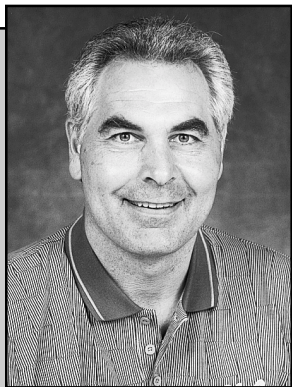

INTERIM HEAD COACH

ASST. DIRECTOR OF ACADEMIC SERVICES

(TWENTY-FIRST SEASON)

UCLA '75

Ed Kezirian, who will serve as UCLA's interim head coach for the SEGA Sports Las Vegas Bowl, is in his 21st year as a member of the Bruin program and his 10th in his current capacity as an Assistant Director of Academic Services. He is responsible for implementing academic services for football team members and tracking the academic progress of the student-athletes. In addition, he is also responsible for interacting with other departments within the athletic administration in the area of student services for the football team.

He previously served as a member of the Bruin football coaching staff for 11 seasons (1982-1992) under then head coach Terry Donahue. During his first seven seasons, he tutored the tackles and tight ends and then in 1989, he worked with the centers and guards. His last three seasons, he was in charge of the entire offensive line.

Throughout his coaching career, "Coach K" worked with many of the top Bruin linemen, including future professional performers Irv Eatman, Duval Love, Robert Cox, David Richards, Frank Cornish, Vaughn Parker, Craig Novitsky, Mike Flanagan and Jonathan Ogden.

Kezirian's expertise as a standout Bruin lineman in the early 70's continued in his years as a coach. In 1973, he started on an offensive line for coach Pepper Rodgers that opened holes for a powerful Wishbone-T attack that set single-season records for rushing yardage (4,403), total offense per game (470.6),

average yards rushing (400.3) per game, points in a season (470) and a single-game rushing best of 621 yards versus Stanford.

Prior to coming to UCLA, Kezirian lettered in football at Central Union High School in Fresno. He also spent two seasons at Reedley Junior College. At UCLA, Kezirian earned all-conference honors and the Bruins' Kenneth Washington Award for the outstanding senior offensive player. Ed then went on to a professional career. He was drafted by the Cincinnati Bengals, but decided to play instead with the Southern California Sun of the World Football League. In 1976, Ed returned to Westwood. His responsibilities included coaching the offensive and defensive lines and the scout team players.

In 1978, he was hired by University of Hawaii head coach Dick Tomey, a former Bruin assistant coach. The next four years were spent coaching the Rainbow tight ends, tackles and special teams players. In 1981, he served as coach of the entire offensive line as well as special teams.

ASSISTANT COACHES

Kelly Skipper (Fresno State '89)-Offensive Coordinator/ Running Backs

Kelly Skipper is in his fifth year as a Bruin coach and second as offensive coordinator, having been promoted to coordinator in February of 2001. In his three previous seasons, he tutored the Bruin running backs. In 1998, DeShaun Foster set school rushing and scoring records for true freshmen and Jermaine Lewis scored 13 touchdowns. In 2000, Foster was named first-team All-Pac-10 after rushing for 1,037 yards and scoring 12 touchdowns. Last season, Foster was in Heisman Trophy contention at mid-season and earned All-Pac-10 and second-team All-America acclaim by rushing for 1,109 yards in just eight games. Prior to coming to UCLA, Skipper served the previous nine years on the coaching staff at Fresno State. Skipper spent seven years (1991-97) coaching the running backs and return specialist at his alma mater. Prior to that, he spent two seasons (1989-90) as a graduate assistant coach at Fresno State. In 1997, FSU tailback Michael Pittman rushed for 1,057 yards and ranked second in the Western Athletic Conference and 26th nationally with his average of 96.1 yards per game. Three times during Skipper's seven years, FSU ranked among the nation's Top 20 in rushing yards per game, including No. 3 in 1991 and No. 16 in 1992. Fresno State won four league titles during his stay- The Big West Championship in 1989 and 1990 and the WAC championship in 1992 and 1993. Skipper was a four-year letterman at Fresno State, earning AP honorable mention All-America acclaim and first team All-Big West honors at running back as a senior in 1988. The Bulldogs were 36-9-1 during his playing career and he still ranks fifth on the school's career rushing list with 2,237 yards and 28 touchdowns.

Gary Bernardi (Cal State Northridge '76)-Tight Ends, Offensive Line, Recruiting

Gary Bernardi who has been an assistant coach in the Pacific-10 Conference since 1980, is in his ninth season as a member of the UCLA staff, his seventh under Bob Toledo. He is in charge of the tight ends, works with the offensive line and also oversees UCLA's recruiting efforts. Last Spring, UCLA put together another Top 10 recruiting class after ranking in the Top Five in 1999 and No. 1 in 1998. Last season, tight end Bryan Fletcher earned second-team All-Pac-10 honors, and in 1998, tight end Mike Grieb was selected first-team All-Pac-10. He coached at USC for six seasons (1987-92) and was in charge of the tight ends and offensive tackles, as well as serving as coordinator of the Trojan special teams. He tutored several All-Americans and two NFL first-round draft choices during his tenure. In 1993, he was head coach at Burroughs High in Burbank. Bernardi began his collegiate coaching career in 1980 as a part-time coach (tight ends) and administrative assistant to Larry Smith at Arizona. After working as an administrative assistant the following season, he coached tight ends from 1982-84, wide receivers in 1985 and tight ends in 1986. He also served as the Wildcats' recruiting coordinator.

Ron Caragher (UCLA '90)-Wide Receivers

Ron Caragher is in his seventh season as full-time assistant coach in charge of the wide receivers after serving as a graduate assistant coach for offense during the previous two years (1994-95). He has helped develop a number of record-setting receivers, including Freddie Mitchell, Danny Farmer, Brian Poli-Dixon and Jim McElroy. Last year, he tutored a group of young receivers, including Tab Perry, Craig Bragg and Ryan Smith. In 2000, Mitchell set a school record with 1,494 receiving yards and earned first-team All-Pac-10 honors. Mitchell also finished second in the nation in receiving yards per game with a 119.5 mark. The Morgan Hill, CA native was a four-year letter winner and served as backup to former Dallas Cowboy quarterback Troy Aikman in the 1987-88 seasons. He completed four of seven passes, including a touchdown, and ran eight times for 29 yards. During those two seasons, the Bruins posted a record of 20-4 and earned post-season victories in the Aloha ('87) and Cotton Bowls ('89). The Cotton Bowl win set an NCAA record for bowl victories in consecutive years (seven). Ron was also a member of teams which won the Rose ('86) and Freedom Bowls ('86).

John Pearce (East Texas State '70)-Quarterbacks

John Pearce is in his fourth season as a member of the Bruin staff. He is in his second year tutoring the quarterbacks after serving as coach of the defensive end position in 1998 and 1999. Prior to joining the Bruin staff, he spent seven years as the head coach at Stephen F. Austin State University, where he compiled a record of 46-32-2. He produced winning seasons in five of his seven years, including 1995, when the Lumberjacks were ranked No. 4 in Division I-AA, compiled a record of 11-2 and reached the semifinals of the NCAA playoffs. SFA was also 8-3 in 1997, 8-4 in 1993, 7-4 in 1996 and 6-3-2 in 1994. Between 1993 and 1997, SFA compiled a record of 40-16-2, was the only Division IA or I-AA school in the state of Texas to have a winning record in each of those five seasons and reached the NCAA I-AA playoffs twice. Two of his quarterbacks at S.F. Austin were on NFL rosters in 2001 (James Ritchey and Mike Quinn). Prior to becoming head coach at SFA, Pearce spent three seasons (1989-91) as an assistant coach at Texas A&M during Bob Toledo's tenure as offensive coordinator. At College Station, he tutored the running backs, tight ends and specialists. Texas A&M compiled a record of 27-8-1 in that span and was ranked in the Top 20 in each of those three years.

Mark Weber (Cal Lutheran '80)- Offensive Line

Mark Weber is in his sixth season as UCLA's offensive line coach, joining the staff in March of 1997. In 1998, tackle Kris Farris was awarded the Outland Trophy as the nation's top lineman, center Shawn Stuart was selected first-team Academic All-American and guard Andy Meyers was named first-team All-Pac-10. In his first season (1997), tackle Chad Overhauser earned first-team All-America acclaim. Last year, Mike Saffer earned second-team All-Pac-10 honors. Weber, who has been associated with some of the nation's top passing offenses, came to UCLA from UNLV, where he spent three seasons as assistant head coach and offensive line coach. UNLV ranked ninth in Division IA passing offense last year. He coached at Nevada-Reno for two years (1993 and 1993) and the Wolfpack led

the nation in passing and total offense in 1993. He has also served as defensive line coach at Missouri Western State College (1991), offensive line coach at Oregon State (1987-90), and offensive line and strength coach at West Texas State (1985-86), Eastern New Mexico University (1983-84) and Snow College (1982). As a player, he earned Small College All-America honorable mention as an offensive guard.

Phil Snow (Cal State Hayward '78)-Defensive Coordinator/Safeties

Phil Snow is in his second season at UCLA, having been hired as defensive coordinator and safeties coach in January of 2001. In his first season as the Bruin defensive coordinator, UCLA led the Pac-10 in total defense and pass efficiency defense and ranked second in scoring defense and third in rushing defense. UCLA allowed 125 total points and 80 yards per game less than in the 2000 season. Prior to coming to UCLA, Snow spent the previous seven seasons (1994-2000) as the defensive coordinator at Arizona State University. He has coached in the Pac-10 conference for the past 15 seasons, including one at UCLA, nine at Arizona State and from 1987-91 at the University of California. At Arizona State, his units ranked among the top three in scoring defense in the Pac-10 in three of his final five seasons. Snow's 1996 squad finished first in the conference in rush defense (98.0), pass defense (104.2) and total defense (306.2). In 2000, the Sun Devils ranked first nationally in fumbles recovered and third in the country in number of turnovers created. From 1983-86, the Winters, CA native served on the staff at Boise State. Snow was the defensive coordinator for the Broncos for his last four seasons in Boise. His 1986 team was ranked sixth in the nation in total defense, allowing just 269.4 yards per game. It also yielded just 80.3 yards on the ground to rank fourth nationally in that category. In his final three seasons at Boise, he served as assistant to the head coach in addition to his duties as defensive coordinator. Before arriving at Boise State, Snow spent three years at Laney Community College in Oakland, CA, where he was the secondary coach in 1979 and the co-defensive coordinator in both the 1980 and 1981 seasons.

Marc Dove (Texas Tech '73)-Linebackers

Marc Dove is in his seventh season on the Bruin staff and his fifth tutoring linebackers (inside linebackers in 1998) after coaching the secondary during his first two years in Westwood. He helped develop safety Shaun Williams, a Super Bowl starter for the New York Giants, into a first round NFL draft choice in 1997. Last season, he tutored Robert Thomas, a Butkus Award finalist who set a school record for tackles for losses, and Ryan Nece, who was a Butkus Award semifinalist. Dove joined the UCLA staff in the winter of 1996 after spending the previous four seasons as defensive coordinator at the University of Minnesota. In 1995, Dove devoted time to all of the Golden Gopher defensive positions. From 1992-94, he coached the linebackers in addition to serving as defensive coordinator. Prior to his stint at Minnesota, he worked as defensive coordinator for four years at North Carolina (1984-87) and six seasons (1978-83) at Mississippi. He began his coaching career with a two year stint (1973-74) as secondary coach at Texas Tech, his alma mater, and then coached the secondary for three seasons (1975-77) at South Carolina before moving to Mississippi.

Don Johnson (Jersey City State '76)-Defensive Line

Don Johnson is in his third season with the Bruins and his second being in charge of the entire defensive line. In his first year at UCLA, he coached the defensive tackles. Last season, end Kenyon Coleman became the first UCLA defensive lineman to win the Morris Trophy, presented to the top lineman in the Pac-10, and UCLA ranked third in the league in rushing defense. Prior to coming to UCLA in February of 2000, Johnson spent the previous five seasons (1995-99) as an assistant at Nevada. His responsibilities included coaching the defensive ends as well as handling kickoffs and punt returns for the special teams. During that time, he also did an NFL summer internship for two years with the San Francisco 49ers. Prior to moving to Nevada, he spent eight years coaching at three different colleges in southern California. In 1987, he became an assistant at Riverside Community College for two years before being hired at Nevada. Johnson played football at Jersey City (NJ) State. A linebacker, he earned a free agent tryout with the New York Jets and also spent times as a member of the USFL's New Jersey Generals. Johnson graduated from Jersey City State in 1976 with a degree in physical education. He began his coaching career at Santa Ana Valley High School, working as an assistant from 1976-1982. In 1984, he moved to his alma mater, coaching linebackers at Jersey City State for three years. He returned to Santa Ana Valley High in 1986 and moved to Riverside Community College the following year.

R. Todd Littlejohn (Fresno State '89)-Cornerbacks

R. Todd Littlejohn is in his second season as the Bruin cornerbacks coach, having been hired in February of 2001. Last season, under Littlejohn's tutelage, Ricky Manning, Jr. earned first-team All-Pac-10 honors for the second straight year and Matt Ware was selected first-team Freshman All-American. Littlejohn spent the 2000 season as a defensive backs coach at San Jose State University. He also spent a couple of months on the staff of the San Jose SaberCats of the Arena Football League. He joined the San Jose State staff after spending the 1998 and 1999 seasons at Utah State University, where he coached wide receivers. Littlejohn began his coaching career in 1990. He worked as an assistant coach in 1990 and 1991 at Bakersfield College before moving to Missouri Western State College for the 1992 and 1993 seasons. In 1994, Littlejohn was an assistant coach at Mount San Antonio College in Walnut, CA. After two seasons in private business, he became an assistant coach at DeAnza College for one season (1997) before joining the staff at Utah State. Littlejohn attended West Texas State and Fresno State and starred in two sports. At West Texas State, he earned three letters (1985-87) as a defensive back and was an honorable mention All-America selection in 1987. He also played one season of baseball as a starting outfielder for the 1988 Fresno State team that played in the College World Series. The native of Bakersfield, CA, graduated from Fresno State in 1989.

BRUINS HEAD TO THE SEGA SPORTS LAS VEGAS BOWL

GAME #13 — SEGA Sports Las Vegas Bowl

UCLA, winner of three of its last five games and 7-5 overall and 4-4 in Pac-10 play (tied for fourth place), will play New Mexico, 7-6 overall and 5-2 in the Mountain West Conference, on Dec. 25 in Sam Boyd Stadium in Las Vegas, NV. Kickoff has been set for 1:30 p.m. (PT).

The game will be nationally televised by ESPN with Mark Jones, Mike Gottfried and Bob Davie in the booth and Holly Rowe on the sidelines.

Fox Sports Radio AM 1150 and the Bruin Radio Network broadcasts all games. Chris Roberts and Matt Stevens will call the action and John Ireland will work the sidelines.

BOWLING— The Bruins have qualified to play in a bowl in five of the last six seasons. This will be UCLA's 15th bowl trip in the last 22 years. UCLA is 9-4 in its last 13 bowl game appearances. UCLA's nine bowl wins in the last 20 years rank No. 1 in the Pac-10. Only Florida State, Tennessee, Penn State, Alabama, Miami and Michigan have won more bowl games in that span.

