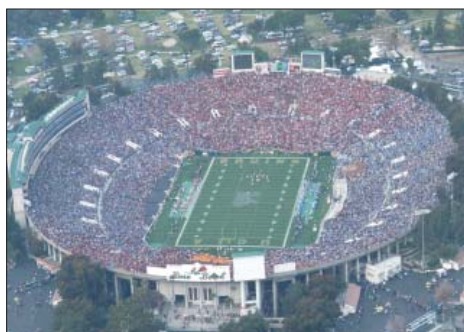

## ROSE BOWL: THE 30TH YEAR

The 2011 season marked UCLA's 30th year in the Rose Bowl. The Bruins moved from the L.A. Coliseum in the summer of 1982 and went 6-0-1 in that first year, capping the season with a victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl game.

The 2006 season-opening win against Utah was UCLA's 100th at the Rose Bowl. The Bruins own a record of 124-56-2 since moving to Pasadena, including a 3-2 record in Rose Bowl games.

In July of 2007, the Rose Bowl was selected the No. 1 sports venue by SI.com/SlonCampus.

## ROSE BOWL RENOVATION

The Rose Bowl is currently undergoing a \$152 million renovation that is scheduled to be completed prior to the 2013 season. Phase I of the project is well underway. Included in these changes are a new, state-of-the-art LED video board measuring 30 feet tall by 78 feet long on the north end of the stadium. There is a new clock on the south end, reminiscent of the historical Rose Bowl clock of the 1950s and '60s and a new, smaller scoreboard installed on the east end of the stadium. In addition, a great deal of work has been done on the west side of the stadium around the press box area. Structures and land have been cleared for the pouring of footings for the new press box.



**UCLA Plays Illinois in Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl** — Pac-12 South Division champion UCLA (6-7) travels to meet Illinois (6-6, 5th in the Leaders Division), from the Big Ten Conference, in the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl on Saturday, Dec. 31 in San Francisco's AT&T Park. The game will be televised nationally by ESPN with Carter Blackburn and Brock Huard in the booth and Shelley Smith on the sidelines. Kickoff is set for 12:30 p.m. PT. AM 570 (KLAC) and the Bruin IMG Radio Network (Chris Roberts, Matt Stevens and Wayne Cook) will radio broadcast the contest. The game will be nationally broadcast on SiriusXM Radio (Ch. 91).

This is UCLA's 31st bowl appearance, and the Bruins have posted a previous postseason record of 14-15-1. It will be the second time that UCLA will have made a bowl appearance in San Francisco. The Bruins played in the 2006 Emerald Bowl in AT&T Park and fell to Florida State, 44-27. UCLA's last bowl appearance was in 2009 at the EagleBank Bowl in Washington, D.C., where they handed Temple a 30-21 defeat.

**THE SERIES WITH ILLINOIS** — The Bruins lead the overall series, which dates back to the 1947 Rose Bowl game, with Illinois by a 6-5 count. UCLA has captured the last four meetings in the series, the most recent being a 2004 game at Urbana-Champaign, IL.

UCLA has met Illinois three previous times in the post-season. UCLA captured the 1991 Hancock Bowl in El Paso, TX by a score of 6-3. The two teams have met twice in the Rose Bowl Game. UCLA won the 1984 classic by a 45-9 score over the then-fourth-ranked Fighting Illini. Illinois registered a 45-14 win over the Bruins in the 1947 contest in Pasadena.

**SAN FRANCISCO BOWL NOTES** — UCLA played in the 2006 Emerald Bowl which was held in San Francisco in AT & T Park. UCLA took a 27-23 lead into the fourth quarter of that contest against Florida State. The Seminoles then outscored UCLA 21-0 in the final fifteen minutes for a 44-27 verdict. Chris Markey ran for 144 yards in the game, becoming UCLA's 11th 1,000-yard rusher in the process, to pace the Bruin offense. Quarterback Patrick Cowan threw for 240 yards and a couple of touchdowns (78 yards to Brandon Breazell and seven yards to Junior Taylor). Defensive back Alterraun Verner topped the Bruin tacklers with a career-best tying nine stops.

