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ROSE BOWL: THE 30TH YEAR

The 2011 season marks the 30th year that the Rose Bowl will serve as the home of the Bruins. UCLA moved from the L.A. Coliseum in the summer of 1982 and went 6-0-1 in that first year, capping the season with a victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl game.

The 2006 season-opening win against Utah was UCLA's 100th at the Rose Bowl. The Bruins own a record of 123-56-2 since moving to Pasadena, including a 3-2 record in Rose Bowl games.

In July of 2007, the Rose Bowl was selected the No. 1 sports venue by SI.com/SlonCampus.

ROSE BOWL RENOVATION/PARKING UPDATE

The Rose Bowl is currently undergoing a \$152 million renovation that is scheduled to be completed prior to the 2013 season. Phase I of the project is well underway and fans will notice some definite changes. Included in these changes are a new, state-of-the-art LED video board measuring 30 feet tall by 78 feet long on the north end of the stadium. There will also be a new clock on the south end, reminiscent of the historical Rose Bowl clock of the 1950s and '60s and a new, smaller scoreboard installed on the east end of the stadium. Fans will also notice that a great deal of work has been done on the west side of the stadium around the press box area. Structures and land have been cleared for the pouring of footings for the new press box. The Rose Bowl has set up higher-end portable restroom facilities on the west side of the stadium to take the place of the regular wash rooms during the season. Note — General Parking lots at the Rose Bowl will open six hours prior to game time. UCLA - Colorado — UCLA (5-5, 4-3) closes out the home schedule by welcoming new conference member Colorado (2-9, 1-6) to the Rose Bowl on Saturday, Nov. 19. The game will be televised nationally by Versus with kickoff set for 4:35 p.m. PT. Ted Robinson, Glenn Parker and Akbar Gbaja-Biamila will form the announce team. AM 570 (KLAC) and the Bruin IMG Radio Network (Chris Roberts, Matt Stevens and Wayne Cook) will radio broadcast the contest. The game will also be broadcast nationally on SIRIUS XM (Ch. 92).

Hall of Famer Randy Cross To be Honored — UCLA and The National Football Foundation (NFF) & College Hall of Fame will jointly honor Randy Cross with an NFF Hall of Fame On-Campus Salute on Nov. 19 during the game between the Bruins and the University of Colorado.

Honorary Captain — Former halfback/defensive back Kermit Alexander is Saturday's honorary captain. Alexander earned varsity letters at UCLA from 1960-62 and earned All-America and first-team all-conference honors as a senior halfback when he led the Bruins in rushing (82-499), receiving (12-178) and kickoff returns (12-313). In the 1962 Rose Bowl Alexander, then a junior, led the Bruins in rushing (10-48) and receiving (3-26), in a 21-3 loss to Minnesota. He was a two-time team MVP and All-Around Excellence award winner, and was once described by USC coach John McKay "as the best all-around college football player in the nation." Selected in the first round of the 1963 NFL Draft by San Francisco, he enjoyed a long professional career as a defensive back, punt and kick returner with the 49ers, Rams and Eagles. In 143 games played (114 starts), he made 43 interceptions, returning three for touchdowns. Today, Alexander lives in Riverside with his wife Tami and their five children, whom the couple adopted from Haiti following the earthquake in 2010.

More UC-CU Series Info. — UCLA holds a 4-2 lead in a series which dates back to 1980. The Bruins have a 2-1 edge in games played in the Los Angeles area with the Buffaloes posting a 31-17 win in the lone series game played in the Rose Bowl in 2002. Last season, Colorado was 5-7 overall and posted a 2-6 mark in Big 12 Conf. play which was good for 5th place in the North Division.

In the 2003 contest, UCLA dropped a 16-14 decision in Boulder in Karl Dorrell's first game as head coach. CU took an early 7-0 lead and on UCLA's ensuing possession, quarterback Matt Moore was sidelined for the remainder of the contest after taking a blow to the knee. Drew Olson came on to throw two touchdown passes, one to Craig Bragg which tied the score at seven-all, and one late in the third quarter to Mercedes Lewis which pushed the Bruins into the lead at 14-10. Late in the fourth quarter, Colorado drove 63 yards to regain the lead, at 16-14 after the extra point was blocked, on a short touchdown pass with 2:15 remaining in the game. Following the kickoff, UCLA took over at its own 10-yard line but was unable to sustain a drive. CU had 245 yards of total offense in the game, two more than the Bruins.

In 2002, Colorado outscored the Bruins 31-17 in a game played in Pasadena. The visitors jumped out to a 10-7 lead at the half. In the second half of action, the Buffaloes scored on their first four possessions (two touchdowns and two field goals) to take a 31-10 lead with 9:16 remaining in the game. UCLA scored a late touchdown on a Cory Paus to Craig Bragg pass. CU did not commit a turnover in the contest and accounted for 471 yards of offense, 325 on the ground.