UCLA's BOWL RECORD — UCLA enters the SEGA Sports Las Vegas Bowl with an overall record of 11-11-1 in bowl games. UCLA, the first school in NCAA history to win a bowl game in seven consecutive seasons (1982-88), has never played in the SEGA Sports Las Vegas Bowl.

LAST GAME — UCLA held a 14-7 lead in the first quarter, but Washington State returned with 24 consecutive points to defeat the Bruins, 48-27 at the Rose Bowl.

After receiving the opening kickoff, the Cougars scored on their second play from scrimmage to go up 7-0 with only 37 seconds expired. UCLA failed to move the ball on its next possession and punted after three plays. However, Ben Emanuel II intercepted a Jason Gesser pass on the next Cougar possession and returned it 41 yards for a touchdown. Still tied at 7-7, quarterback Drew Olson pitched to Jon Dubravac, who threw a 55-yard pass to Manuel White to put the Bruins ahead 14-7 with 7:33 remaining in the first quarter. The Cougars responded to tie the game at 14-14 heading into the second quarter.

Washington State scored on three of its next four possessions in the second quarter, to build a 31-14 lead with 48 seconds left in the first half. On the first play of the final UCLA possession of the half, Olson found Junior Taylor for a 39-yard touchdown pass to send the Bruins into the locker room trailing, 31-21.

In the third quarter, the Cougars struck first on a John Tippins run with 7:27 remaining in the period. UCLA matched the Washington State touchdown when Olson connected with tight end Mike Seidman for a 27-yard strike at the 3:37 mark. The Bruins entered the final quarter trailing 38-27, but it would prove to be the closest that they would come. The Cougars scored ten unanswered points in the fourth quarter, including a 25-yard interception return for a touchdown, to take home a 48-27 victory.

Offensively, UCLA gained 307 total yards, including 254 in the air. The Bruins only rushed for 79 yards and were led by Manuel White with 48 yards on eight carries. Tyler Ebell picked up ten yards on nine attempts.

Olson, a true freshman, completed 13 of 27 passes for 163 yards, but threw two interceptions. Matt Moore completed four of eight passes for 36 yards. Dubravac's 55-yard touchdown pass to White was the third of his career, — all this season (one vs. Colorado, one vs. Oregon).

Taylor (four for 86 yards) and Seidman (four for 68 yards) led the receivers. Seidman's 16-yard catch in the first quarter gave him the single season yardage record for UCLA tight ends, with 631 yards.

Defensively, UCLA allowed 541 yards -- 321 in the air and 220 on the ground. Emanuel's two interceptions brought his total to four on the year, tied for the team lead with Ricky Manning. His interception return for a touchdown was the Bruins' fourth this season, the most by UCLA since 1987.

ALL-PAC-10 CONFERENCE HONORS — Four Bruin seniors were named to the first-team All-Pacific-10 conference team: tight end Mike Seidman, offensive tackle Mike Saffer, cornerback Ricky Manning and punter Nate Fikse. Manning was selected by the coaches for the third straight year. It was the second time for Fikse.

Five Bruins were named to the second-team all-conference unit — freshman running back Tyler Ebell, sophomore offensive guard Eyoseph Efseaff, senior offensive tackle Bryce Bohlander, junior defensive lineman Dave Ball and senior linebacker Marcus Reese. Five more Bruins were named to the honorable mention all-conference squad — sophomore receiver Craig Bragg, junior linebacker Brandon Chillar, senior defensive tackle Steve Morgan, junior receiver Tab Perry and sophomore offensive guard Steven Vieira.

POST-SEASON HONORS — Mike Seidman is one of three finalists for the Mackey Award, presented annually to the nation's top tight end.

Mike Saffer has been selected second-team All-America by *The Sporting News* and *CNN.com*.

The Sporting News selected its Freshman All-America teams and four Bruins were honored. Linebacker Spencer Havner and safety Jarrad Page were named first-team Freshman All-America, while tailback Tyler Ebell and center Mike McCloskey were named second-team Freshman All-America.

In addition, *The Sporting News* selected a Pac-10 All-Freshman team and Havner was named the Defensive Freshman of the Year. Havner, Ebell, McCloskey and Page were all named to the team.

MORE HONORS — Offensive left tackle Bryce Bohlander has been selected to the Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII first team.

Bohlander has also been named to the Pacific-10 All-Academic first team. Wide receiver Jon Dubravac and cornerback Keith Short were honorable mention selections.

ALL-STAR GAMES — Cornerback Ricky Manning, Jr., offensive tackle Mike Saffer and punter/place kicker Nate Fikse have been selected to play in the East-West Shine Game.

Manning has also accepted an invitation to the Hula Bowl. Tight end Mike Seidman will play in the Senior Bowl. Defensive end Rusty Williams, offensive tackle Bryce Bohlander and cornerback Joe Hunter will play in the Paradise All-Star Game.

DID YOU KNOW?

Eight of UCLA's 12 regular-season opponents are playing in a bowl game.

Craig Bragg's eight touchdowns this season have measured 41, 33, 5, 37, 53, 71, 46 and 33 yards -- an average of 39.9 yards per play and his career touchdown average is 41.6 (42.0 on receptions).

Mike Seidman's 631 yards rank No. 1 on UCLA's tight end single-season yardage list (since 1965). He moved past Paul Bergmann's 577 yards in 1982 in the third quarter of the Washington State game. His 41 receptions are tied for No. 2 on that list. The record is Bergmann's 44 catches in 1983 and he made 41 receptions in 1982.

No Bruin has ever finished his sophomore season with more career receptions or receiving yardage than Craig Bragg (Danny Farmer had 72 receptions and 1,173 yards entering his junior year).

Placekicker Nate Fikse has connected on 10 straight field attempts after missing his first attempt of the season from 55 yards. The school mark is 22 straight by John Lee in 1984 and 1985. Lee made his last four attempts in 1984 and the first 18 kicks in 1985.

UCLA allowed just 173 yards against California. The last time the defense held an opponent to fewer yards was the 2001 Ohio State game (166). UCLA allowed the Golden Bears just 40 yards on the ground and 133 in the air.

The Bruin defense held Arizona to 12 net yards rushing, its best effort since limiting Washington to minus-eight yards rushing in 2001. Overall, UCLA held Arizona to 22 yards of total offense in the second half (23 plays).

The 75 yards passing by Stanford were the fewest by a Bruin opponent since Ohio State's 45 in 2001.

UCLA is allowing opponents to complete just 50.1% of their passes, the second best mark in the Pac-10.

UCLA's 30.0 scoring average is its highest since 1998.

This season, UCLA is 4-3 when its opponent scores first and 3-2 when it draws first blood. UCLA has been down by at least 10 points prior to scoring five times (Colorado State 0-10, Oklahoma State 0-10, Oregon State 0-14, Stanford 0-15 and USC 0-21) and is 4-1 in those games. In 2001, the Bruins were 3-1 when they scored first and 4-3 when the opponent scored first.

UCLA has outscored opponents 79-39 in the third quarter.

UCLA is 5-1 on the road and 2-4 at home in 2002. This season marks only the third time in school history that the Bruins have won five regular-season road games, doing it in 1993 and 1998.

Fifteen of UCLA's touchdowns have measured at least 30 yards -- 12 on offense plus interception returns of 42 and 33 yards by Spencer Havner and 41 yards by Ben Emanuel. The offensive scores have covered 71, 64, 55, 55, 53, 46, 41, 39, 37, 33 and 33 in the air and 49 yards on the ground.

In 12 games, UCLA's offense has produced 32 scrimmage plays of at least 30 yards -- 24 passes and eight runs. The Bruins had five plays of 30+ yards at Oregon State, four each versus Arizona, Oregon and Oklahoma State and three at San Diego State and versus USC. The longest run is 73 yards by Tyler Ebell at Oregon State and the longest pass is 71 yards from Cory Paus to Craig Bragg for a touchdown against Oregon. All four touchdowns against the Ducks measured at least 46 yards (71, 55, 53 and 46 yards).

In the same span, the Bruin offense has produced 62 scrimmage plays of at least 20 yards, including 10 versus Oklahoma State and Oregon State, seven at Arizona and Washington and six versus Oregon.

Tyler Ebell is the first freshman (true or redshirt) and only the second player in school history to rush for at least 100 yards in six consecutive games. Gaston Green is the only player in school history to rush for over 100 yards in seven straight games in one season (1986).

In the Oregon State game, Tab Perry (145) and Mike Seidman (138) became the first Bruin 100-yard pass receiving duo since Freddie Mitchell (125) and Brian Poli-Dixon (107) versus Arizona State (9/30/00). Against Oregon, Craig Bragg (230) and Tab Perry (126) had more than 100 receiving yards, giving UCLA back-to-back games with a pair of 100-yard receivers for the first time since the final two games of the 1998 season (Miami and Wisconsin).

Craig Bragg's 71-yard touchdown reception from Cory Paus was UCLA's longest pass play since the 2000 USC game, when Paus and Freddie Mitchell connected for 74 yards.

Over the last seven years, UCLA is 30-7 when it wins the turnover battle, 9-21 when it loses the turnover battle and 10-4 when the turnovers are even.

Tyler Ebell's 53-yard punt return against San Diego State was UCLA's longest since the 1998 season, when Ryan Roques returned one 77 yards for a touchdown at Washington.

Tab Perry's 49-yard kickoff return against USC was UCLA's longest since the 1999 season, when Lovell Houston returned one 93 yards for a touchdown at Stanford.

UCLA has scored three touchdowns on blocked punts in the last two years and Jibril Raymo has scored two of them. Marcus Reese blocked both last year and Matt Clark did the honors against San Diego State. Overall, UCLA has blocked five punts in the last two years, three against Cal. It has blocked three punts this year, two at Berkeley, and blocked a field goal against Washington State and Stanford.

UCLA has fumbled the ball 30 times this year and has lost 12, eight on offense. Twenty are on offense (eight lost), five are on kickoff returns (two lost), two are on interceptions (one lost) and three are on punt returns (one lost).

UCLA has won 15 of its last 25 games versus ranked opponents dating back to a 1997 win at #11 Texas and has posted a 24-9 record in regular-season games played in the Rose Bowl since that win over the Longhorns.

UCLA has won 10 of its last 11 non-conference regular-season games dating back to 1999 (following a loss at Ohio State, the Bruins have defeated Fresno State in 1999, Alabama, Fresno State and Michigan in 2000, Alabama, Kansas and Ohio State in 2001 and Colorado State, Oklahoma State and San Diego State in 2002).

In 12 games this season, 14 Bruins have made their first starts — Paul Mociler, OG; Keith Carter, TE; Marcus Reese, LB; Spencer Havner, LB; Jarrad Page, DB; Mike McCloskey, C; Ed Blanton, OT; Tyler Ebell, TB; Jibril Raymo, FS; Ryan Boschetti, DT; Mercedes Lewis, TE; Matt Moore, QB; Drew Olson, QB; Junior Taylor, WR. In addition, junior Asi Faoa made his first start at defensive end (he had one previous start at LB in 1999 vs. Boise State), WR Jon Dubravac made his first start since 2000 and true freshman defensive tackle C.J. Niusulu made his debut versus the Ducks.

Sixteen Bruins made their varsity debut versus Colorado State, including eight true freshmen J.D. Groves, Mercedes Lewis, Justin London, Glenn Ohaeri, Drew Olson, Jarrad Page, Junior Taylor, Wesley Walker; six redshirt freshmen Tyler Ebell, Jason Harrison, Spencer Havner, Wendell Mathis, Mike McCloskey and James Jessen; and two juniors Ryan Boschetti and David Tautofi.

Numerous players made their debuts at San Diego State. Redshirt freshman Ed Blanton started at right tackle for injured Mike Saffer in his first career game. Tight end Keith Carter, quarterback John Sciarra, offensive guard Robert Cleary, wide receiver Jacques Lazarus, wide receiver Brett Mitchell, offensive tackle Matt Mosebar, offensive guard Jason Nitz, wide receiver Josh Roenicke all saw the first action of their careers.

UCLA has played 10 true freshmen this season, the most since freshmen became eligible for varsity play in 1972. All 10 have played in the same game (Arizona). UCLA had eight true freshmen earn letters in 1994.

Senior cornerback Ricky Manning has become the seventh Bruin since 1964 to be named a three-time first-team all-conference player. The others — Vaughn Parker, OL 1991-92-93; Terry Tumey, DL 1985-86-87; Kenny Easley, DB 1977-78-79; Manu Tuiasosopo, DL 1976-77-78; Jerry Robinson, LB 1976-77-78; Gary Beban, QB 1965-66-67.

UCLA's nine bowl wins in the last 20 years (entering 2002) rank No. 1 (tied) in the Pac-10. Only six schools (Florida State, Tennessee, Penn State, Alabama, Miami, Michigan) have won more bowl games in that span.

During the last 20 years (1982-2001), UCLA has been ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 on 11 occasions. No other school in the Pac-10 has been ranked more than 10 times.

In the last 20 seasons (1982-2001), UCLA has more Top 10 rankings (seven) than any other Pac-10 school. In fact, only six schools (Florida State, Nebraska, Florida, Miami, Michigan, Tennessee) have been ranked in the AP Top 10 more often than UCLA during this period.

Starting Streaks — Ricky Manning has started in 44 straight games to lead the team (the record is 46 by offensive lineman Craig Novitsky, 1990-93). Next is offensive left tackle Bryce Bohlander with 37 straight starts. Offensive right tackle Mike Saffer, who has started 41 times in his career, had a streak of 26 consecutive starts end when he did not play at San Diego State due to a broken rib. Defensive tackle Rodney Leisle had a 28-game streak stopped when he did not suit up for the Oregon game due to a broken foot.

Three Bruins on the 2002 roster are the sons of former Bruin football players — TE Blane Kezirian (dad, Ed played offensive line in 1972-73 for coach Pepper Rodgers and posted a 17-5 record); WR/H Garrett Lepisto (dad, Vic played defensive end in 1964-66-67 for coaches Bill Barnes and Tommy Prothro); QB John Sciarra (dad, John played 1972-75 and quarterbacked the Bruins to a win over No. 1 Ohio State in the 1976 Rose Bowl game).

UCLA had six players selected in the 2002 NFL Draft, ranking seventh (tied) nationally among all schools in that category. (LB Robert Thomas/Rams, RB DeShaun Foster/Panthers, DB Marques Anderson/Packers, DL Kenyon Coleman/Raiders, TE Bryan Fletcher/Bears - now with Tennessee, LS Jeff Grau/Redskins). All six are currently with NFL teams, plus free agent signee LB Ryan Nece with Tampa Bay, giving UCLA seven current NFL rookies.

Offensive left tackle Bryce Bohlander, who had been nominated for a National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Post-Graduate Scholarship, has been named to the 2002 Verizon/CoSIDA District VIII Academic All-America team and the Pac-10 All-Academic team and will be nominated for an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship. He will graduate in December with a major in Political Science and a minor in Public Policy and currently owns a 3.27 grade-point average.