**BOWL ELIGIBLE** — With its victory over Colorado on Nov. 19, UCLA became bowl eligible. The Bruins have been bowl eligible in 10 of the last 12 seasons (not 1999, 2008).

 \*\*\* Senior offensive tackle Mike Harris leads the team with 41 career starts.  
 \*\*\*UCLA has won 21 straight games in which it has rushed for at least 250 yards  
 \*\*\*This will be the first time a UCLA football team has played a 14th game in a season  
 \*\*\*Redshirt juniors Datone Jones and Donovan Carter rank one-two among the Bruin d-linemen with 39 and 36 tackles, respectively, this season.  
 \*\*\*Tight end Joseph Fauria, added to the Mackey Award Watch List at mid-season, caught his fifth and sixth touchdown passes of the year against Stanford, the most by a Bruin receiver since Mercedes Lewis had 10 scoring grabs in the 2005 season. The last Bruin receiver to have more than Fauria's total of six scoring receptions this season was tight end Mercedes Lewis, now with the NFL's Jaguars, who had 10 in the 2005 campaign.  
 \*\*\*Kevin Prince's 163 yards rushing vs. Cal marked the first time a Bruin quarterback had rushed for 100 yards in a game since Jeff Dankworth in 1976 versus Cal and was the most rushing yards by a quarterback since John Sciarra ran for 178 vs. Tennessee in 1974. Prince also moved over the 3,000-yard career mark in passing yardage in the Cal game.  
 \*\*\*The 328 yards rushing against Colorado marked the ninth time in the last two seasons the Bruins have gone over the 200-yard mark on the ground (2011- at Houston 232, San Jose State 272, Cal 294, Arizona State 220, 328 Colorado; last year v. Houston-266, at Texas-264, v. Wash. St.-437, v. Oregon State-210.  
 \*\*\*The 2011 season makes it eight straight seasons in which UCLA has won its first conference game of the year and then gone on to become bowl eligible.

Defensive back **Tevin McDonald's(#7)** brother, Tim Jr., plays at USC and his dad, Tim, played in the NFL from 1987-99 with the Cardinals and 49ers ... Running back **Derrick Coleman(#33)** is virtually 100% deaf without his hearing aids ... Defensive back **Sheldon Price's(#22)** dad, Dennis, played at UCLA from 1984-87 and then in the NFL with the Raiders ... Defensive back **Tony Dye(#6)** played a lot of hockey as a youth ... Secondary coach **Tim Hundley's** son, Nick, plays for the San Diego Padres, his other son, Jake, earned his doctorate degree at UCLA ... Defensive coordinator **Joe Tresey's** son, Patrick, is a graduate assistant coach for the Bruins ... Offensive coordinator **Mike Johnson** worked with former head coach Rick Neuheisel on the coaching staff of the Baltimore Ravens ... F-back **Anthony Barr's(#2)** dad, Tony Brooks, was a fourth-round pick of the Eagles in the 1992 draft after playing at Notre Dame ... Reserve tight end **Luke Gane(#49)** underwent chemotherapy and a bone marrow transplant in high school to help overcome a rare blood disorder (aplastic anemia) ... Quarterback **Darius Bell's(#3)** brother Kahlil Bell, a former Bruin running back, is with the Chicago Bears ... Run game coordinator **Jim Mastro** spent the last 11 seasons at Nevada, the home of the Pistol offense ... Running back **Malcolm Jones(#28)** brother, Marshall, is a senior defensive back at USC ... Defensive back **Brian Sermons'(#2)** brother, Rodney, played for USC ... Placekicker **Tyler Gonzalez(#27)** was the manager on the Bruin men's soccer team until he joined the football team after a tryout during the week of the Texas game; he kicked his first career field goal at Arizona ... **Brett Hundley's(#17)** dad, Brett, Sr., lettered at running back in 1986 at the University of Arizona ... Players' helmets will be adorned with ¾ inch tall hard hat decals (in navy blue) on the lower back portion. This is intended as a reward for: "Toughness, dependability and a commitment to hard work and finishing the job."