- ***The Bruins have won their three previous Pac-12 conference home games this season
- ***Damien Holmes had a career-high tying six tackles at Utah; matched his career-best with 1.5 tackles for loss
- ***Nelson Rosario will look to become UCLA's 10th 2,000-yard receiver - he currently sits at 1,989 receiving yards and is averaging a career-high 18.8 yards per catch this season
- ***Derrick Coleman's two touchdowns against Arizona State upped his season total to 11 which is the most by a Bruin since Maurice Jones-Drew totaled 20 (13 rushing) in 2005
- ***Rosario now is in the top 10 all-time at UCLA in both receiving yards (10th-1,989) and catches (T10th-124) (see chart in bio for more details).
- ***Kevin Prince's 306 yards rushing this season are the most by a Bruin quarterback since Cade McNown ran for 311 in the 1995 season
- ***Punter Jeff Locke has placed seven punts inside the opponent's 10-yard line in the past three games
- ***UCLA's 52 rushing attempts vs. Cal tied for the most by a Pac-12 team in a game this season
- ***The four Bruin interceptions against Cal tied Arizona State (v. Oregon St.) for the best performance of the season in conf. play
- ***The wins over Cal and Arizona State are UCLA's first back-to-back victories in league play since winning three in a row in the 2009 season over Washington, Washington State and Arizona State -- the win over 20th-ranked Arizona State last week was UCLA's first over a ranked conference opponent since a 2007 win over ninth-ranked Oregon
- ***Datone Jones leads the team with 4.5 tackles for loss and 3.0 sacks
- ***The Bruins have allowed 1.50 sacks per game this season to rank 37th in the nation.
- ***Linebacker Patrick Larimore (63) tops the team in tackles and ranks 14th in the Pac-12 (6.3/g).
- ***Running back Johnathan Franklin has risen to 12th on the all-time school rushing list and become the 15th Bruin to go over 2,000 yards rushing for a career (at Stanford).
- ***Kevin Prince moved over the 3,000-yard career mark in passing yardage in the Cal game
- ***Senior offensive tackle Mike Harris leads the team with 38 career starts.
- ***Redshirt junior defensive tackle Donovan Carter leads the Bruin linemen with 31 tackles this season.
- ***Tight end Joseph Fauria, added to the Mackey Award Watch List at mid-season, caught his third and fourth touchdown passes of the year at Stanford, the most by a Bruin tight end since Mercedes Lewis had 10 scoring grabs in the 2005 season.
- ***The 220 yards rushing against ASU marked the eighth time in the last two seasons the Bruins have gone over the 200-yard mark on the ground (2011- at Houston 232, San Jose State 272, Cal 294, Arizona State 220; last year v. Houston-266, at Texas-264, v. Wash. St.-437, v. Oregon State-210.

CU AND THE BRUINS — Rick Neuheisel was the head coach at Colorado for four seasons (1995-98) after serving as a Buff assistant in 1994. He won 33 of 47 games (.702), including all three bowl appearances while CU head coach. His 20-4 record in his first two seasons at Colorado were the fifth-most wins at the time for a first-time head coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision (Division IA).

Bruin center Kai Maiava played at Colorado during the 2007 season ... Wide Receiver Josh Smith played for Colorado in the 2007 and 2008 seasons ... Colorado head coach Jon Embree is a former UCLA assistant head coach and was on the Bruin staff from 2003-05 ... Embree's son, Taylor, is a Bruin wide receiver ... CU Offensive Coordinator Eric Bieniemy served as UCLA running backs coach under coach Karl Dorrell from 2003-05 ... UCLA secondary coach Tim Hundley coached at Colorado from 1996-98.

FIRST CAREER STARTS — S Stan McKay (So.R), OG Wade Yandall (Fr.R), WR Josh Smith (Sr.R) made their first Bruin starts in the Cal game. DB Jamie Graham (Sr.R) and DT Donovan Carter (Jr.R) each made their first UCLA starts versus Washington State. At Oregon State, S (Fr.R) Tevin McDonald made his first start. In the Texas game, LB Glenn Love (Sr.R) and S Dietrich Riley (So.) made their first starts. The Bruins had three players make first starts against San Jose State -- OG Alberto Cid (So.R), F Jordon James (Fr.R), WR Shaq Evans (So.R). At Houston, two defensive players made their first starts, S Dalton Hilliard (Jr.) and S Alex Mascarenas (So.R); on offense three Bruins made first starts - guards Greg Capella (So.R) and (So.) Chris Ward and (Jr.R) tight end Joseph Fauria.

FRESHMEN OVER THE YEARS — A school-record 17 true freshmen played for the Bruins in 1977. Thirteen played in 1975, 12 in 1978, 1980 and 2004 and 10 played in 1979. In recent years, nine played in 2005, eight in 2006, two in 2007 and 11 in 2008. UCLA played 10 freshmen in 2009. The Bruins played 10 freshmen in 2010. True freshman tight end Raymond Nelson is the lone first-year player to see action in 2011.

