshman teammate Jordan Farmar, to start every game (29) . . . Named UCLA's Outstanding Defensive Player, Afflalo averaged 10.8 points (No. 3 on the team/No. 9 on the all-time Bruin freshman list) and led UCLA in three-point shooting (.386, 39-101) . . . Scored a season-high 22 points, with a season-high tying nine rebounds, vs. USC in Pauley Pavilion. . . A Pac-10 All-Freshman Team selection, Afflalo shared the Seymour Armond Memorial Award as the team's Most Valuable Freshman with Farmar and Josh Shipp . . . In 2003-04 as a senior at Compton Centennial HS, Afflalo led the Apaches to the school's first-ever Div. III CA State title and was a starter in the McDonald's All-American game.

2004-05 — In 29 starts, Afflalo averaged 31.3 minutes (No. 3 on the team), 10.8 points (No. 3/T-No. 9 on the all-time Bruin freshman chart), 3.3 rebounds and 2.17 assists (No. 3) and shot .442 (106-240) from the field, .386 (No. 1, 39-101) from three-point range and .708 (63-89) from the foul line . . . He scored in double figures in five of the last six games and 18 overall (10 OSU, 11 Ore, 12 OSU, 17 at ND, season-high 22 USC, 14 at Cal, 13 Ariz, 10 Cal, 13 Ariz, 17 ASU, 10 Wash, 12 at OSU, 16 Mich. St., 11 Pepp, 11 BC, 21 LBS, 14 UCI, 13 WIU) and led the Bruins in scoring four times (17 at ND, 22 USC, 14 UCI, 13 WIU), including two of the final six contests . . . In the last five games before the NCAA Tournament, he scored 72 points (14.4 average) and added 34 rebounds (6.8) and 11 assists (2.2) while making 23 of 41 (.561) shots from the floor, 10 of 19 (.526) from three-point range and 16 of 21 (.762) from the free throw line. He led the Bruins in scoring against both USC and Notre Dame and was named the Rivals.com Freshman of the Week for his efforts . . . **Afflalo's highlight games included** - vs. **Chicago State**, in his first collegiate start, Afflalo played 34 minutes, with five points, three rebounds and assists and one steal and limited opposing guard Terren Wilson to just two points . . . Vs. **Western Illinois**, he played 24 minutes, with a game-high tying 13 points (5-10, 2-7, 1-2) and two rebounds . . . Vs. **UC Irvine**, Afflalo played 31 minutes, with a team-high tying 14 points (4-9, 1-3, 5-6), four rebounds, two assists and one steal (with freshman backcourt teammate Jordan Farmar, for the week of Nov. 29, named a Dick Vitale Co-Diaper Dandy of the Week) . . . In 36 minutes vs. **Long Beach State**, Afflalo missed only one shot and scored 21 points (7-7, 3-3, 4-5), with five rebounds, a season-high six assists and one steal . . . Vs. **Boston College**, Afflalo played 30 minutes, with 11 points (4-10, 1-5, 2-4), three rebounds, three assists and two steals . . . Vs. **Pepperdine**, he played 33 minutes, with 11 points (4-11, 0-4, 3-3), one rebound and two assists . . . In 34 minutes vs. **Michigan**, Afflalo had nine points, five rebounds and two assists . . . Vs. **Michigan State**, in 38 minutes, he scored 16 points (6-11, a season-best 4-5, 0-2), with five rebounds, two assists and one steal . . . At **Oregon State**, Afflalo in 27 minutes scored three points, with one rebound, a season-high tying six assists and a season-high one blocked shot, before fouling out . . . In 30 minutes at **Oregon**, Afflalo scored 12 points (4-9, 1-1, 3-4), with four rebounds, three assists and one steal . . . In 30 minutes vs. **Washington State**, he had three points, two rebounds and one assist . . . In 30 minutes vs. **Washington**, he contributed 10 points, two assists and one rebound . . . At **Arizona St.**, he had 17 points (7-12, 1-4, 2-2) and four assists in 30 minutes . . . At **Arizona**, he contributed 13 points (4-11, 3-5, 2-2), two rebounds and two assists in 31 minutes . . . His three-pointer with 18 seconds remaining tied the game at 73-all . . . In 35 minutes against **Stanford**, he had nine points, two rebounds, one assist and one steal . . . Against **California**, he had 10 points (he hit three straight three-pointers to end the game), one rebound and one steal in 29 minutes . . . In the win at **USC**, he had nine points - all in the second half, two rebounds, one assist and one steal in 28 points . . . He hit three three-pointers in a 1:34-span to give UCLA a 62-57 lead with 7:18 remaining . . . At **Washington State**, he played a career-high 39 minutes and had four points, one rebound, one assist and one block . . . At **Washington**, he had five points, five rebounds, two assists, one steal and one block in 31 minutes . . . In 30 minutes against **Arizona State**, he had eight points, three assists and one rebound . . . In 26 minutes vs. **Arizona**, he had 13 points, one rebound, one assist and one steal . . . At **California**, he had 14 points (4-6, 6-9), five rebounds, one assist and one steal in 33 minutes . . . At **Stanford**, he had five points, seven rebounds and three assists in 27 minutes. . . In the win over **USC**, he had career highs of 22 points (7-8, 2-3, 6-9) and nine rebounds and added two assists and one steal in 23 minutes while doing a fine defensive job on Gabriel Pruitt . . . In the win at **Notre Dame**, he led the Bruins with 17 points (4-5, 3-3, 6-8) and added four rebounds, three assists, three steals and one block, while hounding Chris Thomas into a 4-17