THE DEFENSE

#9 CB RICKY MANNING — True senior corner Ricky Manning Jr., earned first-team All-Pac-10 acclaim for the third straight season this year, in the vote of league coaches. Manning is only the seventh Bruin since 1964 to earn first-team All-League honors three times. **He has started in each of the last 44 games (longest starting streak on the team) after making his first career start against Fresno State in**

1999. The school record is 46 consecutive starts by offensive lineman Craig Novitsky (1990-93).

In the season-opening win over Colorado State, he was credited with five tackles, including four solos. His fourth-quarter tackle on Cecil Sapp after a reception caused a fumble that UCLA recovered at the Ram 16-yard line with a 14-13 lead. UCLA scored on the next play to build a 21-13 lead.

Against Oklahoma State, he tied for the team lead with eight tackles, including one for loss, and spent most of the game defending Rashaun Woods.

In the game versus Colorado, he was credited with four tackles (three solos), including one for loss, and also had one pass defended.

At San Diego State, he helped hold the nation's No. 2 passing attack to just 208 total yards. Matched up most of the day against J.R. Tolver, Manning held the nation's No. 1-ranked receiver to just three catches for 30 yards. On the afternoon, he made the 10th interception of his career and was credited with two other pass defenses and three tackles.

At Oregon State, he scored the first touchdown of his career on a 33-yard interception return to give the Bruins a 26-14 lead 4:55 into the second half. He also made three tackles.

Against Oregon, he also made three stops. At California, he was credited with one tackle and one pass defended but the Golden Bears rarely threw in his area.

Against Stanford, he helped hold the Cardinal to just 75 yards passing and made his third interception of the year to take the team lead in that area and set up a Bruin field goal.

At Washington, he was matched up much of the time against Reggie Williams and made four solo tackles, defended two passes and made his team-high fourth interception of the year on the final play of the first half to end a scoring threat.

At Arizona, he made two solo tackles. Against USC, he made five solo tackles, including one for loss (five yards). He also forced a fumble and broke up one pass. **In the Washington State game, Manning did not have a tackle, but did block a field goal attempt.**

Manning has now made 13 career interceptions, tying him for 7th place on that UCLA career list.

In 2001, he ranked second on the team with his three interceptions and totaled 36 tackles, including two for losses, to rank sixth (tied) on the team in that category.

In 2000, he ranked fifth on the team with 65 tackles. His four interceptions led the team, as did his 14 pass defenses. As a freshman in 1999, he led the Bruins with 10 tackles for loss and ranked fourth on the team with 53 tackles.

#44 LB MARCUS REESE — True senior linebacker Marcus Reese, in his first season as a starter, was named second-team All-Pac-10 this season. He made his first career start against Colorado State and was very productive, making nine tackles (seven solos), one shy of the team high for the game. Against Oklahoma State, he did not play much of the second half as a precaution (ankle) and made two solo tackles. In the game against Colorado, he led the Bruins with a career-high 13 tackles (seven solos) and was also credited with one pass defended.

In the win at San Diego State, his diving interception at the Aztec six-yard line set up UCLA's first score of the day and the fumble he forced also resulted in a Bruin touchdown drive to make the score 21-0 less than five minutes into the second quarter. On the afternoon, he made six tackles (three solos) to go with his two forced turnovers.

At Oregon State, he tied for the team lead with six tackles. He had two stops behind the line, including one for a safety late in the second quarter. He was named Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week.

Against Oregon, he led the Bruins with nine tackles (five solos), including one sack and a second for loss.

At California, he made seven tackles (six solos) to rank second (tied) on the team. He also defended two passes. On special teams, he recorded the first of UCLA's two fourth-quarter blocked punts, his third in two seasons. Against Stanford, he led the team with 12 tackles, including seven solos.

At Washington, he tied for the team lead with nine tackles. On the first play of the second quarter, he made an interception and returned it 29 yards to the one, setting up the second of Tyler Ebell's three touchdowns to give UCLA a 17-7 lead.

At Arizona, he made four tackles, including two sacks and a third for loss. Against USC, he made six tackles (three so-

los), one shy of the team lead. He made a team-best 12 tackles against Washington State, with eight solos. After 12 games, his 95 tackles (60 solos) lead the team and his 7.9 average is seventh in the Pac-10. He also ranks fifth (tied) on the team with seven tackles for losses, fourth with three sacks and fourth with two interceptions.

Despite not starting in 2000 or 2001, he made 68 tackles during those two years. Also a big contributor on special teams during his career, Reese blocked a pair of punts last season which each produced a touchdown. On the year, he ranked ninth on the squad with 34 tackles, including four for loss.

#17 CB MATT WARE — The only true freshman in the starting lineup a year ago, Ware has played both cornerback and free safety in 2002 after starting at cornerback in 2001. In the opener against Colorado State, he made four solo tackles and had one pass defensed. In the win at Oklahoma State, he made his first interception of the year in the end zone in the final minute of the first half to end a Cowboy scoring opportunity. He also made two tackles but missed most of the second half after spraining his right ankle. In the Colorado game, he ranked second on the squad with a career-high 10 tackles (four solos).

At San Diego State, he played cornerback exclusively and helped limit the nation's No. 2 passing attack to just 208 yards in the air. The Aztecs had just one completion of more than 22 yards and averaged just 5.2 yards per pass attempt. Ware ranked second on the team with seven tackles (four solos), including one sack.

At Oregon State, he again played cornerback and was credited with three tackles, including two solos, and one pass defensed. Against Oregon, he played corner and made three tackles, including one for loss, and one forced fumble.

At California, he made one tackle at the cornerback position and also recorded the second of UCLA's two fourth-quarter blocked punts. He also played one snap on offense, pitching the ball on an option play near the goal line. Against Stanford, the true sophomore made five tackles, including four solos. At Washington, he missed much of the game, including the whole second half, with a tight left hamstring and was credited with one tackle.

At Arizona, he made two solo tackles and deflected one pass. Against USC, he made six tackles (five solos), one shy of the team lead despite missing the second half with hamstring problems. He totaled four tackles in the Washington State game with two solos.

On the year, he ranks fifth on the squad with 48 tackles (32 solos) and has made one interception and one quarterback sack. He has also blocked a punt and forced one fumble.

In 2001, Ware was named first-team Freshman All-American and Pac-10 Freshman of the Year by *The Sporting News*. He earned first-team Freshman All-America accolades by the *Football Writers of America*.

Matt became the first UCLA true freshman to start every regular-season game since freshmen became eligible in 1972 (three-time All-America safety Kenny Easley started the final 10 games of his freshman season).

On the year, he made 32 tackles, led the team with five interceptions (tied for third in the Pac-10) and was second on the team with two fumble recoveries. Ware's five interceptions were the most by a Bruin since Larry Atkins made six in 1997.

He also saw action on offense, as a quarterback, in the games against Oregon and USC. He ran four times in the Oregon game for 22 yards and caught one pass for 49 yards. He took two snaps at quarterback versus USC and pitched the ball on both occasions.

He signed a baseball contract with the Seattle Mariners during the 2001 Fall football camp and played in their minor league organization this past summer as an outfielder

#11 LB BRANDON CHILLAR — True junior Brandon Chillar is enjoying a very productive 2002 season. He was named to the honorable mention All-Pac-10 conference team. In the season-opener against Colorado State, he led the Bruins with a then career-high 10 tackles (four solos) and made the second interception of his career. He also forced a fumble on the Rams' two-point conversion attempt that Ben Emanuel returned for two Bruin points and a 23-19 lead.

Against Oklahoma State, he was again all over the field and made four tackles, including one for loss, but did not return after suffering a leg cramp in the second half. In the Colorado game, he made three solo tackles, including one for loss.

The San Diego native recorded three tackles (two solos) against San Diego State and also recovered a second-quarter fumble that led to a Bruin touchdown. At Oregon State, he tied for the team lead with six tackles (five solos). He had one sack and a second tackle for loss. Against Oregon, he was third on the squad with six tackles.

At California, he recorded six tackles (five solos), including one for loss, and defensed one pass. Against Stanford, he

made 11 tackles (eight solos), one shy of the team high, and led the team with two quarterback sacks.

#41 LB SPENCER HAVNER — This talented youngster has enjoyed an outstanding first year. He has been named first-team Freshman All-America by *The Sporting News*. In addition, that publication also named him the Pac-10 Defensive Freshman of the Year and first-team Freshman all-Pac-10. He made his debut against Colorado State, starting and making five tackles (three solos), including one for loss. He was also credited with two pass defenses. In the win over Oklahoma State, he played a key role. He returned his first career interception 23 yards for the touchdown that gave UCLA a lead it would never relinquish, 14-10. He tied for the team lead with eight tackles (seven solos) and forced a fumble at the Bruin 18-yard line that ended a Cowboy scoring threat and started a Bruin touchdown drive. In the Colorado game, he made seven tackles, including four solos, and was also credited with one pass defense.

At San Diego State, Havner was all over the field. He led the Bruins with 10 tackles (nine solos) and sacked the quarterback on two occasions. At Oregon State, he was credited with three tackles, including one for loss, and made his second interception of the season. Against Oregon, he made five tackles, including one for loss. At California, he led the Bruins with 11 tackles -- all solos -- including one for loss and also forced a fumble.

Against Stanford, he made 11 tackles (six solos), one shy of the team high, including two for losses.

At Washington, he tied for the team lead with nine tackles (four solos). He also scored his second touchdown of the year, making his third interception and returning it 42 yards for the game-clinching score with 1:17 remaining in the contest, making the score 34-24. He also deflected a pass to teammate Marcus Reese to set up another touchdown.

At Arizona, he led the team with nine tackles (six solos), including one for loss, and also forced a fumble. Against USC, he was credited with four tackles (three solos).

Havner had eight tackles (four solos), including two for losses, in the Washington State game.

In the opener against Colorado State, the junior right end was credited with three tackles, including one for loss. In 2001, he started all 11 contests and finished with 18 tackles and one sack. Ball was seventh on the team with four tackles for loss. As a redshirt freshman in 2000, he started three games at end and saw action in all 12 contests.

#24 FS BEN EMANUEL — The talented redshirt sophomore safety played a key role in the victory over Colorado State. On the night, he was credited with six tackles (four solos) and one pass defense from the strong safety position. However, his biggest play came with the Bruins leading 21-19 with 1:32 remaining in the game. On CSU's two-point conversion attempt, Brandon Chillar caused Bradlee Van Pelt to fumble and Emanuel picked up the loose ball and returned it 89 yards for two points to give UCLA a 23-19 lead. It was the first defensive two-point conversion in UCLA history.

In the win at Oklahoma State, he was credited with six solo tackles, including one for loss. He also made two interceptions, the second time in his career he has done that (Washington State in 2001). His second, with UCLA holding a 38-24 lead, gave the Bruins possession with 3:41 remaining and they were able to run out the clock. He played most of the second half at free safety in place of injured Matt Ware. In the Colorado game, Emanuel was credited with a then career-best eight tackles (six solos), including one for loss.

At San Diego State, he started at free safety with Matt Ware's shift to corner and helped coordinate the secondary play that held the Aztecs to just 208 passing yards (SDSU had thrown for over 500 yards in each of its previous two games). He was credited with one tackle. At Oregon State, he again started at free safety and was credited with one pass breakup. He did not play versus Oregon due to a 'stinger' in his left side that he suffered at Oregon State and aggravated during the week.

At California, he tied for second on the team with seven tackles, all solos. Against Stanford, he made two tackles (one solo) and blocked a Cardinal field goal attempt. At Washington, he tied for the team lead with a career-high nine tackles (four solos). At Arizona, he made three tackles (one solo) and recovered a fumble.

Against USC, he made six tackles (four solos), one shy of the team lead, and also broke up two passes.

Emanuel had nine tackles in the Washington State game to match his career high total. He made eight solo stops and had two interceptions. He returned the first interception for a touchdown and picked off the second in the end zone. He now has four interceptions this season to tie Ricky Manning for the team lead. It is the second interception he has returned for a touchdown in his career. The first came last season at Washington State.

After playing well off the bench in the first three games of the year (he had two tackles against both Oklahoma State and Colorado), he moved into the lineup at San Diego State and has been there ever since. His development enabled UCLA to move Matt Ware back to cornerback.

He had two tackle assists in his first career start and added three solo stops at Oregon State, five solo tackles and a pass deflection against Oregon, one tackle for loss at California and four tackles against Stanford.

THE OFFENSE

#10 QB CORY PAUS — In the game at California (Oct. 19), Paus suffered a fractured right ankle (fibula, no ligament damage) while completing a 28-yard pass to Craig Bragg early in the third quarter. Paus underwent surgery on October 24.

He had completed 10 of 15 passes for 129 yards when he was hurt. The pass he completed when injured moved UCLA to the 20-yard line and the Bruins tied the score, 10-10, a few plays later.

On the year, Paus has completed 109 of 184 passes (59.2%) for 1,647 yards with 10 touchdowns, six interceptions and an efficiency rating of 145.8. His 10 touchdown passes measured 41, 27, 25, 5, 37, 64, 24, 55, 71 and 46 yards -- an average of 39.5 yards per scoring toss -- and six traveled at least 35 yards. When injured, he ranked fourth in the Pac-10 and 16th in the nation in passing efficiency (145.8), seventh in the league in passing yards (235.3) and ninth in total offense (222.7).

Paus played in 35 games (32 starts), including two in which he was injured and threw a total of just five passes before leaving the field. His career average of 15.67 yards per completion is the highest among the quarterbacks in UCLA's career top six.

THE QUARTERBACKS — True freshman Drew Olson had been the primary backup to Cory Paus throughout the first half of the season. Against California, he completed five of seven passes for 58 yards prior to suffering a sprained right shoulder late in the third quarter that sidelined him for the remainder of the game. He did not practice much the following week and did not play versus Stanford.

He made his first career start at Washington and led the Bruins to a 24-14 halftime lead en route to a 34-24 victory at Seattle, becoming the first Bruin true freshman since Tom Ramsey in 1979 to win his first career start on the road. On the afternoon, he completed 13 of 27 passes for 189 yards and did not commit a turnover. He directed two 80-

yard scoring drives, the biggest in the first quarter after Washington had scored to take a 7-3 lead. Overall, the offense produced three touchdowns and two field goals. He was seven of 14 for 83 yards in the second half.

At Arizona, he started for the second straight week and completed seven of 12 passes for 111 yards and the first touchdown of his career, a 33-yard wide receiver screen to Craig Bragg. He directed a touchdown drive and field goal drive on his first two possessions of the game, came out late in the first quarter and did not return until the third quarter, when he directed touchdown drives on his first two possessions.

Against USC, Olson, only the third UCLA true freshman quarterback to start against the Trojans (Tom Ramsey and Cade McNown were the others), completed eight of 17 passes for 121 yards and one interception. Facing a 21-0 deficit late in the first quarter, he led the Bruins on an 89-yard, 10-play touchdown drive to make the score 21-7 with 11:27 left in the first half. The next time he came on the field, on UCLA's first possession of the second half, the Bruins trailed 35-7. He was five of eight for 91 yards in the first half but just three of nine for 30 yards in the second half.

Against Washington State, he had the first multiple touchdown game of his career. He tossed a 39-yard touchdown to Junior Taylor late in the first half and a 27-yard score to Mike Seidman in the third quarter.