AT THE STARTING LINE — Senior offensive lineman **Mike Harris** (38), senior tight end **Cory Harkey** (33), senior receiver **Taylor Embree** (31), senior safety **Tony Dye** (29), redshirt junior offensive lineman **Jeff Baca** (29) junior defensive back **Sheldon Price** (28), redshirt junior **Johnathan Franklin** (28), redshirt junior **Datone Jones** (25), senior **Sean Westgate** (23), redshirt junior **Kevin Prince** (22), redshirt junior **Aaron Hester** (21), redshirt senior Kai Maiava (21), senior **Nelson Rosario** (20) are the Bruin position players with at least 20 career starts. Dye had a streak of 28 straight starting assignments snapped at Oregon State. Harkey and LB Sean Westgate are the position players that have the longest current starting streaks at 22.

The Bruin defense has limited opponents to less than 300 yards of offense in 10 contests (8-2 record) Over the last three-plus seasons, UCLA owns a 13-0 record when holding the opponent under 20 points UCLA's record is 10-3 when it wins the turnover battle under coach Neuheisel It is 10-24 when it ties or loses the turnover battle The Bruin defense has held nine opponents (Oregon State this season) to less than 100 yards of rushing in the last three-plus years (record of 8-1).

LAST GAME — UCLA dropped a 31-6 Pac-12 conference decision at snowy Utah. It was the first game a Bruin team had played in the snow since meeting Syracuse

in the 1964 season. The Bruins outgained the Utes 295-291 in total offense on the night, but could not get in the end zone for the first time this season. Joseph Fauria caught four passes for 64 yards and Johnathan Franklin ran 17 times for 89 yards on offense. Utah led 7-3 at the half, but took the opening drive of the second half in for a touchdown and pulled away. Tyler Gonzalez connected on a pair of field goals (30, 35 yards) for the Bruin points.

NEW COORDINATORS ON BOARD — **Mike Johnson**, who has 10 years of NFL coaching experience and three at the collegiate level, is set to begin his first season with the Bruin program. Johnson comes to the Bruins after serving as first, quarterbacks coach and then offensive coordinator of the San Francisco 49ers in 2009 and 2010. Prior to joining the 49ers, Johnson worked alongside Rick Neuheisel on the offensive coaching staff of the Baltimore Ravens where he was the receivers coach. From 2002-2005, Johnson served as quarterbacks coach of the Atlanta Falcons. In 2000-2001, he worked on Mike Riley's staff as the quarterbacks coach for the San Diego Chargers. Johnson also served on Riley's staff at Oregon State from 1997-1999 as coach of the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

Joe Tresey, who has served as defensive coordinator at both the University of Cincinnati and the University of South Florida, was named the Bruins defensive chief in February of 2011. He spent the 2010 season as defensive backs coach of the Omaha Nighthawks of the United Football League. In 2009, Tresey's South Florida defense ranked 24th nationally in total defense (321.8 yds) and 19th in scoring defense (19.8 pts). His unit produced 23 turnovers that season. At Cincinnati in 2008, Tresey "D" ranked 31st nationally in total defense (321.9) and 25th in scoring defense (20.1) while winning the Big East championship and advancing to the Orange Bowl. In 2007, his UC Bearcat defense led the nation by forcing 42 turnovers and totaled 26 interceptions. UC finished 13th in scoring defense (18.8). He worked at Central Michigan in 2006 and his defenders forced 29 turnovers on the way to capturing the Mid-American Conference championship. Tresey has also coached at Georgia Southern (2004-05), Akron (2002-03), Virginia Military Institute (1999-2001) and Otterbein University in Ohio (1995-98). Prior to that, Tresey had a highly successful tenure as a high school football coach.

* UCLA has won eight of its last 15 home games played against AP ranked opponents with wins over Arizona State ('11-20th), Houston ('10-23rd), Tennessee ('08-18th), Oregon ('07-9th), Cal (twice, '05-10th, '07-10th), USC ('06-2nd) and Oklahoma ('05-21st) and losses to ASU ('07-9th), Fresno St. ('08-25th), USC ('08-5th), Oregon ('09-13th), Stanford ('10-25th), Arizona ('10-15th) and Texas ('11-24th).

*Kevin Prince's 163 yards rushing vs. Cal marked the first time a Bruin quarterback had rushed for 100 yards in a game since Jeff Dankworth in 1976 versus Cal and was the most rushing yards by a quarterback since John Sciarra ran for 178 vs. Tennessee in 1974.

*Joseph Fauria had six catches for 110 yards in the opener at Houston. It was the most receiving yards by a Bruin tight end since Marcedes Lewis in 2005. Lewis, now with the Jaguars, had three 100-yard receiving efforts that season, the last being a seven-catch, 108-yard game against Arizona State. * Junior quarterback Richard Brehaut set new single game UCLA records for pass completions (33) and pass attempts (56) against Arizona State last season.

*The last time the Bruins had a ball carrier rush at least 30 times in a contest was Johnathan Franklin who carried 30 times vs. Washington State in 2010.

