Mustafa Abdul-Hamid made only appearances with no starts and played just two minutes on the season before tearing a ligament in his right wrist ... had surgery to repair the injury on Dec. 23, 2008 and never returned, clearing the way for a medical hardship ... for the year, he missed his only two shots from the field (one from three-point range) while recording an assist in one minute in the win over FIU (Nov. 29) ... received the UCLA Faculty Athletic Representative Award for academic achievement and team contribution at the team's annual postseason banquet.

Nikola Dragović played in 34 of the 35 games, starting the last 21 at forward ... missed the seasonopener vs. Prairie View A&M (Nov. 12) due to a team suspension ... won the Bruin Bench Award, presented for the most improvement in all-around play and mental attitude (from the previous year), at the team's postseason banquet made at least one three-pointer in 18 consecutive games (longest streak of his career), but it was snapped in the Pac-10 Tournament quarterfinal win over Washington State (Mar. 12) ... after being elevated to the starting lineup, Dragović shot 43.8 percent (49-for-112) from three-point range, which was better than what he was shooting when coming off the bench (.244, 11-for-45) ... additionally, he averaged 5.8 points per game when coming off the bench and averaged 11.6 points per game as a starter (244 points in 21 games) ... in Pac-10 play, he ranked 6th in league games in threepointers made (2.4 per game), 8th in three-point field goal percentage (.440, 44-for-100), 10th in defensive rebounds per game (3.7 drpg) and 17th in rebounding (4.4 rpg) ... he ranked 18th in the Pac-10 in all games played in rebounds (4.3 rpg) and 10th in three-point field goals made per game (1.8) ... registered a career-high 23 points with a career-best four steals in a home loss to Washington State (Feb. 21) ... also shot 8-for-12 from the field, 5-for-8 from three-point range and added three rebounds, two assists and a block against the Cougars ... scored a then-career-high 20 points (6-for-10 from three-point territory) in the win at Washington State (Jan. 22), sinking a career-best six three-pointers (all in the first half) ... helped the Bruins to a 64-60 win at USC (Jan. 11) in his first career start with 14 points and four rebounds ... also had 15 points and three assists in his second start in a blowout win over Arizona (Jan. 15) ... registered 15 points and eight rebounds to go along with two assists and one steal in the home win over Washington (Feb. 19) ... had 12 points, seven rebounds and two assists in the win at California (Feb. 28) ... had 13 points, eight rebounds, three blocks, two assists and one steal in the win over Oregon State (Mar. 5) ... had 10 points, four rebounds, three assists and a career-high four blocks in the win over Oregon (Mar. 7) ... in the blowout home win over Notre Dame (Feb. 7), he scored 10 points, grabbed a then-career-high six rebounds and had a huge block of a dunk attempt by 2008 Big East Player of the Year, Luke Harangody ... had the first doubledouble of his career with 10 points and a career high 13 rebounds in the win over VCU (Mar. 19) in the first round of the NCAA Tournament ... ended the season scoring in double figures in 10 straight games, a personal-best streak.