shooting day ... He was named the Rivals.com Freshman of the Week for his efforts vs. USC and ND ... Against **Oregon State**, he contributed 12 points, including a three-pointer with 1:42 remaining, that gave the Bruins the lead for good, a career high-tying nine rebounds and three assists in 36 minutes ... In 37 minutes against **Oregon**, he had 11 points, four rebounds, one assist and one steal ... Vs. **Oregon State** in the Pac-10 Tournament, he had 10 points, eight rebounds, two assists and one block in 33 minutes ... Against **Texas Tech** in the NCAA Tournament, he had seven points and one assist in 31 minutes.

HONORS — Afflalo was selected by Rivals.com as an Honorable Mention Freshman All-American and named to the Pac-10 Conference All-Freshman team ... At mid season, he was named with Jordan Farmer as one of five top national Diaper Dandy Duos by ESPN's Dick Vitale ... At the Bruins' annual end-of-the-season awards dinner banquet, Afflalo was given the Seymour Armond Memorial Award (most valuable freshman/with Jordan Farmer and Josh Shipp) and the Irv Pohlmeyer Memorial Award (outstanding defensive player) ... His preseason honors included - *Athlon* No. 54 incoming freshman in the U. S., *Basketball News* No. 25 incoming freshman in the U. S.

HIGH SCHOOL— In 2004 under coach Rod Palmer, a UCLA letterman from 1986-87 who ended his college career at UC Irvine, Afflalo led the Apaches to the school's first-ever Div. III CA State title, scoring 24 points, with five rebounds, in a 60-36 win over Oakland Bishop O'Dowd ... As a senior he averaged 23.0 points, 5.4 rebounds and 5.4 assists and led Compton Centennial to a 32-3 overall record (entered the CA State Championships ranked No. 23 in the nation by *USA Today*) ... A starter in the 2004 McDonald's All-American game (as a starter, he played 17 minutes, with three points, four rebounds and one assist and steal), Afflalo was also selected to the EA Sports Roundball Classic ... A third-team *Parade Magazine* All-American

and *USA Today* Super 25 selection, Afflalo was named *CalHi Sports* All-State, CIF SS Div. IIIA co-Player of the Year and to the *Los Angeles Times* All-Star Boys Basketball Team ... Entering his senior season, his summer honors included - PrepWestHoops No. 1 shooting guard in the West/No. 7 Player in the U. S., *Basketball News* No. 4 shooting guard in the U. S./No. 23 Player in the U. S. and HoopScoop No. 5 second guard in the U. S.

