



UCLA — The lynchpin of the Bruin offensive line ... One of the top centers in the nation (he was on the Rimington Watch List in 2004), UCLA is at its best when he is on the field ... Enters his senior season with 28 career starts, including 10 in 2004 ... He is equally adept at pass blocking and run blocking ... A second-team Freshman All-American, he started the first 18 games of his career before suffering a season-ending injury in the fifth game of 2003 against Washington.

2004 — Against Oklahoma State, he returned to the starting lineup for the first time since the fifth game of the 2003 season ... He played every snap of the first four games, but missed the Arizona game due to a sprained ankle suffered in practice ... He returned against Cal and played the entire contest ... He also went the distance against Arizona State and Stanford ... Did not play against Washington State due to headaches ... He returned to the lineup against Oregon's vaunted defensive line and helped the Bruins net 227 yards on the ground ... He also played every snap versus USC and Wyoming ... Played in 10 of 12 games (10 starts) and played at least 65 snaps eight times ... UCLA rushed for at least 200 yards in six of his 10 games ... McCloskey was a second-team All-Pac-10 selection in 2004 and one of the winners of UCLA's Jerry Long "Heart" Award.

2003 — Started the first five games of the season and played virtually every snap until his injury, including 75 snaps at Oklahoma and 71 versus San Diego State ... In the first quarter of the Washington game, he suffered a fractured left ankle and was sidelined for the remainder of the season.

2002 — Selected second-team Freshman All-America by The Sporting News for his fine play ... Starter in all 13 games ... Played virtually every snap and was on the field for at least 60 plays in each game ... Had six KO blocks at San Diego State ... Earned a blocking grade of 91% at Oregon State ... Led the team with a 91% mark at Cal ... Had a 91% grade in the game at Washington, which ranked second on the team ... Graded at 92% in the win at Arizona and made 11 KO blocks.

He played in the secondary and on special teams at Washington ... Playing in UCLA's nickel package against San Diego State, he made six tackles ... McNeal made one tackle and his first interception late in the game against Arizona ... Against Cal, he recovered a fumble on a kickoff that led to a Bruin touchdown ... At Arizona State, he had two tackles ... Against Stanford, he made three tackles ... McNeal made six tackles playing the nickel back against Washington State ... He added two tackles at Oregon ... Against USC, he made three tackles in the nickel package ... In the Las Vegas Bowl, he played extensively in the nickel package and made one tackle ... Named second-team All-State and second-team Daily Breeze all-area as a junior ... As a junior quarterback, he threw for 1,200 yards and nine touchdowns and ran for 432 yards on 41 attempts and six touchdowns ... UCLA — In just two seasons, Justin has established himself as one of the top place kickers in the nation and a candidate for post-season honors ... Entering his junior year, Medlock is already in seventh place (tied) on UCLA's career field goal list with 29 ... Medlock's career percentage of .744 is third among Bruins with at least 21 career field goals ... Ranks 16th on the school's career scoring list with 155 points ... Has also handled the kickoff chores for the past two seasons.

2004 — As a redshirt sophomore, Medlock was one of 20 semifinalists for the Lou Groza Award ... Selected first-team All-Pac-10 by the league's coaches ... Co-winner of UCLA's Tommy Prothro Award for Outstanding Special Teams Player ... On the year, he made 15 of 20 field goal attempts and 42 of 43 PATs ... Was the team's leading scorer with 87 points (7.25) and ranked second in the Pac-10 in field goal percentage (75.0), second in kick scoring (7.25), third in scoring (7.25) and fourth (20th in NCAA) in field goals (1.25) ... He became the first UCLA player to kick two field goals of at least 50 yards in the same game at Oregon ... He is also the first Bruin to kick three field goals of 50 or more yards in a season ... Only John Lee, with four, kicked more field goals of at least 50 yards in a career ... On Nov. 13 at Oregon, he converted two of three field goal attempts and all four PATs ... In the third quarter, he tied his career best with a 52-yard kick ... With 2:08 remaining in the game, he connected from 50 yards out to give the Bruins an eight-point lead (34-26) ... He was named Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week ... In the regular-season finale against USC, he made one of two field goals (made from 43, missed from 39) and all three PATs for six points ... In the Las Vegas Bowl, he made all three PAT attempts, but missed a fourth-quarter field goal attempt from 45 yards ... Against Oklahoma State in the season-opener, he kicked two field goals and made both PATs ... In the third quarter, he kicked a 52-yard field goal, the longest of his career to that point ... That kick tied for the fourth longest in school history and was the longest by a Bruin since 1997, when Chris Sailer kicked a school-record 56-yard field goal against Oregon ... Against Illinois, he was five of five on PATs, but did not attempt a field goal ... At Washington, his 20-yard field goal with 10:35 remaining in the game gave UCLA a six-point lead (37-31) ... He also converted four of five PATs, missing an extra point kick for the first time in his career when his second attempt bounced off the left upright ... Against San Diego State, he set a career high with four field goals (22, 40, 43, 44) on four attempts, the most by a Bruin since Nate Fikse kicked five against Stanford in 2002 ... He also converted all three PATs for a career-best 15 points ... He was selected Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts ... Against Arizona, he converted all five PAT attempts and did not try a field goal ... At Cal, he made all four PATs, but did not attempt a field goal ... At Arizona State, he made field goals of 40 and 48 yards, the latter with no time left in the first half, and converted all four PATs ... Against Stanford, he made all three PATs, but missed his first two field goals of the year (51 and 38 yards) ... Against WSU, he made all three of his field goal attempts (27, 47, 47) and both PATs.

2003 — Served as the Bruin place kicker for all 13 games ... Named to The Sporting News Pac-10 All-Freshman team ... Team's leading scorer with 68 points ... His 5.23 scoring average placed him 11th in the conference ...

Ranked fourth in the Pac-10 in field goals per game (1.08) and in field goal percentage (.737) ... Converted all 26 PATs and made 14 of 19 field goals with a long of 48 yards ... His 14 field goals ranked 12th on the all-time single-season list at UCLA ... Made his career debut at Colorado and made both PATs, but was wide on a 35-yard field goal attempt ... Two of his three kickoffs reached the end zone ... Made field goals from 28 and 48 yards in the 6-3 win over Illinois ... Two of his three kickoffs reached the goal line ... Kicked a 48-yard field goal at Oklahoma ... Made field goals of 27 and 24 yards against San Diego State ... Made a 39-yard field goal in the Washington game ... At Arizona, he made a 32-yard field goal in the first quarter to increase his streak to seven in a row, but missed from 35 yards in the fourth quarter ... Against Cal, he kicked what proved to be the game-winning field goal in the first overtime ... He converted both PATs (a third was unsuccessful because of a fumbled snap) ... Against Arizona State, he made field goals of 41 and 44 yards and added two PATs ... At Stanford, he made both PATs, but did not attempt a field goal ...