True freshman Matt Moore, who did not play in the season's first seven games, started versus Stanford and showed great poise while rallying the Bruins from a 15-0 first quarter deficit to a 28-18 victory. He completed seven of 19 passes for 142 yards and one touchdown of 22 yards to Mike Seidman. On the night, he directed seven scoring drives -- two touchdowns and five field goals. He had three completions of at least 20 yards -- 49- and 38-yard passes to Tab Perry and the 22-yard touchdown to Seidman.

Moore became the first UCLA true freshman quarterback since Cade McNown (1995) to start a game and the first since Tom Ramsey in 1979 to win his first start.

He did not play at Washington but split time at Arizona, entering the game late in the first quarter and playing until halftime. He reentered the game in the fourth quarter with a 37-7 lead and did not throw a pass. On the night, he completed six of eight passes for 90 yards.

In the first half, Moore drove the Bruins to a touchdown and a field goal on his first two possessions. On the first drive, he completed a 40-yard pass to Tab Perry on third-and-41, giving the Bruins a fourth-and-one at the 19-yard line and Tyler Ebell scored on the fourth down play to give UCLA a 17-0 lead. His field goal drive started with 19 and 22 yard completions.

Against USC, he played two series in the first half (a third was a one-play kneel at the end of the half) and two in the fourth quarter. On his second fourth-quarter possession, he drove the team 51 yards in five plays, including a 30-yard pass to Craig Bragg and a 10-yard touchdown pass to Manuel White. On the day, he completed seven of 11 passes for 64 yards and one touchdown.

Moore played the final two series against Washington State and completed four of eight passes for 36 yards.

On the year, Moore has completed 24 of 46 passes (52.2%) for 332 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions.

Redshirt freshman **John Sciarra** made his debut on a late series at San Diego State (five snaps) and that was his only action prior to the fourth quarter of the California game. Against the Golden Bears, he completed one of seven passes for 10 yards with one interception. He also played the final series at Arizona but did not attempt a pass.

Sciarra played UCLA's final possession against USC and drove the Bruins 60 yards on six plays, completing four of five passes for 65 yards, including a 14-yard touchdown to Mercedes Lewis, the first for both quarterback and receiver.

#18 TE MIKE SEIDMAN — The senior has developed into the top tight end in the Pac-10 and one of the best in the nation. On Nov. 21, he was selected one of nine semifinalists for the Mackey Award, symbolic of the nation's best tight end. He has also been selected first-team All-Pac-10 by the league's coaches.

On the year, Seidman is second on the team with 41 receptions, is third with 631 yards and is second with five receiving touchdowns. His average of 15.4 yards per catch ranks third on the squad.

Seidman's 631 yards are the most by a Pac-10 tight end (by 97) while his 41 receptions are tied for second, one behind the lead. His average yardage per game (52.6 yards) is No. 2 nationally among tight ends.

His 631 yards rank No. 1 on UCLA's tight end single-season yardage list (since 1965). He moved past Paul Bergmann's 577 yards in 1982 in the third quarter of the Washington State game. His 41 receptions are tied for No. 2 on that list. The record is Bergmann's 44 catches in 1983 and he made 41 receptions in 1982.

In addition, Seidman's 41 catches are more than his career total entering this season (20) and he is averaging 16.2 yards on his 61 career receptions.

In the opener against Colorado State, Seidman made three catches for 40 yards. His 23-yard second-quarter reception on third-and-two immediately preceded Junior Taylor's 49-yard touchdown run. He also recovered an onside kick. Against Oklahoma State, he made one reception but it was a big one. On third-and-11, he hooked up with Cory Paus on a 27-yard touchdown to give the Bruins a 24-10 lead with 2:28 remaining in the first half. It was the third score of his career. In the Colorado game, he made three catches for 26 yards.

At San Diego State, he made a team-high six receptions for 134 yards -- both career highs at the time -- and one touchdown. He was wide open down the middle on his 64-yard catch-and-run touchdown and he broke at least three tackles on a key 29-yard, third-down reception. On the day, four of his six catches yielded a first down, including the TD catch.

At Oregon State, he set new career highs for the second consecutive week, making a team-high eight receptions for 138 yards and one touchdown, a 24-yard catch-and-run on a tight end screen. Seven of his eight receptions produced a first down, including his scoring catch and a leaping reception between two defenders at the 10-yard line for a 32-yard gain.

His eight receptions were the second-most in school history by a tight end, topped only by Byron Nelson's 10 versus Washington in 1963. Overall, he tied the 15th-best performance in school history with his eight catches (at the time). In that two-game span, he made 14 receptions for 272 yards (19.4 average), two touchdowns and 11 first downs. He did not make a reception against Oregon, which concentrated on stopping the talented tight end. At California, he made four receptions for 37 yards which produced two first downs.

Against Stanford, he made one reception, a 22-yard catch in the second quarter that cut UCLA's deficit to 15-10.

At Washington, he led the team with five receptions for 96 yards, including a 42-yard catch-and-run to set up UCLA's third-quarter field goal. He also made receptions of 21 and 17 yards on UCLA's first touchdown drive and a third-down reception for six yards gave the Bruins a first down at the one-yard line on UCLA's second 80-yard touchdown drive. All five of his receptions produced first downs.

At Arizona, he made three receptions for 15 yards.

Against USC, he made three catches for 28 yards with a long of 17 and produced two first downs.

He made four catches for 68 yards and one touchdown in the Washington State game.

A year ago, he finished with 12 catches (fifth on the team) for 250 yards and a 20.8 average (best of any of the Bruin receivers) and one touchdown.

OFFENSIVE LINE — Senior Mike Saffer had been named second-team All-America by The Sporting News and All-Pac-10 first-team by the league's coaches. He has started 41 games overall, but his streak of 26 straight at right tackle stretching back to the 2000 opener (he started seven times at right guard in 1999) was snapped when he missed the San Diego State game with a broken rib. He returned to action at Oregon State, started and played every snap, making 13 KO blocks while helping UCLA gain 625 yards of offense. Saffer led the team with a 94% grade in the Oklahoma State game and tied for team-high honors with 14 KO blocks. He also led the team with 94% against Stanford. He tied for second on the squad with 91% at Washington. At Arizona, he led the Bruins with a grade of 96% and was second with 12 KO blocks. **On the year, he has graded at 91% or higher six times. He has also recorded at least 10 KO blocks five times and has 90 KO blocks in his 10 games.**

Saffer started all 11 games a year ago and earned second-team All-Pac-10 conference honors. On the year, he made 46 KO blocks and compiled a grade of 88% or higher in eight of 11 contests. He played at least 60 offensive plays in eight contests. He led the team with a 97% grade in the Washington game in which DeShaun Foster broke the school single

game rushing record with 301 yards. On the year, he recorded five or more KO blocks six times.

Senior **Bryce Bohlander**, a Pac-10 second-team selection, has been named to the Verizon/CoSIDA District VIII Academic All-America team and first-team Pac-10 All-Academic. Bohlander has started 37 straight contests at left tackle, including the final two games of 1999, 12 in 2000, all 11 last year and all 11 this season. He has played virtually every snap this season and helped the Bruins gain 625 yards of offense at Oregon State. **He has earned grades of 90% or better in six of 11 games, topped by 93% at San Diego State and Oregon State, tying for the team lead in the latter contest. He has made 55 KO blocks.**

Last season, Bohlander made 47 KO blocks on the year. He was on the field for at least 60 plays in nine games.

Third-year sophomore **Eyoseph Efseaff** has established himself as a star in the making at left guard, earning second-team All-Pac-10 acclaim this season, and has started 22 of his 23 career games. He led the team with a grade of 95% and 11 KO blocks at San Diego State and was second vs. Oklahoma State with a 93% grade. At Oregon State, he led the team with 16 KO blocks and tied for the team lead with a 93% grade and he led the team with 15 KO blocks at California. He was second against Stanford with a 93% grade and had nine KO blocks (third). He tied for the team lead at Washington with eight KO blocks. At Arizona, he graded at 93% and had eight KO blocks. **On the year, he has graded at 93% or higher five times. He has made 103 KO blocks with at least eight in seven games.**

Last year, Efseaff started all 11 games at left guard and was named second team Freshman All-America and first-team Freshman All-Pac-10 by *The Sporting News*. On the year, he was credited with a team-high 73 KO blocks. Against Arizona State, he made nine KO blocks and graded 90%. He was on the field for at least 60 plays in nine games.

Third-year sophomore **Steven Vieira** has started 17 of his last 18 games, including all 12 this year and five of the final six in 2001. In each of the first two games of the 2002 season, he was credited with 14 KO blocks. He led the team with 11 KO blocks against Colorado and had six (tied for third) at San Diego State. At Oregon State, he tied for second with 13 KO blocks and graded at 90%. Against Stanford, he led the team with 13 KO blocks. Against Washington, he led the team with 92% and tied for the team lead with eight KO blocks. At Arizona, he graded 95% and he led the team with 15 KO blocks. **On the year, he has graded at 88% or better in nine games and has led the team in KO blocks seven times, making a team-high total of 114.**

The only line position without a returning starter was at center, where redshirt freshman **Mike McCloskey** has played virtually every series in his first 12 games as a Bruin. McCloskey earned second-team Freshman All-America honors and first-team All-Pac-10 Freshman acclaim from *The Sporting News*. He earned a grade of 91% at Oregon State, led the Bruins with 91% at California, tied for second with 91% at Washington and graded at 92% at Arizona. **He also made 11 KO blocks against the Wildcats and has made 47 on the year.**

In the opener against Colorado State, Saffer and Vieira earned grades of 92% while Bohlander graded at 90%. Vieira was credited with 14 KO blocks and Efseaff added seven. Bohlander, McCloskey, Vieira and Saffer each played all 63 snaps while Efseaff played 60. At Oklahoma State, Saffer led the team with a 94% grade. Both Saffer and Vieira totaled 14 KO blocks in the contest.

Against Colorado, Bohlander graded at 88%, Shane Lehmann was at 87% off the bench and Efseaff and McCloskey were both at 86%. Vieira led the team with 11 KO blocks. At San Diego State, Efseaff led the starters with a grade of 95% and 11 KO blocks. Bohlander graded at 93%. Ed Blanton, playing for the first time, made nine KO blocks while McCloskey and Vieira each had six.

At Oregon State, UCLA did not allow a sack and helped the offense produce 625 yards, ninth-most in school history. All five starters graded at 88% or higher -- Bohlander and Efseaff at 93%, McCloskey at 91%, Vieira at 90% and Saffer at 88%. Efseaff led the team with 16 KO blocks while Vieira and Saffer added 13 each.

Against Oregon, Saffer led the team with a grade of 92%. Efseaff graded at 89% and tied Vieira with six KO blocks. At California, McCloskey led the team at 91%, followed by Vieira at 88%. Efseaff had 15 KO blocks and Saffer had 10. Against Stanford, Saffer (94%), Efseaff (93%) and Bohlander (91%) all graded better than 90%. Vieira led the team with 13 KO blocks and Saffer had 10.

At Washington, the line protected quarterback Drew Olson very well, allowing him to be sacked just once in his first career start. Vieira led the team with a 92% grade, followed by Saffer and McCloskey at 91%. Vieira and Efseaff each had eight KO blocks.

At Arizona, the line helped the offense produce over 200 yards rushing and passing and did not allow a sack. All five starters graded at 91% or better, led by Saffer's 96% and Vieira's 95%, and Vieira (15), Saffer (12) and McCloskey (11) were the KO block leaders.

Against USC, Efseaff graded at 89%, followed by Saffer and Vieira at 87%. Efseaff and Saffer led with nine KO blocks apiece.

JUST FOR KICKS —

#19 P/PK NATE FIKSE — A true senior, Fikse is one of the best punters in the collegiate game and also handles the kickoff duties. He added the place-kicking duties to his resume beginning with the Stanford game. This season, he was selected first-team All-Pac-10 for the second straight year after being a second-team choice in 2000.

In the 2002 opener versus Colorado State, he averaged 46.75 yards on four kicks. His longest was 53 yards and he had one downed inside the 20-yard line.

Against Oklahoma State, he averaged 45.2 yards on five kicks, with a long of 55, and twice forced the Cowboys to start inside their 30-yard line. Only one of his five punts was returned (25 yards).

In the Colorado game, he averaged 46.2 yards (277 yards) on his six punts and had just one returned for eight yards. He had one downed inside the 20-yard line and his longest

kick of the day was 63 yards. In addition, he also attempted the first field goal of his career but was wide on the 55-yard attempt at the end of the first half.

At San Diego State, he averaged 36.7 yards on six kicks but sacrificed average to pin the Aztecs inside their 20-yard line on three of his six kicks.

At Oregon State, he averaged 50.3 yards on three kicks -- all in the first half -- including one for 56 yards and another for 47 yards that went out of bounds at the Beaver 17-yard line. Against Oregon, he averaged 43.5 yards on four kicks but had one returned for a touchdown.

At California, he averaged 35.3 yards on seven kicks but placed three inside the 20-yard line and had only three kicks returned for a total of four yards.

Against Stanford, he added place kicking to his resume. Serving in that role for the first time in his career (he had attempted one 55-yard field goal), Fikse nailed all five of his attempts (36, 22, 19, 23 and 44 yards) to become the first Bruin since Chris Sailer in 1998 (Washington) to make five field goals in a game. He tied the Pac-10 record for most field goals in a conference game.

He also averaged 43.8 yards on four punts, with a long of 56 yards. He placed one inside the 20-yard line (eight) and had three returned for a total of six yards. He was named Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts.

At Washington, he increased his field goal streak to seven straight, converting attempts of 27 and 23 yards. He also averaged 36.0 yards on seven punts but sacrificed yards for field position. Three of his punts pinned the Huskies inside their 20-yard line (two, 10 and 13-yard lines), another forced Washington to start at the 20 and the Huskies did not return a punt. He also became UCLA's career leader in punts and punting yardage.

At Arizona, Fikse converted all three of his field goal attempts, giving him 10 straight successes in the three games he has served as the place kicker. His 51-yard field goal in the second quarter was UCLA's longest since Chris Sailer's school record 56-yarder against Oregon in 1997. He also averaged 41.3 yards on four punts with one inside the 20-yard line, and had just one returned for six yards. He also had just one of his kickoffs returned for 12 yards.

Against USC, he averaged 39.8 yards on six punts, placing three inside the Trojan 20-yard line. None of his kickoffs were returned and he made all three of his PATs.

He averaged 43.3 yards on seven punts against Washington State. He placed one inside the twenty-yard line and had a long of 57 yards.

On the year, he is averaging 41.5 yards on his 63 punts with 19 inside the 20-yard line and 10 touchbacks. He currently ranks 35th in the NCAA and fourth in the Pac-10.

In field goals, he is eighth in the Pac-10 with 0.83 per game, with all 10 coming in the last five games. His 90.9 percentage is the second best in the league among players with at least 10 field goals.

Fikse's career punting average of 42.71 ranks No. 2 on the all-time school list, trailing only Kirk Wilson's record of 44.60 and ahead of No. 3 Zenon Andrusyshyn (42.63). With career totals of 259 punts and 11,061 yards, he is now the

school record-holder in both categories, having passed Chris Sailer's marks of 241 punts and 10,120 yards.