2003 — During the summer, competed at the 6th annual USA Basketball Youth Development Festival at the U. S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, CO (Afflalo started two of five games and helped lead the West to a bronze medal, he averaged 15.4 points, 3.8 rebounds and 3.6 assists) ... As a junior, Afflalo averaged 26.2 points (he scored 30 or more points on seven occasions, including 42 points vs. Carson at the one-day Pangos Dream Tournament in Pauley Pavilion in January), 5.4 rebounds and 5.0 assists ... Led Centennial to a 19-11 overall record, to the CIF SS Div. III-A title game, the Div. III regional semifinals and a share of the Bay League title ... Wooden Award Div. III Player of the Year, All-State *Cal-Hi Sports*, the CIF-SS Div. III-A co-Player of the Year and the *Long Beach Press-Telegram* Dream Team Player of the Year.



UCLA — On Nov. 4, Bozeman suffered a right knee injury (ACL) in practice and on Nov. 10, he had season-ending surgery and redshirted the 2004-05 campaign . . . He was UCLA's starting point guard his first three years . . . In 2003-04, the only Bruin to start every game (28), Bozeman led the Pac-10 in assists (5.54) and led the Bruins in minutes (33.7) . . . Needs 61 assists (315) to break into the Bruin career Top 10 . . . Injuries slowed his first two years - in 2002-03, Bozeman missed the final eight games with a right shoulder injury (had surgery to correct a stability problem on March 25, 2003) and as a true freshman in 2001-02, he missed seven early season games and four additional starts because of a right knee cartilage tear that required surgery . . . Before the sophomore shoulder injury, Bozeman started 17 of 21 games and as a freshman, he started 17 of the last 18 games and earned Honorable Mention All-Pac-10 Freshman team . . . One of the top high school players in the nation in 2000-01, Bozeman committed to the Bruins on Nov. 8, 2000 . . . A 2001 McDonald's All-American.

2003-04 — In 28 games (all starts, he was the only Bruin to start every game), he averaged 7.5 points (No. 5 on the squad), a team-high 5.54 assists (led the Pac-10) and 3.8 rebounds (No. 5) in a team-high 33.7 minutes . . . In his final 18 games, he passed for 105 assists (5.83) and had at least seven in six of those 18 games . . . In Pac-10 play, he averaged a league-best 5.72 assists and his assist/turnover ratio of 2.29 ranked No. 2 in the league . . . In addition, he shot .675 from the free throw line in league games. . . **Bozeman's highlight games include** - Vs. **UC Riverside**, had a career-high tying 17 points, seven assists, six rebounds and one steal in 38 minutes. . . Against **Loyola Marymount**, Bozeman's three-point basket with two seconds remaining gave UCLA the 69-66 victory. . . In the win over LMU, he played 39 minutes and had his first career double-double (team-high 16 points/career-high 10 rebounds) and two assists. . . At **California** and **USC**, Bozeman had a career-high 10 assists.

HONORS — At the Bruins' end-of-the-year banquet, Bozeman was given the Bruin Hoopsters J. D. Morgan Memorial Award (Outstanding Team Play).

2002-03 — In his 21 games (17 starts), Bozeman averaged 26.0 minutes (third on team), 7.3 points (No. 6 on the team), 3.0 rebounds, 3.2 assists (second) and 0.8 steals while shooting 40.8 from the floor, 31.3 from three-point range and 51.4 from the line . . . He scored in double figures seven times, including three of his last six games, and led the Bruins in assists on 10 occasions and in steals on four occasions . . . In his last 12 games, he made 37 of 83 field goal attempts (44.6) . . . He averaged 8.5 points (51), 3.2 rebounds (19) and 3.2 assists (19) in his final six games . . . At Georgetown (Feb. 8), Bozeman scored 10 points and made two free throws with 4.9 seconds to give the Bruins a 71-70 victory, ending UCLA's nine-game losing streak . . . In UCLA's 96-91 overtime loss to Oregon in Pauley (Jan. 30), Bozeman played a career-high tying 40 minutes and scored a career-best 17 points, with five rebounds and assists, a career-high tying two steals and just two turnovers . . . Bozeman missed the final eight games and had right shoulder surgery on March 25 (Bozeman strained his right shoulder on Feb. 5 at USC and aggravated the injury at Arizona State on Feb. 15 - based on symptoms, examinations and medical testing, Bozeman was diagnosed with instability in his right shoulder).