* UCLA's 437 net yards rushing in 2010 against Washington State was its highest total since it ran for 446 at Oregon in a 35-0 win on Nov. 17, 1979.

* UCLA rushed for at least 250 yards in three straight games in the 2010 season. The last time that happened was in 1993 against Stanford (259), San Diego State (269) and BYU (318). The last time UCLA rushed for at least 250 in four straight contests came in the 1978 season.

* UCLA's 565 yards of total offense versus Washington State in 2010 was its highest total since gaining 624 at Stanford in the 2007 season opener.

HEAD COACH

RICK NEUHEISEL



- *Owns a record of 86-57 in 12th season as college head coach
- *Led teams to three Top 10 finishes and eight bowl games
- *Coached three seasons in the National Football League

Rick Neuheisel, who quarterbacked UCLA to victory in the 1984 Rose Bowl owns a record of 86-57 as a collegiate head coach.

Neuheisel returned to the collegiate ranks in January of 2008 after spending the previous three seasons in the NFL. In his eight years as a college head coach at the University of Colorado and the University of Washington, he fashioned a record of 66-30, winning at least 10 games on three occasions and finishing in the Top 10 three times, while leading his teams to seven bowl games. He was also recognized as one of the nation's top recruiters.

Neuheisel spent the 2005-2007 seasons as an assistant coach for the NFL's Baltimore Ravens. He served as quarterbacks coach in 2005 and 2006 and in January of 2007, was promoted to offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach.

During his four seasons (1999-2002) as head coach at the University of Washington, Neuheisel led the Huskies to a record of 33-16 (.673) and four bowl games (one Rose Bowl, two Holiday Bowls and one Sun Bowl). His Pac-10 record was 23-9 (.719) and Washington won one league title and finished second twice in those four seasons.

In 2000, Neuheisel led the Huskies to an 11-1 record, a first-place finish in the Pac-10 and a victory in the 2001 Rose Bowl.

During his four seasons (1995-98) as head coach at the University of Colorado, Neuheisel won 33 of 47 games (.702), including all three bowl appearances. His 20-4 record in his first two seasons at Colorado were the fifth-most wins at the time for a first-time head coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision (Division IA).

Neuheisel spent the 1994 season as a Colorado assistant coach under Bill McCartney after going to CU from UCLA.

Neuheisel spent six seasons (1988-93) as a Bruin assistant coach. During his final four years he tutored the wide receivers, helping to develop some of UCLA's all-time great receivers, such as J.J. Stokes, Kevin Jordan and Sean LaChapelle.

Neuheisel joined the UCLA staff full-time in 1988 and coached quarterbacks for two seasons, including NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Troy Aikman's senior year (1988). Aikman earned consensus All-America honors and finished third in the Heisman Trophy race, completing a school-record 228 passes (since broken) for 2,771 yards, a .644 percentage and a school-record 24 touchdowns (since broken). Aikman was the No. 1 selection in the 1989 NFL Draft.

In 1986, Neuheisel served as a volunteer coach and his major assignment was to teach the offense to a transfer from Oklahoma who had to sit out the 1986 season -- Aikman.

Neuheisel began his collegiate career at UCLA (1979-83) as a walk-on, holding for place kicker John Lee, and earned the starting quarterback job during his senior season (1983). In his final game as a Bruin, he overcame food poisoning to lead UCLA to a 45-9 victory against Illinois in the 1984 Rose Bowl. He was named the game's MVP after throwing for 298 yards and four touchdowns.

ACADEMICS — Junior **Jeff Locke** was voted the punter for the ESPN 2010 Academic All-District 8 team. Locke earned a 3.57 gpa in his Economics major and has been listed on the Athletics Director's honor roll at UCLA following each academic quarter.

All seven of the redshirt seniors on the 2011 team are scheduled to graduate by the end of the current quarter.

Eighteen current Bruins were named to the Athletic Director's Academic Honor Roll for the 2011 Spring Quarter — DL Uche Amajoyi, OL Jeff Baca, CB Librado Barocio, DL Justin Edison, WR Taylor Embree, TE Luke Gane, LB Todd Golper, TE Austin Hill, LB Ryan Hofmeister, LB Jared Koster, P Jeff Locke, LS Kevin McDermott, LB Aramide Olaniyan, DB Dylan Price, QB Kevin Prince, PK Joe Roberts, LB Phillip Ruhl and TE John Young.

Six Bruins were named to the 2010 **Pac-10 All-Academic team**. Punter **Jeff Locke** was named to the first team for the second consecutive year. He was joined on the first team by senior holder **Danny Rees**. Defensive end **Damien Holmes** was named to the second team for the second straight year. Quarterback **Kevin Prince**, senior linebacker/special teamer **Mike Schmitt** and linebacker **Sean Westgate** earned honorable mention. The UCLA football program has produced 17 NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners, 16 first-team Academic All-Americans (27 overall), eight National Football Foundation Hall of Fame Post-Graduate Scholarship recipients, two Rhodes Scholars and three members of the Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

THE OFFENSE

OFFENSIVE LINE — Redshirt senior **MIKE HARRIS (#65)** has started at tackle in the first 10 contests in 2011. He started 10 games at right tackle in 2010 and has 38 career starts under his belt, most on the team.