In 2001, he earned first-team All-Pacific 10 conference honors after leading the league in punting for the second straight season. His season average of 44.2 yards per kick a year ago placed him eighth nationally.

In 2000, he earned second-team all-conference honors and his regular-season average of 43.3 ranked first in the Pac-10 and 13th in the nation

#14 PK CHRIS GRIFFITH — The redshirt senior, a former walk-on, handled the place kicking chores beginning in 1999 and earned a scholarship for the 2000 season. He did not attempt a kick in the final five regular-season games this year.

In the opener against Colorado State, Griffith made all four of his PATs. However, he did miss field goal attempts of 41 yards and 32 yards. At Oklahoma State, he made all five PATs and added his first field goal of the year (33 yards). However, he was wide on a 48-yard attempt. In the Colorado game, he made a 30-yard field goal and both PATs.

At San Diego State, Griffith made field goals of 33 and 46 yards and added five PATs for 11 points. The 46-yard field goal was his longest of the year.

He also scored 11 points at Oregon State, making field goals of 42 and 38 yards and adding five PATs. However, he had a first quarter field goal blocked and returned 83 yards for a score. Against Oregon, he made a 37-yard field goal and three of four PATs for six points. However, he had a third-quarter PAT blocked, ending a streak of 80 consecutive successes and with 1:54 remaining in the game and UCLA trailing 31-30, his 46-yard field goal attempt was wide left.

At California, he made a 42-yard field goal in the first quarter to tie the game at three but had a 21-yard attempt blocked in the fourth quarter. He also had one PAT.

On the season, he ranks second on the team with 49 points (25 of 26 on PATs, eight of 14 on field goals). He ranks sixth on UCLA's career scoring list with 261 points. Griffith ranks third in school history behind John Lee and Alfredo Velasco with his career field goal percentage of 71.2.

Last year Griffith ranked second on the team with 71 points, making 10 of 13 field goals and all 41 PATs. He was third in the Pac-10 in scoring (7.10) and fourth (tied) in field goals (1.00).

#1 WR TAB PERRY — The true junior wide receiver has been showing steady improvement throughout the season and earned Pac-10 honorable mention acclaim. In the 2002 opener, he made two receptions for 43 yards, including one for 28 yards. His 15-yard reception in the fourth quarter gave the Bruins a first down at the Ram five-yard line to set up the touchdown that gave the Bruins the lead for good, 14-13. Both of his catches produced first downs. Perry also returned one kickoff for 17 yards.

Against Oklahoma State, he tied for the team lead with three receptions, good for 77 yards. He produced first downs with all three receptions. He made a 23-yard reception on UCLA's first touchdown drive and had receptions of nine yards (on fourth-and-eight) and 45 yards on UCLA's final scoring drive of the first half. He also returned a kickoff 34 yards.

In the Colorado game, Perry made three receptions for 23 yards. He also averaged 29.7 yards (89) on three kickoff returns, including one for 35 yards. At San Diego State, he made two receptions for 25 yards (one first down) and had one kickoff return for 16 yards.

He enjoyed the best game of his career at Oregon State, making a career-high seven receptions for a career-high and team-high 145 yards and five first downs. Three of his catches measured at least 25 yards (25, 41 and 34) and the two longest both helped sustain touchdown drives. In addition, he also recovered Oregon State's onside kick with 2:03 remaining to seal the victory and returned three kickoffs 51 yards.

Against Oregon, he tied his career high with seven receptions and accounted for 126 yards, giving him back-to-back 100-yard games for the first time in his career. He gave the Bruins an early lead with his 55-yard touchdown on UCLA's first offensive play and produced four first downs with his seven receptions. He also returned three kickoffs for 88 yards, including one of 38 to start UCLA's field goal drive on its first possession of the second half.

At California, he made one reception for 13 yards (first down) and returned two kickoffs for 43 yards.

Against Stanford, he had receptions of 38 yards on UCLA's first touchdown drive and a spectacular 49-yard catch to set up UCLA's field goal late in the second quarter. Both catches produced first downs.

At Washington, he made four receptions for 64 yards and two first downs. He had a 23-yard catch on UCLA's first touchdown drive and a 24-yard catch had led to UCLA's third touchdown.

At Arizona, he made three receptions (tied for the team lead) for a team-high 89 yards and two first downs. He made a great 40-yard catch on a third-and-41 to give the Bruins a fourth-and-one at the Arizona 19 and Tyler Ebell scored on the next play for a 17-7 lead. He also had a 37-yard catch-and-run on UCLA's first field goal drive.

Against USC, he sprained his left ankle in the first quarter and was limited to one reception for six yards. He also averaged 31.0 yards on four kickoff returns (124 yards) but fumbled the opening kickoff after a 30-yard return.

He did not play against Washington State due to a sprained ankle.

On the year, he leads the team with his average of 19.9 yards per reception. He is third on the squad with his 35 catches and second with his 698 receiving yards and has produced 24 first downs.

In addition, his 1,279 all-purpose yards ranks second on the team and 17th on UCLA's single-season list. His 23 kickoff returns rank third on that single-season list, just one behind No. 2 Jim McElroy (24 in 1995) and six behind his own record of 29, set in 2000. His 576 kickoff return yards rank No. 3 on that list, trailing McElroy's 595 in 1995 and Perry's record of 598, set in 2000.

He ranks 10th in the Pac-10 with his average of 63.5 yards per game and his average of 19.94 yards per reception is second in the league. In addition, his average of 25.0 yards on 23 kickoff returns ranks second in the Pac-10 and he also ranks sixth in the league with his average of 116.3 all-purpose yards. His average of 21.68 per play is the highest in the league.

Perry is now tied for second with Jim McElroy on UCLA's career kickoff return list with 54. Brian Brown is first with 66 returns. His 1,212 yards rank third on that list.

His career totals are now 62 receptions for 1,172 yards and three touchdowns. His 1,172 yards rank 17th on that career list while his 62 receptions are tied for 23rd.

#87 WR CRAIG BRAGG — The redshirt sophomore has quickly established himself as a big-play performer in the mold of several former Bruin standouts. He earned All-Pac-10 honorable mention.

Against Colorado State, Bragg tied for the team lead with four receptions, good for 49 yards and three first downs. At Oklahoma State, he led the team with 89 yards on his team-high (tied) three receptions. He scored his first touchdown of the year on a 41-yard strike up the right sideline with UCLA trailing 10-0. He also made a 22-yard catch to set up the Bruins' first touchdown of the second half and he also made a 26-yard grab. He also gained 35 yards on two reverses, including a 24-yard run on third-and-two on UCLA's final possession of the game.

In the Colorado game, Bragg tied his then-career high and led the team with seven receptions for a team-high 70 yards and two touchdowns. His first touchdown reception, a

twisting catch and lunge into the end zone on Jon Dubravac's 33-yard reverse pass, gave the Bruins a 7-0 lead. His other score measured five yards.

At San Diego State, he made four receptions for 60 yards, including a 37-yard touchdown on third-and-28 when he ran right by the cornerback. He also produced a first down with one of his other three receptions. At Oregon State, he made two receptions for 22 yards and one first down.

Against Oregon, Bragg enjoyed one of the best afternoons in UCLA history, making nine receptions for 230 yards and three touchdowns -- all career highs. The 230 yards rank second-only to J.J. Stokes' 263 yards versus USC in 1992. The nine catches tied for eighth on that single-game list and were the most by a Bruin since Freddie Mitchell made nine against Wisconsin in the 2000 Sun Bowl. The three receiving touchdowns were the most by a Bruin since Stokes scored four against Washington in 1993.

Bragg scored a long touchdown in each of the first three quarters. In the first quarter, he caught a 53-yard pass from Dubravac, who was lined up in the backfield. It was the second time this year that the two hooked up for a score. In the second, Cory Paus found him up the right sideline and he outraced the defense for a 71-yard touchdown, the longest of his career and the longest Bruin pass play since the 2000 USC contest. In the third, he took an inside screen and raced up the middle for a 46-yard score. On the day, he produced six first downs with his nine catches.

At California, he broke the 100-yard barrier for the second straight week, finishing with seven catches for 113 yards. He had three receptions of at least 23 yards and produced four first downs. His 28-yard reception, on Cory Paus' final pass, gave the Bruins a first down at the 20-yard line and they scored two plays later to tie the game at 10-10. Against Stanford, he made three receptions for 19 yards and one first down.

At Washington, he made two receptions for 22 yards, both in the fourth quarter, and produced one first down. He also returned three punts for 63 yards, including one for 48 yards to set up the first score of the game (field goal).

At Arizona, he made three receptions for 64 yards and had one rush for four yards. He was at his best on UCLA's first play of the second half, taking a wide receiver screen and eluding at least three would-be tacklers to reach the end zone for a 33-yard touchdown. On that play, he also became No. 1 on UCLA's single-season sophomore receiving yardage list.

Against USC, he tied for the team lead with five receptions and his 91 yards led the squad. He had catches of 13 and 35 yards on UCLA's first touchdown drive and a 30-yard reception to start the final touchdown drive. He produced four first downs with his five receptions.

Against Washington State, he had two catches for 22 yards and produced two first downs.

On the year, Bragg leads the team with 51 receptions, 851 yards and eight touchdowns and has produced 32 first downs receiving. In the Pac-10, he ranks ninth in receiving yards (70.9), 10th in receptions (4.25) and fourth in punt returns (11.9).

His 851 yards rank No.1 on the UCLA sophomore list, breaking J.J. Stokes' old record of 728, set in 1992. His 51 receptions are also No. 1 on that sophomore list, breaking Mike Sherrard's old record of 48.

In addition, his 851 yards rank No. 8 on UCLA's single-season receiving yardage, as do his 51 receptions.

His eight touchdowns this season have measured 41, 33, 5, 37, 53, 71, 46 and 33 yards -- an average of 39.9 yards per play and his career touchdown average is 41.6 (42.0 on receptions). Last year, his two touchdown receptions measured 62 and 39 yards and his two touchdown runs were 37 and 42 yards.

His career totals are now 80 receptions for 1,259 yards and 10 touchdowns. His 1,259 yards rank 16th on that career list while his 80 receptions are tied for 17th.

No Bruin has ever finished his sophomore season with more career receptions or receiving yardage than Bragg (Danny Farmer had 72 receptions and 1,173 yards entering his junior year).

Bragg made his first career start last season at Oregon State. He caught the first two touchdown passes of his career in the season finale versus Arizona State. For the game, he caught seven passes for 138 yards. On the year, he led the team with 29 catches, averaging 14.1 yards per catch, and was the team's No. 4 rusher with 100 yards (12.5 average) and two touchdowns. He also averaged 8.4 yards on 14 punt returns and 18.6 yards on 10 kickoff returns.

WIDE RECEIVER — In addition to Tab Perry and Craig Bragg, several other Bruins have contributed to the rotation, including redshirt junior **Ryan Smith**, senior **Jon Dubravac**, true freshman **Junior Taylor** and junior **Garrett Lepisto**.

Taylor gave the team an important spark in the Colorado State game. With the Bruins trailing 10-0 in the second quarter, he touched the football for the first time in his career. He took a handoff on a reverse, turned the corner on the right side, cut back across the field, made a few moves and scored UCLA's first touchdown of the game on a 49-yard run. It marked the first offensive touchdown by a UCLA true freshman since DeShaun Foster scored four against USC in the 10th game of the 1998 season (safety Jibril Raymo recovered a blocked punt and returned it for a touchdown last year). He did not make a catch at Oklahoma State. Against Colorado, he made the first two receptions of his career for 29 yards and added a 10-yard run on a reverse. He added a 16-yard reception at San Diego State. At California, he gained six yards on a reverse. At Washington, his 38-yard run on a 'swinging gate' play led to the field goal that gave UCLA a 3-0 lead. He caught two passes for six yards, with an eight-yard reception on the game's first play, at Arizona. Against USC, he made an 11-yard reception on the first fourth-quarter touchdown drive.

He started at split end against Washington State and made a career-high four receptions, tying for the team lead. He also led the team with 86 yards and caught a 39-yard touchdown pass from Drew Olson with 41 seconds remaining

in the first half. On the year, he has made 10 receptions for 148 yards and one touchdown.

Smith did not make a reception in the opener against CSU but made two receptions for 39 yards at Oklahoma State, including a 25-yard touchdown to give UCLA a 31-10 lead early in the second half. Against Colorado, he made one catch for 11 yards but did not have a reception at San Diego State. At Oregon State, he had two catches for 23 yards but did not have a reception versus Oregon. He started against California in a three-wide receiver set. He did not travel to Washington or Arizona or play against USC due to ankle problems and had season-ending surgery prior to the Washington State game.

A year ago, Smith had a breakout game versus Ohio State. He tied for the team lead with four receptions for 49 yards and scored the only UCLA touchdown of the game on a 24-yard strike. In the win over California, he made a team-high four catches for 69 yards, including a 27-yard touchdown, in his first start in place of injured Brian Poli-Dixon. At Stanford, he led the team with career highs in receptions (six) and yards (91). He finished the season as the team's No. 4 receiver with 18 receptions, good for 272 yards (15.1 average) and two touchdowns.

Lepisto, a former walk-on who was awarded a scholarship prior to the start of 2002 Fall camp, made four receptions in the last four games of the 2001 season. He is once again serving as the holder on all place kicks, a job he had last year, while participating in the rotation. He made two receptions for 21 yards against Colorado. Against Oregon, he completed an eight-yard pass from field goal formation. Against California, he recovered one of UCLA's two fourth-quarter blocked punts.

Dubravac sat out last season as a medical redshirt after making 14 receptions in the 2000 season. In the Colorado contest, he attempted the first pass of his career on a reverse pass and completed it to Craig Bragg for a 33-yard touchdown. Against Oregon, he lined up in the backfield, took a direct snap and launched a 53-yard touchdown to Bragg. He did not travel to California due to a bruised back but did play against Stanford and Washington. At Arizona, he made a 19-yard reception, his first of the year. He made a 15-yard reception on UCLA's final touchdown drive against USC despite suffering two broken toes in the game. **Against Washington State, he threw his third touchdown pass of the season, a 55-yard toss to Manuel White.**

#2 RB TYLER EBELL — One of the success stories of the 2002 season, Ebell has earned second-team Freshman All-America honors from *The Sporting News* and was also picked to the magazine's Pac-10 Freshman team.

On October 5 at Oregon State, Ebell came off the bench to enjoy one of the greatest days in UCLA history. On the afternoon, the redshirt freshman tailback rushed for 203 yards and one touchdown on 29 carries. His 203 yards rank 14th on UCLA's single-game list. In addition, he now ranks second on UCLA's freshman rushing list, trailing only Eric Ball's 227 yards against Iowa in the 1986 Rose Bowl. He also caught one pass for 10 yards, returned one punt for six yards and tried a pass on a trick play (it was broken up in the end zone).