HONORS - Preseason honors included - Athlon No. 2 Top 10 Emerging Star in the U. S. and Lindy's third-team All-Pac-10.

2001-02 — In 26 games (21 starts), Bozeman averaged 23.4 minutes (No. 5 on the team), 4.0 points, 2.5 rebounds and a team-best 3.54 assists, while shooting 41.3 from the field . . . His assist-to-turnover ratio was 1.39 (1.74 in Pac-10 league play to rank fourth) and in his last 13 games, he passed for 49 assists while committing 27 turnovers (1.81 ratio) . . . In a three-game span in late February (Arizona State, at California, at Stanford), he scored 24 points (13 vs. ASU and 11 at Stanford), averaging 8.0 points and 3.7 assists while shooting 71.4 (10-14) from the floor, 100.0 (2-2) from three-point range and 66.7 (2-3) from the line . . . His right knee injury kept him out of the Georgetown, Columbia, at WSU and Washington, UC Irvine, Alabama at The Wooden Classic and UC Riverside games . . . On Dec. 3, Bruin team physician Dr. Gerald Finerman repaired the injury in a successful one-half hour arthroscopic procedure at the UCLA

Medical Center ... A right knee MRI on Nov. 29 revealed a tear in the lateral meniscus.

MAUI — Bozeman started all three games (the last time UCLA started a freshman point guard was in 1997-98, when Baron Davis started at the point and Earl Watson at the No. 2 spot), averaging 26.0 minutes, 5.7 points, 1.7 rebounds and a team-leading 3.0 assists and shooting 58.3 from the field, 33.3 (1-3) from three-point range and 66.7 (2-3) from the foul line ... His highlight game was vs. Houston, playing 31 minutes, with a then-career-high 13 points, two rebounds and four assists.

NCAA — In the "Sweet 16" contest vs. Missouri, Bozeman played 28 minutes with eight points, three rebounds and two assists ... In a then-career-high 39 minutes vs. No. 1 seed Cincinnati in a second round contest, he had eight points, a then-career-high five rebounds (including a career-best four offensive rebounds), four assists and no turnovers ... In 16 minutes vs. Mississippi, had a team-high five assists, with one steal and one rebound ... Against Cincinnati and Missouri, Bozeman averaged 33.5 minutes, 8.0 points, 4.0 rebounds, 3.0 assists and just 1.5 turnovers while making eight of 20 shots (40.0).

HONORS — At UCLA's season-ending awards/dinner banquet, Bozeman shared the Seymour Armond Memorial Award (Most Valuable Freshman) with Dijon Thompson and Andre Patterson ... Preseason honors included — Athlon No. 28 Top College Freshman; *Basketball News* No. 20 final high school ranking; *Street & Smith's* All-West Incoming Freshman.

HIGH SCHOOL — Participated in the McDonald's All-American Game on March 28, 2001 in Durham, NC, the nation's top showcase of prep talent ... Bozeman scored eight points in 14 minutes as his West team defeated the East 137-125 ... Led Mater

Dei High School, under coach Gary McKnight, to a 33-2 record and the CIF Div. I State title in 2001 ... Averaged 19.5 points, 5.7 rebounds, and 5.1 assists per contest in senior season ... *Parade Magazine* third-team All-American ... First-team All-State ... CIF Division 1A co-Player of the Year ... *Orange County Register* Player of the Year ... *Los Angeles Times*' Orange County Player of the Year ... 2001 Wooden Award High School Player of the Year for CIF Div. I ... Entering his senior season, Bozeman was rated the 10th-best high school player in America by Hoop Scoop, a rating he maintained at the end of his prep career ... Was ranked No. 9 among all prep shooting guards by *The Sporting News* ... As a junior in 1999-00, Bozeman helped lead Mater Dei to the CIF Southern Section Div. 1A title ... He averaged 11.5 points, 5.6 rebounds, 3.6 assists and 1.2 steals and shot 50.5 from the field, 35.4 (17-48) from three-point range and 69.5 from the foul line ... At the end of his junior prep campaign, Bozeman earned *USA Today* honorable mention All-America.