Redshirt senior **KAI MAIAVA (#51)** — on the watch list for the Rimington Award (most outstanding center) — sat out the 2010 season due to injury. He started at center in the 2011 opener at Houston, but missed the San Jose State game due to a violation of team rules. He returned to the lineup against Texas. He also started at Oregon State, at Stanford, versus Washington State, at Arizona, Cal, Arizona State, at Utah. Maiava fractured his ankle in a scrimmage on Aug. 21, 2010 and was forced out of the lineup. Maiava started at center for the Bruins in the first 12 games in the 2009 season.

Redshirt junior **JEFF BACA (#60)** returned to the field for 2011 spring practice after sitting out the 2010 season due to NCAA eligibility issues. However, he suffered a fractured ankle in the spring. Baca returned to game action for the first time since 2009, playing tackle against San Jose State. He has started at tackle against Texas, at Oregon State, at Stanford, Washington State, at Arizona, Cal, Arizona State, at Utah. Baca started at left guard in all 13 games in 2009 and has 29 career starts. In 2008, he appeared in nine games with eight starts at left tackle.

Redshirt sophomore guard **GREG CAPELLA (#64)** has started the first 10 games of 2011. He lined up at guard at Utah, against Arizona State, Cal, at Arizona, against Washington State, at Stanford, at Oregon State and versus Texas, started at center for Kai Maiava against San Jose State, and made his first career start in the 2011 opener at Houston, playing guard. He made his college debut a year ago in the third quarter of the win at Texas.

Redshirt freshman guard **WADE YANDALL (#71)** has started the last three games. He started his first career game against Cal as the Bruins rushed for a season-high 294 yards. He started against Arizona State and the Bruins had 220 on the ground.

Redshirt sophomore guard **ALBERTO CID (#62)** transferred into UCLA this fall from Citrus College and has started games against San Jose State, Washington State and at Arizona.

True sophomore guard **CHRIS WARD (#75)** started at guard in the first two games of the season and again at Oregon State and at Stanford. He came off the bench at Arizona and against Texas. He made his first start in the 2011 opener at Houston and was in on all snaps. Ward made his debut in the fourth quarter of the 2010 win at Texas, taking over at right guard. He played in three games last season, including most of the second half against USC.

QUARTERBACKS — Redshirt junior **KEVIN PRINCE (#4)** has 306 yards rushing this season which is the most by a Bruin quarterback since Cade McNown totaled 311 in the 1995 season.

Prince made his 22nd career start at Utah and passed for 146 yards (two interceptions) and ran for 10. Against Arizona State, he passed for 196 yards and ran for 61 more. He hooked up with Nelson Rosario on his longest career pass, a 76-yard play. Against California, he ran for 163 yards and threw for 92 more yards. The 163 yards rushing marked the first time a Bruin quarterback had rushed for at least 100 yards in a game since Jeff Dankworth in 1976. It was the most rushing yardage by a quarterback since John Sciarra totaled 178 versus Tennessee. Prince's 92 throwing yards helped to push him over the 3,000-yard mark for his career.

At Arizona, Prince threw for 286 yards and a touchdown. He was the team's leading rusher with 13 yards. He came off the bench to replace an injured Richard Brehaut in the second quarter of the Washington State game and helped lead the team to a 28-25 win. Prince completed eight of 13 passes for 173 yards and a couple of fourth quarter scoring passes (Josh Smith nine yards, Shaq Evans seven yards). The toss to Evans came at the 3:26 mark and put UCLA into the lead at 28-25.

Prince had not seen action in the first two conference games of the season. Against Texas, he threw for 26 yards (three interceptions) and ran for 26 more. He did not see action vs. San Jose State. In the 2011 season-opener at Houston, he completed his first three throws before being forced to the sidelines in the second quarter due to a concussion suffered following a rushing attempt.

Prince appeared in five games in 2010, all starts. He was sidelined for the balance of the season after undergoing arthroscopic surgery on his knee on Oct. 23. Prince started and played every snap in last year's opener at Kansas State despite missing the bulk of pre-season camp with a muscle strain (oblique). Against Houston, he directed five scoring drives (four tds, one fg). He was the team's second-leading rusher (60). At Texas, he ran for 50 net yards and threw a one-yard scoring pass to Ricky Marvray. Prince's knee was sore and swollen the week following the Texas game and he did not see action versus WSU. He returned to the lineup at Cal. He did not play at Oregon due to the injury and decided to undergo knee surgery.

In 2009, Prince started all 11 games in which he played. He became just the second Bruin freshman (redshirt) quarterback to open a season under center, and the first to win a season-opener, when he took the first

DID YOU KNOW...