Ebell ran for 45 yards on 12 attempts in the second quarter, 34 yards on eight carries in the third quarter and 124 yards on nine attempts in the fourth quarter. His 73-yard run to the one-yard line in the fourth quarter was the second longest ever by a Bruin freshman (83 by Derek Ayers vs. BYU in 1993) and UCLA scored on the next play. He also had a 31-yard run later in the final quarter and UCLA scored two plays later. On UCLA's final possession, runs of six and four yards produced the first down that allowed the Bruins to run out the clock.

Against Oregon, Ebell made the first start of his career and ran for 119 yards on 26 attempts. In the final half, he gained 89 yards on 15 attempts. He also returned five punts for 64 yards.

At California, he started and broke the 100-yard barrier for the third straight week, finishing with 102 on 28 attempts. He scored UCLA's only touchdown on an 11-yard run and also had a 17-yard run in the first quarter.

Against Stanford, he was a workhorse, rushing for 160 yards and the go-ahead touchdown on 39 carries, three shy of the school record for carries. He also made one reception for 14 yards and attempted one pass. It marked his fourth straight game over 100 yards.

In the second half, he carried 25 times for 118 yards. Of UCLA's 33 offensive snaps in the final 30 minutes (excluding the two kneel downs at the end of the game), he carried on 25 of them. In the fourth quarter, he carried on 13 of UCLA's 14 snaps, including the final 12. UCLA scored on all three fourth-quarter possessions (one touchdown and two field goals).

At Washington, Ebell reached the 100-yard plateau for the fifth straight game, finishing with 102 yards and three one-yard touchdowns on 31 attempts. He had three double-figure runs, including ones of 23 and 22 yards.

At Arizona, he became only the second UCLA player in history to rush for over 100 yards in six consecutive games in the same season. Ebell finished with 124 yards and two touchdowns on 22 attempts. His first touchdown was a tackle-breaking, reverse field 22-yard run while his second was a 19-yard run on fourth-and-one to give the Bruins a 17-0 lead. On the night, he had four runs of at least 19 yards, including one for 36 on UCLA's first touchdown drive.

Against USC, he led the Bruins with 56 yards on 12 attempts. He had runs of 11 and 13 yards on UCLA's first possession of the second half but carried just twice more with the Bruins trailing 35-7. He also made two receptions for 29 yards.

Ebell was limited to 10 yards on nine carries in the Washington State game and caught four passes for two yards. He also returned two kickoffs for 43 yards.

Ebell leads the Bruins with 924 yards on 209 attempts and is averaging 4.4 yards per carry. He also leads the team with nine touchdowns and 54 points. In addition, he is averaging 11.6 yards on 23 punt returns. He ranks fourth in the Pac-10 in rushing (77.0 yards per game), fifth in punt returns (11.6 yards per return), ninth in the league in all-purpose yards (108.8) and 13th in total offense (77.0 average) despite not earning much playing time until the season's fifth game.

In his last eight contests -- all Pac-10 games -- he has carried 197 times for 876 yards and eight touchdowns, averaging 24.6 carries and 108.3 yards per game.

Ebell needs 76 yards in the bowl game to become only the third freshman in Pac-10 history to rush for 1,000 yards. Stanford's Darrin Nelson holds the record with 1,069 yards (1977) and Oregon State's Ken Simonton rushed for 1,028 in 1998.

Only nine players in school history have ever rushed for 1,000 yards (16 times) in a season, none as a freshman. His 924 yards currently rank 19th on UCLA's single-season list.

Ebell ranks seventh nationally among freshman rushers (five backs and one quarterback) with his 77.0 average.

Ebell is the first freshman (true or redshirt) in school history to rush for at least 100 yards in six games (the old record was two by several players), all consecutive. He has set a new school freshman rushing record, breaking Eric Ball's old mark of 703 yards, set in 1985. He is on pace to become the first freshman since DeShaun Foster in 1998 to lead the team in rushing (Foster was a true freshman).

His streak of six straight 100 yards games was the second longest one-season streak in school history. Gaston Green did it seven times in 1986.

His 203 yards at Oregon State rank No. 2 on UCLA's freshman rushing list and his 160 yards versus Stanford rank fifth.

In the opener against Colorado State, Ebell rushed twice for nine yards and returned two punts for seven yards. At Oklahoma State, Ebell had two 16-yard punt returns. Against Colorado, he averaged 10.5 yards on two punt returns and carried twice (minus-five yards). At San Diego State, Ebell was the team's second-leading rusher with 44 yards, including one touchdown. He also returned a punt 53 yards, UCLA's longest in four years (77 by Ryan Roques at Washington) and averaged 18.6 yards on five returns.

RUNNING BACK — Junior Akil Harris and redshirt sophomore Manuel White both played key roles in UCLA's early-season offensive success.

Against Colorado State, Harris led the Bruins with 94 yards on 13 carries. His one-yard touchdown run with 9:52 remaining in the game, coupled with Chris Griffith's PAT, gave the Bruins the lead for good, 14-13. With 1:32 remaining and the Bruins leading 23-19, he broke a 35-yard run to set up the Bruins' final touchdown of the night.

At Oklahoma State, he again led the Bruins with 83 yards on 17 attempts. On UCLA's final touchdown drive of the night, he had a 34-yard run that gave the Bruins a first-and-goal at the six-yard line. At Arizona, he rushed for 52 yards on eight carries, including one run of 21 yards. He added five yards on two carries versus USC.

In 12 games, Harris has run for 323 yards, third on the squad, and three touchdowns.

start versus Oregon. In the season-finale against Arizona State, he ran for a career-high 138 yards. He finished the season as the team's second-leading rusher with 375 yards (4.9 average) and three touchdowns on 76 attempts.

In 2000, Harris ran for 100 yards versus Arizona State. On just the second carry of his career, he went around right end for a 23-yard touchdown.

White, a big, tough back with speed, is playing both fullback and tailback for the Bruins and is very valuable, especially in one-back formations. Against Colorado State, he scored twice in the fourth quarter on 16-yard runs to clinch the Bruin victory. On the night, he rushed for 52 yards and two scores on 11 carries and also tied for the team lead with four receptions (27 yards).

At Oklahoma State, he ran for 67 yards on 17 carries and also made two receptions for 40 yards. In the Colorado game, he led the Bruins with 36 yards on six attempts and also made one reception for 11 yards. At San Diego State, he gained 76 yards on 14 attempts and his 30-yard run was the longest of his career.

At Oregon State, he started in UCLA's one-back formation and gained seven yards on five attempts before suffering a strained left hamstring midway through the first quarter. He also made one catch for 28 yards prior to his injury.

White did not suit up against Oregon, California, Stanford or Washington due to the injury. He returned to action at Arizona, seeing time at both fullback and tailback, and rushed for 27 yards and one touchdown on eight attempts.

Against USC, White scored two touchdowns while showing his versatility. He rushed for 45 yards, including a seven-yard touchdown, on seven carries. He also made five receptions, tying Craig Bragg for the team lead, for 56 yards, including a 10-yard touchdown.

Against Washington State, he led the Bruins with 48 yards on eight carries. He also made two receptions for 58 yards, including a 55-yard touchdown.

On the year, he ranks second on the team with 358 yards on 76 attempts (4.7 average) and is fourth on the squad with 15 receptions for 220 yards and two touchdowns.

In 2001, White ranked third on the team in rushing with 290 yards on 63 attempts after making his debut against Alabama. Against Oregon, he carried seven times for 29 yards,

including his first career touchdown, a one-yard run. At USC, he made the first start of his career.

MORE RUNNING BACKS — In addition to Ebell, two other redshirt freshmen tailbacks and one true freshman fullback have made contributions this season. Against Colorado State, Wendell Mathis carried on three of the first four plays on UCLA's go-ahead scoring drive, gaining five, seven and three yards. He finished with 15 yards on four carries. Jason Harrison and fullback J.D. Groves also played on offense although they did not carry the ball.

At Oklahoma State, Harrison carried once and made one reception, Mathis carried twice for seven yards and Groves saw action at fullback. All also played on special teams.

In the Colorado game, Harrison caught one pass for 17 yards and carried once for five yards. Groves also played at fullback. Sophomore Pat Norton also made his season debut at fullback.

At San Diego State, Harrison gained 25 yards on five attempts, Mathis had 22 yards on eight carries and Groves had the first carry of his career (six yards). At Oregon State, Harrison had an eight-yard reception and a 17-yard kickoff return, Mathis carried once for one yard and Groves saw extensive action at fullback. Against Oregon, Harrison caught a pass for eight yards, Groves saw action at fullback and Mathis and Norton played on special teams. At California, Harrison had a catch-and-run for 28 yards and Groves played at fullback. Against Stanford, Harrison returned a kickoff 46 yards and Groves played at fullback. At Washington, Harrison ran once for nine yards and made one reception and Groves played at fullback.

At Arizona, Norton rushed for 12 yards on two attempts, Groves had eight yards on two tries, Harrison had seven yards on two attempts and Mathis had six yards on three attempts. Against USC and WSU, they all saw limited action.

RED ZONE — In the opener against Colorado State, UCLA entered the Red Zone five times and scored three rushing touchdowns for 21 points. The other two possessions ended

with a missed field goal and the end of the game (UCLA knelt on the final play).

Against Oklahoma State, UCLA entered the Red Zone three times and scored 10 points (one rushing touchdown and one field goal). The other possession ended with UCLA on OSU's 15-yard line at game's end.

Against Colorado, UCLA scored one passing touchdown and one field goal on its two trips into the Red Zone.

At San Diego State, the Bruins scored 24 points with three touchdowns (two running, one passing) and one field goal on five trips into the Red Zone. The other opportunity ended with UCLA at the Aztec 17-yard line at game's end.

At Oregon State, UCLA reached the Red Zone six times and scored four times for 24 points (three rushing touchdowns and one field goal). The other trips ended with a blocked field goal and on downs.

Against Oregon, UCLA scored three points (one field goal) on its only Red Zone trip.

At California, UCLA scored seven points (one rushing touchdown) on four Red Zone trips. The others ended in a fumble lost, a fumble recovered by UCLA on fourth down and a blocked field goal.

Against Stanford, UCLA scored 18 points (one rushing touchdown and four field goals) on five Red Zone trips.

At Washington, UCLA scored 27 points (three rushing touchdowns and two field goals) on five Red Zone trips.

At Arizona, UCLA scored on all three trips to the Red Zone - two rushing touchdowns and one field goal -- for 17 points.

Against USC, UCLA scored three touchdowns (one rushing, two passing) on its three Red Zone trips.

UCLA did not run a Red Zone play against Washington State.

In 12 games, UCLA has scored 33 times (17 rushing touchdowns, four passing touchdowns and 12 field goals) in 42 Red Zone trips (182 points). Three other possessions ended at the final gun, three with missed field goals, two on downs and one on a fumble lost.

In its last five games (3-2), UCLA is 16 for 16 in the Red Zone with nine touchdowns and seven field goals. Drew Olson is 11/11 in Red Zone opportunities this year and Matt Moore is 7/7.

Colorado State reached the Red Zone five times and produced four scores -- two touchdowns (one running, one passing) and two field goals for 19 points. The other possession ended with a Bruin interception. Oklahoma State reached the Red Zone six times and scored on four occasions (two rushing touchdowns, one passing touchdown and one field goal) for 24 points. The other trips ended with a fumble and an interception.

Colorado entered the Red Zone six times and tallied 28 points on five scores (three touchdown runs, (one two-point conversion) and two field goals).

San Diego State entered the Red Zone just once and scored seven points (one passing touchdown).

Oregon State scored two passing touchdowns (14 points) on three Red Zone trips (the other ended on downs).

Oregon scored one passing touchdown (seven points) on its only Red Zone trip.

California scored one rushing touchdown and one field goal (10 points) on its two Red Zone trips.

Stanford scored one touchdown (eight points) in four Red Zone attempts. The other trips ended in two missed field goals (one blocked) and on downs.

Washington scored two touchdowns and one field goal (17 points) on its three Red Zone attempts.

Arizona's only Red Zone trip ended in a blocked field goal.

USC scored three touchdowns (two passing, one rushing) and one field goal on its four Red Zone trips.

WSU scored two touchdowns and two field goals (20 points) on seven Red Zone trips.

In 12 games, UCLA's opponents have scored 31 times (21 touchdowns, one two-point conversion and 10 field goals) on 43 Red Zone trips (178 points). The other possessions ended with two interceptions, one fumble, five missed field goals (three blocked) and on downs (three times).

In the last five games (3-2), UCLA has allowed eight touchdowns and four field goals on 19 Red Zone attempts.

In 2001, UCLA scored 26 times (19 touchdowns -- 17 rushing and two passing -- and seven field goals) for 154 points on 35 tries. Opponents scored 20 times (14 touchdowns - seven rushing and seven passing -- and six field goals) for 116 points on 31 tries.

TURNOVERS — In the opener against Colorado State, UCLA forced two turnovers (one interception and one fumble) and converted them into seven points (one touchdown). UCLA committed just one turnover (interception) and it resulted in three points (one field goal).

Against Oklahoma State, UCLA forced five turnovers (four interceptions and one fumble) and converted two into touchdowns, including Spencer Havner's score with an interception, for 14 points. UCLA committed just one turnover (interception) and it was converted into a touchdown (seven points).

In the Colorado game, UCLA did not force any turnovers. The Bruins committed one turnover (interception) and it was converted into a touchdown (eight points).

At San Diego State, UCLA forced five turnovers (three fumbles and two interceptions) and converted them into 14 points (two touchdowns). Two other turnovers came just before halftime and game's end. UCLA did not commit a turnover.

At Oregon State, UCLA forced two turnovers (interceptions) and returned one for a touchdown (seven points). The other resulted in a fumble lost. UCLA lost two fumbles -- one on offense -- and it was returned for a touchdown (seven points).

Against Oregon, UCLA did not force a turnover. The Bruins committed three turnovers (all interceptions) and one led to a field goal (three points).

At California, the Bruins did not force a turnover. UCLA committed three turnovers (two fumbles, one interception) and both fumbles led to touchdowns.

Against Stanford, UCLA forced one turnover (interception by Ricky Manning) which was converted into a field goal. UCLA lost two fumbles (one on a punt return and one on

a bad snap) and both were converted into touchdowns (15 points).

At Washington UCLA forced four interceptions and converted them into two touchdowns and one field goal. One of the TDs was a 42-yard return by Spencer Havner. The Bruins did not commit a turnover.

At Arizona, UCLA forced one fumble and converted it into a touchdown. UCLA lost one fumble but it led to a punt.

Against USC, the Bruins did not force a turnover. The Bruins committed five turnovers which USC converted into 17 points (two touchdowns and one field goal).

Against Washington State, UCLA had two interceptions and converted one into a touchdown (seven points). The Bruins committed three turnovers (two interceptions and one fumble) and they were converted into 10 points (one touchdown and one field goal).

In 12 games, UCLA has forced 22 turnovers (16 interceptions and six fumbles) and has converted them into 10 touchdowns and two field goals (76 points).

In UCLA's seven wins, the Bruins are +12 in turnover margin. In the five losses, they are -12.

UCLA has committed 22 turnovers (10 interceptions and 12 fumbles) that have been converted into 84 points (10 touchdowns, one two-point PAT and four field goals). UCLA has fumbled 30 times but has lost just 12 -- eight on offense, three on special teams and one on defense.

Last season, UCLA committed 29 turnovers in 11 games and has just 19 after 11 games in 2002.