Three Bruin coaches and 10 players, including 2010 inductee Randy Cross and 2008 inductee Troy Aikman, are enshrined in the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

Coach Rick Neuheisel still holds the UCLA single season record for completion percentage. Neuheisel completed 185 of 267 passes (69.3%) for 2,245 yards in the 1983 season. He set a then-NCAA record when he completed 25 of 27 passes (92.6%) in a game that season against Washington.

UCLA has 13 former players currently working in the broadcast media - Troy Aikman, Charles Arbuckle, Wayne Cook, Randy Cross, Terry Donahue, Danny Farmer, David Norrie, Ron Pitts, Tom Ramsey, Matt Stevens, J.J. Stokes, Rick Walker, James Washington.

Twenty-two UCLA players have been selected to CoSIDA Academic All-America teams a total of 27 times. Offensive lineman Chris Joseph (2006, 2007) and wide receiver Cormac Carney (1981, 1982) were two-time first-team selections.

UCLA is the only school to produce six quarterbacks — Troy Aikman, Steve Bono, Billy Kilmer, Tommy Maddox, Tom Ramsey, Jay Schroeder — to have played that position on a Super Bowl team.

During the last 29 years (including 2010), UCLA has been ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 on 12 occasions, second only to USC (16) among Pac-10 schools. Washington is next with 10 rankings.

The selection of tight end Mercedes Lewis by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the first round of the 2006 NFL draft marked the 29th time a UCLA player has been taken in round one.

Quarterback Drew Olson finished eighth in the 2005 Heisman Trophy balloting. It marked the 21st time that a Bruin has finished in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy voting.

UCLA has had at least one former player participate in 28 of the last 31 Super Bowl games.

The only three-time consensus All-Americans in Pac-10 history are Bruins (LB Jerry Robinson and S Kenny Easley).

In the decade of the 2000's, UCLA had 12 finalists / winners of the National player awards — 2009 Kai Forbath - Groza Award winner; 2005 Mercedes Lewis-Mackey Award winner; 2004 M. Lewis, Mackey finalist; 2002 Mike Seidman-Mackey finalist; 2004 Chris Kluwe-Ray Guy Award finalist; 2003 Dave Ball-Bronco Nagurski Award finalist; 2001 Robert Thomas-Dick Butkus Award finalist; 2000 Freddie Mitchell-Fred Biletnikoff Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Vince Lombardi Award finalist; 2006 Justin Hickman-Ted Hendricks Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Ted Hendricks Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Chevrolet National Defensive Player of the Year Award.

On May 13, 2007 UCLA became the first school in history to win 100 NCAA team championships. The Bruins currently have 107 NCAA titles to their credit (winning women's golf in 2010-11).

UCLA ON THE RADIO

The 2011 season is UCLA's 15th with Clear Channel and the games are aired on AM 570 KLAC in Southern California. The games are produced by IMG, UCLA's corporate and media-rights holder.

The Los Angeles all-sports station's broadcast includes a two-hour pre-game show (one hour local, one hour network) and a post-game show. Chris Roberts, a four-time Golden Mike Award winner, is in his 20th season as the voice of the Bruins. Former Bruin quarterback Matt Stevens is in his 15th year on the broadcast team and his 11th as the analyst in the booth. Former Bruin quarterback Wayne Cook is in his 10th season as sideline reporter.

Stevens, Cook and David Vasseg host the one hour local pre-game show while Roberts, Stevens and Cook host the hour network pre-game and network post-game shows. Vasseg also hosts a post-game call-in show.

AM 570 KLAC also provides ancillary programming, including head coach and player interviews during game weeks. The half-hour Bruin Report, which highlights UCLA athletics, airs each Saturday following the post-game show (except for night games, when it airs prior to the pre-game show).

UCLA IMG network affiliates include KWDJ 1360 AM - Ridgecrest, KCTC 1320 AM in Sacramento. UCLA Sports Network from IMG games are also available nationally through an agreement with Sirius XM Satellite Radio, the Official Satellite Radio Partner of UCLA Athletics.

Games can also be heard via the internet at uclabruins.com (a UCLA All-Access pass is needed). The home games are also broadcast in Spanish on www.uclabruins.com with Armando Aguayo and Mario Amaya.



UCLA ON TELEVISION

Entering the Colorado game, 220 of UCLA's last 229 games have been televised live, including 88 of the last 89.

This year's games on live tv include at Houston (9/3-FSN), San Jose State (9/10-FSW), Texas (9/17-ABC), at Oregon State (9/24-Prime Tkt.), at Stanford (10/1-FSN), Washington State (10/8-FSN), at Arizona (10/20-ESPN), Cal (10-29-Prime Tkt.), ASU (11-5-Versus), at Utah (Prime Ticket), Colorado (11/19-Versus), at USC (11/26-FSN).

snap in the San Diego State game. He became the second freshman quarterback in UCLA history to pass for over 300 yards three times in a season (Tommy Maddox, 1990). He was third on the team in rushing (165) and his 2,229 yards of total offense rank No. 14 on UCLA's single-season list (No. 2 freshman behind Maddox), his 179 completions rank T-No. 11 (No. 2 among freshmen) and his 2,050 passing yards rank No. 18 (No. 2 among freshmen).

In 2009 at Oregon State, he passed for a career-high 323 yards and rallied the Bruins from a 19-3 deficit to tie the game at 19-all. He threw scoring passes of 58 yards to Nelson Rosario (8:06) and seven yards to Taylor Embree, on fourth-and-seven, with 2:06 remaining. In the final quarter, he completed nine of 13 passes for 198 yards and the two touchdowns. In the first half against Washington, he completed 13 of 17 passes for 212 yards with one touchdown. However, with 5:07 remaining in the half, he was injured on a helmet-to-helmet hit at the end of an eight-yard run and did not return. At Washington State, he recorded his third 300-yard passing game. He completed a career-high 27 passes and led the Bruins in rushing (76), including a 68-yard touchdown scamper, the longest run by a Bruin quarterback since John Sciarra had a 71-yard non-scoring run against Tennessee in 1971. His 390 yards total offense rank No. 9 (tied) on the single-game total offense list.

True junior **RICHARD BREHAUT (#12)** made his 11th career start, the fourth of this season, in the win over Washington State. He threw for 28 yards and ran for 11 yards before leaving the game in the second quarter

with a fractured lower left leg. At Stanford, he threw for 202 yards and a pair of touchdowns (Joseph Fauria 13, 12 yds). At Oregon State, he totaled 146 passing yards, including a 62-yard aerial to Josh Smith and a 22-yard scoring toss to Taylor Embree, and rushed for a touchdown. He came on in relief of Kevin Prince against Texas and threw for 150 yards while completing 8-19 attempts. In the start against San Jose State, Brehaut threw for 145 yards (12-23 att) and a touchdown (Fauria 14 yds) and ran for 44 yards. He came off the bench in the second quarter at Houston and threw for 264 yards and rushed for 87. He threw two touchdown passes, completing 17 of 26 tosses and ran for one score.

Brehaut appeared in nine games, with seven starts, in 2010. He started the final six games of the season. On the year, Brehaut ranked ninth in the Pac-10 in passing yards (144.00) and passing efficiency (110.22) and 10th in total offense (150.78). Brehaut made his first career start versus Washington State and completed 12 of 23 passes for 128 yards. On the day, he engineered seven scoring drives - five tds and two fgs. He also scored the go-ahead touchdown on a one-yard run.

Against Arizona, he threw for his first two career touchdown passes. His 68-yard scoring toss to Randall Carroll was the team's longest since Ben Olson and Brandon Breazell hooked up on a 69-yard scoring play versus Oregon State in 2007. Brehaut also connected on a 49-yard touchdown pass with Josh Smith on a flea-flicker play.

Brehaut led a last-second game-winning field goal drive against Oregon State. UCLA started its final possession on its own 17-yard line with 48 seconds remaining and he moved the Bruins 49 yards, setting up Kai Forbath's game-winning kick. He completed four of six passes (37 yards) on that drive.

At Arizona State, he set school records with his 33 pass completions (old record, 32 by Troy Aikman v. USC in 1988) and 56 pass attempts (old record, 51 by Dennis Dummit v. Cal in 1970). He also set personal bests with 321 passing yards and three touchdown passes.

True freshman **BRETT HUNDLEY (#17)** graduated early from Chandler HS in Chandler, AZ and joined the Bruins in Winter Quarter 2011 (January). He took part in spring practice at UCLA, but was limited in the fall camp due to a summer knee injury. Hundley has not seen action this season.

He threw for 2,348 yards as a senior in high school with 20 scoring passes, two interceptions. He also led his team in rushing with 856 yards and nine touchdowns. Following his senior prep season, he won the passing competition at the Under Armour All-America Game Skills Challenge. As a junior, he threw for 1,517 yards and 16 touchdowns with two interceptions. Hundley rushed for 1,208 yards and 12 touchdowns. He was named Arizona's Gatorade Player of the Year in 2009.

Redshirt junior **NICK CRISSMAN (#18)** missed most of the 2008 and 2010 seasons following surgeries on his right shoulder. Crissman saw his only playing time in a 2009 win at Washington State.

RUNNING BACKS — Redshirt junior tailback **JOHNATHAN FRANKLIN (#23)** -- on the watch list for the Maxwell Award (most outstanding college football player), Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back) --- ranks 10th in the Pac-12 in rushing yards per game (69.5).