GAME SUMMARIES

Game 1 — September 7, 2002 at Rose Bowl UCLA 30 , #19 Colorado State 19

PASADENA — UCLA rallied from a 13-7 fourth-quarter deficit to defeat No. 19 Colorado State, 30-19 at the Rose Bowl. It was UCLA's eighth straight regular-season victory over a non-conference foe and the Bruins' ninth win over a ranked opponent in 14 tries.

The Bruins trailed 10-0 early in the second quarter, thanks to a 35-yard field goal and a 15-yard touchdown drive set up by a 55-yard punt return. UCLA produced a four-play, 80-yard drive that culminated in Junior Taylor's 49-yard touchdown run on a reverse. It was the first time Taylor had touched the ball in his career and was the first offensive touchdown by a Bruin true freshman since the 1998 USC game, when DeShaun Foster scored four times.

UCLA still trailed 13-7 early in the fourth quarter when it took over on its own 48-yard line with 14:42 remaining in the game. With true freshman quarterback Drew Olson playing the second of his two series and redshirt freshman Wendell Mathis in the backfield, UCLA moved to the 28-yard line. Mathis gained 15 yards on three carries. Olson then completed passes on two of the next three plays to put the ball at the five-yard line. Akil Harris then scored a one-yard touchdown following his four-yard run to give the Bruins a 14-13 lead.

On Colorado State's second play of its ensuing possession, Ricky Manning's hit on Cecil Sapp after a short pass reception forced a fumble that Rusty Williams recovered at the Ram 16-yard line. White raced into the end zone on UCLA's next play to give the Bruins a 21-13 lead with 8:48 remaining.

CSU then drove 80 yards for a touchdown to close to within two points, 21-19, with 1:32 remaining. On the ensuing two-point conversion attempt, Brandon Chillar forced a fumble and Ben Emanuel picked it up and ran 89 yards for two points to give UCLA a 23-19 lead.

The Bruins then recovered an onside kick attempt (Mike Seidman). On the next play, Akil Harris broke a 35-yard run to the Ram 16-yard line and three plays later, White scored his second 16-yard touchdown of the game to give UCLA a 30-19 lead with 1:01 remaining.

On the night, the Bruins ran for 215 yards and passed for 166. Harris led the team with 94 yards and one touchdown on 13 carries. White added 52 yards and two touchdowns on 11 attempts and also made four receptions. Quarterback Cory Paus completed 12 of 23 passes, including nine of his final 13, for 142 yards and led three of the Bruins' four scoring drives. Olson completed two of three passes for 24 yards and produced one scoring drive on his two possessions.

Defensively, the Bruins held Colorado State to just 3.7 yards per play and 277 total offensive yards. Only one of the Rams' four scoring drives was longer than 25 yards.

Brandon Chillar led the Bruins with 10 tackles, made an interception and forced the fumble on the Rams' two-point conversion attempt. Marcus Reese, making the first start of his career, made nine tackles while Ben Emanuel made six tackles and scored the first defensive conversion in school history with his 89-yard return.

Ricky Manning Jr., Spencer Havner, playing his first game and making his first start, and Ryan Boschetti, playing his first game, each made five tackles.

STILLWATER, OK— UCLA rallied from a 10-0 first-quarter deficit to defeat the Oklahoma State Cowboys, 38-24, at Stillwater. It was the Bruins ninth straight non-conference regular-season win and ran Bob Toledo's record versus the Big 12 to 5-0 as UCLA's head coach. After spotting the home team a 10-0 lead, the Bruins scored 31 consecutive points to build a 31-10 lead just 2:20 into the second half.

Following a Cowboy field goal, UCLA drove 80 yards for a score on a 41-yard pass from Cory Paus to Craig Bragg. On OSU's next series, linebacker Spencer Havner picked off a pass and returned it 23 yards to give the Bruins a lead they would never relinquish, 14-10. Chris Griffith gave UCLA a 17-10 lead with a 33-yard field goal and with 2:28 remaining in the first half, Paus and Mike Seidman connected on a 27-yard touchdown and a 24-10 halftime lead.

On the first possession of the second half, UCLA's defense held the Cowboys to one yard and Tyler Ebell's 16-yard punt return gave the Bruins the ball on the OSU 47. After a running play was stopped for no gain, Paus hit Bragg for 22 yards, followed by a 25-yard scoring strike to Ryan Smith for a 31-10 lead.

On the afternoon, UCLA accounted for 466 yards of total offense - 277 in the air and 189 on the ground. Oklahoma

State had 444 yards - 350 in the air but just 94 on the ground. The Bruin defense forced five turnovers - four interceptions and one fumble - while the Bruin offense had just one turnover - an interception on Paus' first pass of the day when the receiver slipped.

On the night, Paus threw for 277 yards and three touchdowns, one shy of his career best of four set in a triple overtime loss at California in 2000. He averaged over 21 yards per completion and also ran for a three-yard touchdown.

Akil Harris led the Bruins with 83 yards rushing (4.9 average) while Manuel White added 67 yards on the ground and 40 more on two receptions. Craig Bragg made three receptions for 89 yards and one touchdown (41 yards) and added 35 yards on two reverses. Tab Perry also made three receptions for 77 yards and had a 34-yard kickoff return. Ryan Smith and Mike Seidman both made touchdown receptions and the offensive line allowed Paus time to pass (one sack) and helped the Bruins average 4.3 yards per carry (189 yards).

Defensively, Spencer Havner tied for the team lead with eight tackles, scored the first touchcown of his career on a 23-yard interception return and forced a fumble. Ricky Manning also made eight tackles while Ben Emanuel added six solo tackles and two interceptions. Matt Ware accounted for the team's fourth interception and Dave Ball made a key fumble recovery.

Game 3 — September 21, 2002 at Rose Bowl Colorado 31, #20 UCLA 17

PASADENA — UCLA suffered its first loss of the season, dropping a 31-17 decision to Colorado at the Rose Bowl. The loss ended Bob Toledo's streak of nine consecutive victories over non-conference regular-season opponents and also marked his first loss to a Big-12 opponent during his tenure at UCLA. Ranked as high as No. 6 in pre-season polls, Colorado did not commit a turnover and accounted for 471 yards, including 325 on the ground, the most rushing yards allowed by the Bruins since the 2000 Washington contest.

UCLA took a 7-0 lead on the first play of the second quarter when wide receiver Jon Dubravac, a Colorado native, tossed a 33-yard touchdown pass to Craig Bragg on a reverse pass. Colorado tied the game less than a minute and a half later on the first of Chris Brown's three touchdown runs (19 yards) and took the lead with 23 seconds left in the half on a 29-yard field goal. Tab Perry's 35-yard kickoff return and two pass completions put the ball at the Buff 38-yard line with two seconds left but Nate Fikse's 55-yard field goal attempt, the first of his career, to tie the game was wide right.

In the second half, Colorado scored on each of its first four possessions (two touchdowns and two field goals) to take a 31-10 lead with 9:16 remaining in the contest. Brown finished the day with 188 yards and three rushing touchdowns.

UCLA passed for 222 yards but could only net 62 yards rushing on 28 attempts. Cory Paus completed 21 of 35 passes for 189 yards and one score and Craig Bragg made seven receptions for 70 yards and both Bruin touchdowns. Manuel White led the Bruins with 36 yards on the ground.

Defensively, Marcus Reese led the Bruins with a career-high 13 tackles. Matt Ware made a career-high 10 stops, Ben Emanuel made a career-high eight stops, including one for loss, and Spencer Havner added seven tackles.

Game 4 — September 28, 2002 at San Diego, CA UCLA 43, San Diego State 7

SAN DIEGO, CA — UCLA took control early and defeated San Diego State, 43-7, at Qualcomm Stadium to improve its record to 3-1 entering Pac-10 play at Oregon State.

UCLA forced five Aztec turnovers (two interceptions and three fumbles), held SDSU to 268 total yards, including just 208 in the air (SDSU entered the game averaging over 400 yards passing) and played efficiently on offense and special teams.

UCLA took a 7-0 first quarter lead when Marcus Reese intercepted a deflected pass at the Aztec six-yard line. Two plays later, Manuel White scored from the four-yard line. The Bruins increased the lead to 14-0 on the first play of the second quarter. Matt Clark blocked an Aztec punt and Jibril Raymo recovered the ball in the end zone for the second touchdown of his career (both on blocked punts).

On UCLA's next possession, Cory Paus hit Craig Bragg streaking down the right sideline for a 37-yard touchdown on third-and-28 to give the Bruins a 21-0 lead just 4:19 into the second quarter. On SDSU's next possession, a snap from punt formation went through the end zone for UCLA's first safety since 1997, giving the Bruins a 23-0 lead.

The Aztecs then mounted their only scoring drive of the day to make the score 23-7 but Paus responded with a 64-yard strike down the middle of the field to tight end Mike Seidman and Chris Griffith added a 33-yard field goal to build the lead to 33-7 at the half. Griffith's 46-yard field goal and a two-yard touchdown run by Tyler Ebell were the only scores of the second half.

Defensively, UCLA held the Aztecs to three of 15 on third-down conversions and zero for two on fourth down. SDSU netted just 68 yards on the ground to go with 208 yards in the air.

Spencer Havner led the defense with 10 tackles (nine solos), including two quarterback sacks. Matt Ware, playing cornerback instead of safety for the first time this year, had seven tackles, including one sack.

Offensively, UCLA passed for 238 yards, ran for 153 and did not commit a turnover. Paus completed 12 of 21 passes for 216 yards and two touchdowns with no interceptions.

Seidman set career highs with six receptions for 134 yards and his 64-yard catch-and-run was the longest play of his career. On the ground, Manuel White led the Bruins with a season-high 76 yards and one touchdown on 14 attempts.

On special teams, Ebell averaged 18.6 yards on five punt returns. His 53-yard return in the third quarter was UCLA's longest since the 1998 Washington game, when Ryan Roques scored on a 77-yard return. The Bruins blocked a punt (Matt Clark) and scored on the recovery (Jibril Raymo), Chris Griffith made two field goals and five PATs and Nate Fikse had just three of his punts returned for 20 yards.

Game 5 — October 5, 2002 at Corvallis, OR UCLA 43, Oregon State 35

CORVALLIS, OR — UCLA rallied from an early 14-0 deficit by scoring 29 consecutive points to defeat Oregon State, 43-35.

On the first scrimmage play of the game, OSU back Steven Jackson raced 80 yards for a touchdown. UCLA's first drive bogged down at the 10-yard line but the Beavers blocked Chris Griffith's 27-yard field goal attempt and returned it 83 yards for a 14-0 lead just 5:23 into the game.

UCLA's defense shut out the Beavers for the rest of the half, holding them to 89 net yards and producing a safety. Cory Paus completed 15 of 21 passes for 214 yards, including a 24-yard touchdown pass to Mike Seidman, and UCLA trailed just 14-12 at the half.

UCLA took the lead for good, 19-14, on the first possession of the second half on a five-yard run by Tyler Ebell. Paus completed all four of his attempts for 65 yards, including one for 41 yards to Tab Perry during the drive.

On Oregon State's first possession, Ricky Manning made his second interception of the year, returning it 33 yards for his first career touchdown and a 26-14 lead.

OSU scored first when it held UCLA on fourth-and-one at the Beaver 49-yard line. The Bruins actually forced a punt, but an offside call gave OSU a fourth-and-one which it converted and scored four plays later.

GAME SUMMARIES

Ebell gave UCLA some breathing room, with a 73-yard run to the one-yard line. Akil Harris scored on the next play for a 36-21 lead with 10:05 remaining.

OSU went 75 yards on five plays for a touchdown, but UCLA countered with an 80-yard, six play drive, to take a 43-28 lead with 4:39 remaining.

After an OSU possession, Harris fumbled on third-and-nine at the Bruin 19 and the Beavers returned it for a touchdown to draw within eight points, 43-35. Perry recovered OSU's onside kick attempt. After two Ebell runs, UCLA ran out the clock for the win.

Offensively, UCLA piled up 625 yards, the ninth-best total in school history and the No. 2 effort during Bob Toledo's tenure as head coach.

Paus enjoyed the best game of his career, completing 24 of 32 passes for a career-high 378 yards and one touchdown. Mike Seidman (eight catches for 138 yards) and Tab Perry (seven receptions for 145 yards) each set career highs in both categories.

Redshirt freshman tailback Tyler Ebell came off the bench to rush for 203 yards in the final three quarters. His 203 yards are the second-most ever by a Bruin freshman and his 73-yard run was the second-longest by a Bruin freshman.

Defensively, UCLA forced two turnovers and converted one into a touchdown. Brandon Chillar and Marcus Reese led the Bruins with six tackles.

Game 6 — October 12, 2002 at Rose Bowl #7 Oregon 31, #25 UCLA 30

PASADENA — UCLA took an early lead, trailed by three points at halftime, rallied to take a six-point lead in the third quarter but could not score in the final quarter of a 31-30 loss to No. 7 Oregon.

UCLA scored on its first offensive play when Cory Paus found Tab Perry for a 55-yard touchdown. With 51 seconds remaining in the first quarter, UCLA snapped a 7-7 tie with a trick play. Wide receiver Jon Dubravac lined up in the backfield, took a direct snap and launched a 53-yard strike to Craig Bragg for a 14-7 lead.

With Oregon leading 21-14 in the second quarter, Paus found Bragg up the right sideline and he raced the rest of the way for a 71-yard touchdown, UCLA's longest pass play since 2000. However, Oregon finished the half with a 59-yard field goal, the longest ever by a Bruin opponent and tied for the longest in Pac-10 history in a league game, for a 24-21 lead.

UCLA tied the game early in the third quarter on Chris Griffith's 37-yard field goal. The Bruins moved ahead with 7:28 left in the quarter when, on third down, Bragg made a one-hand catch on an inside screen and raced up the middle for a 46-yard touchdown. However, Griffith's PAT was blocked, a play that would prove costly.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, quarterback Jason Fife found Keenan Howry behind the Bruin defense and Howry raced 74 yards for the seventh touchdown of the day measuring at least 45 yards. Jared Siegel's PAT gave the Ducks a 31-30 lead.

The Bruins had the ball twice in the fourth quarter but could not score on either possession. On the first, they drove to the Oregon 27 but had to punt from the 35-yard line after two plays gained zero yards and a penalty. On the second, UCLA drove to the Oregon 25-yard line with just under three minutes remaining. Two negative plays and an incomplete pass left UCLA on the Duck 29-yard line with fourth and 14. Chris Griffith's 46-yard field goal attempt was wide left and the Ducks took over with 1:54 and ran out the clock.

Offensively, UCLA accounted for 477 yards, averaging 7.1 yards per play. Paus completed 17 of 31 passes for 316 yards, three touchdowns and three interceptions.

Bragg had one of the best days in school history for a receiver with nine receptions for 230 yards and three scores. His 230 yards rank No. 2 in school history, his nine receptions tie for eighth on that list and his three touchdown receptions were the most by a Bruin since 1993.

Perry tied his career high with seven receptions and for the second straight week, broke 100 yards receiving (126). Tailback Tyler Ebell, making his first career start, rushed for 119 yards on 26 carries.