He compiled his ninth career 100-yard rushing game against Washington State (12 carries-110). Franklin ran 17 times for 89 yards at Utah. He had 41 yards, including an 11-scoring jaunt, against Arizona State. Franklin went for 45 yards on 13 carries against Cal, including an 11-yard scoring dash. He had six carries for 11 yards at Arizona, and caught two passes for 40 yards and a touchdown. He rushed for 96 yards on 12 carries at Stanford. He had 36 yards on six rushes at Oregon State before heading to the sidelines in the second quarter with a hip contusion. He totaled 58 yards on 15 carries against Texas. He had 81 yards rushing, including a one-yard scoring run against San Jose State. Franklin opened the 2011 season with an 128-yard effort (16 carries) at Houston. Franklin scored the first Bruin touchdown of the day on an 18-yard dash. He is 12th on the all-time Bruin career rushing list.

Franklin appeared in all 12 games and made 10 starts in 2010. He led the Bruins in rushing with 1,127 yards (5.3 ave), the 10th-best season mark in school history. He was fifth in the Pac-10 and 27th in the NCAA (93.92/g). Franklin also topped the team with eight touchdowns. He was ninth in the Pac-10 in all-purpose yards (99.17) and 14th in total offense (93.92). He became UCLA's first 1,000-yard rusher since Chris Markey in 2006 (1,107), and totaled the highest yardage total by a Bruin since Skip Hicks (1,282-1997.) He rushed for 100 or more yards five times in 2010 and he did it in three straight games (Houston, Texas, WSU). The last time a Bruin had rushed for over 100 yards in three consecutive games was Maurice Jones-Drew versus Illinois, Washington and San Diego State in 2004.

In the 2010 win over Washington State, he rushed for a career-high 216 yards (13th on UCLA list) and one touchdown on 30 carries. His 216 yards were the most by a Bruin since Jones-Drew ran for 322 at Washington in 2004. He ran for 118 yards against USC to become the first Bruin back to hit the century mark versus the Trojans since DeShaun Foster in 1998.

Franklin saw action in all 13 games in 2009, making eight starts. He led the team with 566 rushing yards, 12th in the Pac-10. Franklin ranked No.6 on UCLA's freshman rushing list. He recorded two 100-yard games (Kan. St.-119 and Cal-101).

True senior **DERRICK COLEMAN (#33)** now has 11 touchdowns this season, the most by a Bruin since Maurice Jones-Drew scored 20 in 2005 (13 rushing, 4 receiving, 3 punt returns). He is tied for seventh in the Pac-12 in non-kick points scoring average (6.6/g).

Coleman ran 12 times for 43 yards at Utah. Coleman ran for 119 yards (third 100-yarder of the season and fourth of his career) and two touchdowns against Arizona State. He ran for 81 of his yards in the second half of play, including 65 yards on the winning scoring drive which culminated in Coleman's one-yard scoring run with 49 seconds left in the game.

He totaled 80 yards on 16 carries against Cal and found the end zone on three of the runs (two, 20, 24 yards). Coleman had five rushes for 13 yards at Arizona. He carried 11 times versus Washington State and gained 27 yards while scoring

WIDE RECEIVERS — True senior **NELSON ROSARIO (#83)** -- on the Watch List for the Biletnikoff Award for the nation's outstanding receiver-- is now tied for 10th all-time on the school list with 124 catches and in 10th place in receiving yards. Rosario is on the verge of becoming UCLA's 10th 2,000-yard receiver (currently at 1,989) while averaging 18.8 yards a catch this season on his 42 receptions.

He has started the first 10 games of the season and ranks first on the team with 42 catches. Rosario caught two passes (23) at Utah. He hauled in five balls for 151 yards (fourth career 100-yard receiving game) against ASU, including a 76-yarder for a touchdown. Rosario caught five balls (56 yds) against Cal. He caught four passes (78) at Arizona. Rosario grabbed three balls (120) in the win over Washington State. He made a season-high eight catches at Stanford (83). Rosario had four catches (48) at Oregon State. He topped the team with four catches against Texas (68). Rosario led the Bruins with four grabs vs. San Jose for 74 yards (long 43). Rosario caught three balls at Houston (87, long 54).

Rosario saw action in nine games in 2010 and made eight starts. He finished second on the team with 29 receptions and 309 receiving yards. Rosario had two receptions (15) at Texas and broke the 1,000-yard barrier for career receiving yardage. At Arizona State, he collected a career-high nine receptions (65), including a 21-yard touchdown. He made five catches (94) against USC.

Redshirt senior **JOSH SMITH'S (#7)** total of 68 career kickoff returns ranks second all-time at UCLA. He ranks seventh in Pac-12 in kickoff return average (24.1) and is 91st in the NCAA in all-purpose yardage/g at 105.90.

Smith returned three kickoffs (54) at Utah. He had four kick returns against ASU (146), including a Bruin career-best 78-yarder. At Arizona, he made two catches (62 yds), including a 55-yard catch and run, and returned five kickoffs for a 29.4 yard average. Against Washington State, he caught two passes (20) and returned seven kicks (129). His nine-yard scoring grab in the fourth quarter cut the Cougar lead to 22-20. Redshirt junior punter **JEFF LOCKE (#18)** ranks seventh in the Pac-12 and 17th in the nation with a 43.65 average. He put three of his four punts inside the ASU 10-yard line.