Game 7 — October 19, 2002 at Berkeley California 17, UCLA 12

BERKELEY, CA — UCLA's offense lost its top two quarterbacks in the third quarter and could not recover in a 17-12 loss to California in Berkeley.

Four-year starting quarterback Cory Paus suffered a fractured right ankle on UCLA's first possession of the second half. Paus completed a 28-yard pass to Craig Bragg but was rolled from behind, pinning his ankle underneath the would-be tackler.

The completed pass put the ball at the 20-yard line and two Tyler Ebell runs, including an 11-yard touchdown run, completed an 81-yard drive to tie the score at 10-10.

Later in the third quarter, it looked like the Bruins had taken a 17-10 lead when backup quarterback Drew Olson stepped away from the rush and connected with tight end Mike Seidman for a 49-yard touchdown. However, the play was wiped out by a holding call and UCLA had to punt a couple of plays later. However, on the play before the punt, Olson was hit

while throwing and suffered a strained right shoulder, sending him to the sidelines for the rest of the game.

UCLA was unable to generate a first down in the fourth quarter (its only first down was by penalty). Redshirt freshman John Sciarra, whose previous experience consisted of one series at San Diego State, was under constant pressure and his inexperience showed. On his first series, he was sacked and fumbled. California recovered the ball at the Bruin 25-yard line and scored what proved to be the winning touchdown six plays later.

UCLA's special teams and defense excelled in the final quarter. The Bruins blocked two Golden Bear punts, recovering at the Cal three- and 20-yard lines, but were unable to generate any points (they had a 21-yard field goal blocked at the end of the possession following the first block). Defensively, UCLA allowed Cal just one first down and 13 yards on its final four possessions (excluding the minus-38 yards on the final play of the game for a safety).

On the day, UCLA held California to just 173 net yards, including 133 in the air and 40 on the ground. Even without the safety, the defense allowed just 211 yards. Spencer Havner led the way with 11 solo tackles, including one for loss, while Ben Emanuel (all solos) and Marcus Reese (six solos) added seven tackles each and Brandon Chillar made six tackles, including one for loss. Dave Ball recorded two sacks, giving him at least one in each of the last five games. On special teams, Reese and Matt Ware each blocked a punt and Garrett Lepisto and Matt Clark each had a recovery.

Offensively, UCLA had 226 yards -- 197 in the air and 29 on the ground. Paus passed for 129 yards prior to his injury and Olson completed five of seven attempts for 58 yards before he was sidelined. Sciarra was one of seven for 10 yards with one interception.

Craig Bragg broke the 100-yard barrier for the second straight week, finishing with 113 yards on seven receptions, and Mike Seidman added four receptions. Tyler Ebell rushed for 102 net yards to give him at least 100 yards in each of the last three games.

Game 8 — October 26, 2001 at Rose Bowl UCLA 28, Stanford 18

PASADENA — UCLA rallied from a 15-0 deficit just 4:34 into the game to defeat the Stanford Cardinal, 28-18, at the Rose Bowl. It was the fourth time in 2002 that UCLA had trailed at least 10-0 and rallied for the victory.

Stanford scored on a 28-yard drive after recovering a fumbled punt. On the PAT, it converted a bad snap into a pass for two points and an 8-0 lead. On UCLA's first series, a bad snap was recovered by the Cardinal for a touchdown and a 15-0 lead with 10:26 remaining in the first quarter.

True freshman quarterback Matt Moore, starting in the first game of his career, drove the Bruins for a field goal on the ensuing possession. The next time UCLA had the ball, following Ben Emanuel's block of a 36-yard field goal attempt, it drove 80 yards for a touchdown, the final 22 yards coming on Moore's 22-yard strike to Mike Seidman. The teams each scored a field goal later in the second quarter to give Stanford an 18-13 halftime lead.

The Bruins drew to within two points, 18-16, on Nate Fikse's third-quarter field goal and took the lead for good early in the final quarter. Taking over on the Cardinal 40-yard line following a six-yard punt return by Tyler Ebell, UCLA scored on an 18-yard run by Ebell to take a 22-18 lead.

On Stanford's next possession, Ricky Manning made his third interception of the year to give UCLA the ball at the Cardinal 27-yard line. One first down later, Fikse kicked his fourth field goal of the afternoon.

The defense made another big play on Stanford's next possession. The Cardinal went for a first down on fourth-and-one at its own 29-yard line but Kevin Brant and Ryan Boschetti prevented the conversion, giving UCLA the ball. Fikse added his fifth field goal of the day, from 44 yards, for the final margin.

UCLA's allowed just one touchdown on a 28-yard drive, one field goal and 241 net yards. The 75 passing yards by the Cardinal was the lowest by a Bruin opponent since the 2001 Ohio State contest (45).

Marcus Reese led the way with 12 tackles. Brandon Chillar made 11 tackles, including two sacks, and Spencer Havner also made 11 stops, including two for losses. Dave Ball was credited with six tackles, including a sack for the sixth straight week.

Offensively, Ebell was the story of the game. The redshirt freshman rushed for 160 yards on 39 carries, three attempts shy of the school record. It marked the fourth straight game in which he has broken the 100-yard barrier.

Moore became the first Bruin true freshman to win his first start at quarterback since Tom Ramsey did it against Oregon in 1979. He completed seven of 19 passes for 142 yards, including the 22-yard touchdown to Seidman, without an

interception. He also threw passes of 49 and 38 yards to Tab Perry, who led the team with his 87 receiving yards.

Fikse made his debut as the team's regular field goal kicker and became the first Bruin since Chris Sailer in 1998 (Washington) to kick five field goals in a game, tying the Pac-10 record for a conference game.

Game 9 — November 2, 2002 at Seattle, WA UCLA 34, Washington 24

SEATTLE — UCLA rallied from a 7-3 first-quarter deficit, built a 24-14 halftime lead and made the plays necessary to preserve a 34-24 victory over Washington in Seattle.

For the second consecutive week, UCLA started a true freshman at quarterback and for the second straight week, the Bruin offense did not commit a turnover. Conversely, the Bruin defense forced four turnovers and converted them into 17 points.

UCLA scored first, thanks to a 48-yard punt return by Craig Bragg that gave the Bruins possession on the Husky 36-yard line. After two false starts, Junior Taylor's 38-yard run set up a 26-yard field goal by Nate Fikse.

Later in the quarter, Washington took a 7-3 lead but UCLA responded with a nine-play, 80-yard drive that featured three completions by Drew Olson and six runs by Tyler Ebell, the final one from one-yard out to give UCLA a lead it would never relinquish.

GAME SUMMARIES

On the first play of the second quarter, Spencer Havner deflected a Cody Pickett pass and Marcus Reese picked it off and returned it 29 yards to the one-yard line. Two plays later, Ebell made the score 17-7. The Huskies moved to within three points but later in the quarter, UCLA mounted another 80-yard drive, culminating in Ebell's third one-yard touchdown of the day and a 24-14 halftime lead.

In the second half, UCLA built its lead to 27-14 with Fikse's 23-yard field goal just 3:57 into the third quarter. The Husky's scored 10 points early in the fourth quarter, closing to three points (27-24) with 8:36 remaining in the game, but could get no closer. With 1:17 remaining, Havner picked off Pickett's fourth-and-five pass and returned it 42 yards for the clinching score.

Defensively, UCLA allowed 498 yards on 92 snaps, but allowed just 69 net yards on the ground. Havner, Reese and Ben Emanuel all had nine tackles and the Bruins benefited from interceptions by Havner, Reese, Ricky Manning (his fourth of the year) and Jarrad Page, who also made a career-high eight tackles. Dave Ball recorded three sacks among his five tackles to give him 10 on the year.

Offensively, Ebell became the first Bruin since 1997 to record five straight games of at least 100 rushing yards, finishing with 102 and setting a school freshman season record with 734 yards. He also scored three one-yard touchdowns. Olson, making his first career start, completed 13 of 27 passes for 189 yards with no interceptions. Five of those completions went to Mike Seidman (96 yards) and four were caught by Tab Perry (64 yards).

Game 10 — November 9, 2002 at Tucson, AZ UCLA 37, Arizona 7

TUCSON — UCLA scored the first two times it had the ball to build a 17-0 lead, saw Arizona close to within 17-7 and then scored the final 20 points of the game en route to a 37-7 victory over the Wildcats at Tucson.

The Bruins, led by quarterback Drew Olson marched 80 yards on its first possession, scoring on Tyler Ebell's tackle-breaking, direction changing 22-yard run. On their next possession, they increased their lead to 10-0 on the first of Nate Fikse's three field goals.

With Matt Moore at the helm, UCLA increased the lead to 17-0 on Ebell's 19-yard run on fourth-and-one. On the previous play, Moore, facing a third-and-41, hit Tab Perry for a 40-yard gain, setting up the touchdown play.

Arizona scored its only points of the night when Nic Costa scrambled out of the end zone and hit Andre Thurman behind the Bruin defense for a 92-yard touchdown. However, the Bruins countered with a 51-yard field goal for a 20-7 lead.

On the first play of the first Bruin possession of the second half, Olson hit Bragg on a flanker screen and the sophomore eluded at least three would-be tacklers on his way to a 33-yard touchdown. Manuel White's one-yard run and Fikse's field goal nine seconds into the fourth quarter ended the scoring.

Defensively, UCLA held the Wildcats to 249 yards and just nine first downs. Excluding the 92-yard touchdown play, UCLA allowed just 157 yards. Arizona's 12 net yards rushing, thanks in part to six Bruin sacks, were the lowest by a Bruin opponent since the 2001 Washington game (minus-eight).

Spencer Havner led the team with nine tackles (six solos), including one for loss, and he also forced a fumble. Brandon Chillar accounted for seven tackles (three solos), including one for loss, and also blocked a field goal. Marcus Reese made four solo tackles, including two sacks and a third for loss. Ben Emanuel also made three tackles (one solo) and recovered a fumble.

Offensively, UCLA gained 242 yards on the ground and 201 in the air. The Bruin did not attempt a pass after the 14:51 mark of the fourth quarter.

The Bruins' two true freshman quarterbacks completed 13 of 20 passes for 201 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions. Olson, starting his second straight game, hit on seven of 12 passes for 111 yards and a 33-yard touchdown. Moore, who entered the game late in the first quarter and played the rest of the half, completed six of eight passes for 90 yards.

Ebell broke the 100-yard barrier for the sixth straight week, finishing with 124 yards and two touchdowns on 22 attempts. On his third carry of the game, he broke tackles and changed direction before bursting into the end zone for a 22 yard score. His second came from the 19-yard line on a fourth and-one. Only Gaston Green (seven in 1986) has ever rushed

for 100 yards in more consecutive games in one season than Ebell.

Perry, Bragg and Mike Seidman all made three receptions. Perry accounted for 89 yards while Bragg had 64 and a touchdown.

Game 11 — November 23, 2002 at Rose Bowl #7 USC 52, #25 UCLA 21

PASADENA — UCLA fell behind early and could never catch up, dropping a 52-21 decision to USC at the Rose Bowl.

The Bruins, who had committed just 14 turnovers in the season's first 10 games, lost four fumbles and threw their first interception since Oct. 19 and could not overcome those mistakes against a veteran Trojan team. UCLA fumbled the opening kickoff and USC scored on the next play. Trailing 14-0, UCLA suffered a bad snap in punt formation, resulting in a 34-yard loss. USC took over at the Bruin 23-yard line and scored two plays later for a 21-0 lead.

In the second quarter, the Bruins found the end zone for the first time on a seven-yard run from Manuel White. Trailing 21-7, UCLA took over at its own five-yard line. On the second play from scrimmage, center Mike McCloskey and quarterback Matt Moore missed on the snap. USC recovered and scored with 3:56 remaining in the half for a 28-7 lead.

USC scored on its first possession of the second half to build a 35-7 lead and it was too much for UCLA to overcome.

On the afternoon, the Bruins passed for 250 yards but netted just 40 on the ground, thanks to the bad snap and five sacks. Tyler Ebell led the ground game with 56 yards on 12 attempts and Manuel White added 45 on seven tries.

Drew Olson, just the third UCLA true freshman quarterback to start this game (Tom Ramsey and Cade McNown were the others), completed eight of 17 passes for 121 yards but threw his first interception of the year. Matt Moore completed seven of 11 passes for 64 yards and a 10-yard touchdown to White. John Sciarra completed four of five passes for 65 yards and a 14-yard touchdown to Mercedes Lewis. It was Lewis' first touchdown of his career.

Craig Bragg (five for 91 yards) and White (five for 56 yards) led the receivers and Tab Perry averaged 31.0 yards on four kickoff returns. His 49-yard return was UCLA's longest since the 1999 Stanford game.

Defensively, UCLA allowed 468 yards -- 271 in the air and 197 on the ground. However, three of USC's four first-half touchdown drives were less than 34 yards (34, 23 and 14).

Game 12 — December 7, 2002 at Rose Bowl #7 Washington State 48, UCLA 27

PASADENA — UCLA held a 14-7 lead in the first quarter, but Washington State countered with 24 consecutive points to defeat the Bruins, 48-27 at the Rose Bowl.

After receiving the opening kickoff, the Cougars scored on their second play from scrimmage to go up 7-0 with only 37 seconds expired. UCLA failed to move the ball on its next possession and punted after three plays. However, Ben Emanuel II intercepted a Jason Gesser pass on the next Cougar possession and returned it 41 yards for a touchdown. Still tied at 7-7, quarterback Drew Olson pitched to Jon Dubravac, who threw a 55-yard pass to Manuel White to put the Bruins ahead 14-7 with 7:33 remaining in the first quarter. The Cougars responded to tie the game at 14-14 heading into the second quarter.

Washington State scored on three of its four possessions in the second quarter to build a 31-14 lead with 48 seconds left in the first half. On the first play of the final UCLA possession of the half, Olson found Junior Taylor for a 39-yard touchdown to send the Bruins into the locker room trailing, 31-21.

In the third quarter, the Cougars struck first on a John Tippins run with 7:27 remaining in the period. UCLA matched the Washington State touchdown when Olson connected with tight end Mike Seidman for a 27-yard strike at the 3:37 mark.

The Bruins entered the final quarter trailing 38-27, but it would prove to be the closest that they would come. The Cougars scored ten unanswered points, including a 25-yard interception return for a touchdown, to clinch the victory.

Offensively, UCLA gained 307 total yards, including 254 in the air. The Bruins only rushed for 79 yards and were led by Manuel White with 48 yards on eight carries.

Olson completed 13 of 27 passes for 163 yards but threw two interceptions. Matt Moore completed four of eight passes for 36 yards. Dubravac's 55-yard touchdown pass to White was the third of his career, all of which have come this season (one vs. Colorado and one vs. Oregon).

Taylor (four for 86 yards) and Seidman (four for 68 yards) led the receivers. Seidman's 16-yard catch in the first quarter gave him the single season yardage record for UCLA tight ends and he finished the game with 631 yards.

Defensively, UCLA allowed 541 yards -- 321 in the air and 220 on the ground. Emanuel's two interceptions brought his total to four on the year, tied for the team lead with Ricky Manning. His interception return for a touchdown was the Bruins' fourth this season, the most by UCLA since 1987.