\*UCLA has won eight of its last 15 home games played against AP ranked opponents with wins over Arizona State (2011-20th), Houston (2010-23rd), Tennessee (2008-18th), Oregon (2007-9th), Cal (twice, 2005-10th, 2007-10th), USC (2006-2nd) and Oklahoma (2005-21st) and losses to Texas (2011-24th), ASU (2007-9th), Fresno State (2008-25th), USC (2008-5th), Oregon (2009-13th), Stanford (2010-25th) and Arizona (2010-15th).

## MORE UCLA/ILLINOIS SERIES INFO. —

**2004:** The last time the Bruins and the Fighting Illini met was in game two of the 2004 season at Urbana-Champaign, IL. UCLA amassed 481 yards of total offense on the day and scored five touchdowns (most since 2001) in the contest. Defensively, linebacker Spencer Havner led the way with 17 tackles, the most by a Bruin since Robert Thomas made 18 at Washington State in 2001. The Bruins also blocked a field goal (Havner) and a punt (Benjamin Lorie) in the game. UCLA jumped out to a 14-0 lead on a 41-yard pass from Drew Olson to Craig Bragg. Maurice Jones-Drew then raced 47 yards for a touchdown. Olson and Bragg hooked up again on a scoring play late in the second quarter to make it 21-7 Bruins at the half. Manuel White scored on a short run to up the lead to 28-7 early in the third quarter. Olson threw his third scoring pass of the afternoon in the fourth quarter to put the game away, a 15-yard strike to Mercedes Lewis.

**1947:** The two teams squared off for the first time in the 1947 Rose Bowl Game. It marked UCLA's second appearance in the New Year's Day classic, but fourth-ranked Illinois scored early and often in a 45-14 win. Quarterback Ernie Case scored the Bruins' first-ever Rose Bowl Game points on a short run to give UCLA a short-lived 7-6 lead. UCLA's second touchdown came on Al Hoisch's 103-yard kickoff return.

**1984:** The teams met once again in the 1984 Rose Bowl. Unranked UCLA captured its fourth straight Rose Bowl Game win scoring a 45-9 upset of the fourth-ranked Fighting Illini. Quarterback Rick Neuheisel completed 22 of 31 passes for 298 yards and four touchdowns (Paul Bergmann, Karl Dorrell-2, Mike Young). UCLA racked up over 500 yards of offense in the affair. Safety Don Rogers picked off a pair of Illinois passes, the first leading to UCLA's opening score in the early minutes of the game. The Bruins led 28-3 at the half and 38-3 after three quarters.

**1991:** In the 1991 Hancock Bowl, played in the Sun Bowl in El Paso, TX, then No. 22-ranked UCLA captured its eighth straight bowl victory after registering a 6-3 decision. The Bruins took an early 3-0 lead after taking advantage of a blocked punt. Illinois tied the score with a third quarter field goal. UCLA then capitalized

on another special teams play, a fumbled Illinois punt, to set up a short field goal. The Fighting Illini took the ensuing kickoff and advanced down to the UCLA 29-yard line only to be stopped by an interception by Stacy Argo.

**BOWLING** — Including the current season, the Bruins have qualified to play in a bowl game in 10 of the last 12 seasons (not in 2008 or 2010).

The 2011 season makes it eight straight seasons in which UCLA has captured its first conference game of the year and then gone on to become bowl eligible — 2011-W at Oregon State—Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl; 2010-L Stanford; 2009-L at Stanford; 2008-L Arizona; 2007-W at Stanford—Las Vegas Bowl; 2006-L at Washington; 2005-W Washington—Sun Bowl; 2004-W at Washington—Las Vegas Bowl; 2003-W Washington—Silicon Valley Classic; 2002-W at Oregon State — Las Vegas Bowl; 200-W at Oregon State — bowl eligible, but did not go to bowl; 2000-L at Oregon; 1999-L at Stanford; 1998-W Washington State—Rose Bowl.

**IN THE LAST THREE-PLUS SEASONS** — UCLA is 11-3 when a Bruin rushes for at least 100 yards in a game ... The Bruin defense has limited opponents to less than 300 yards of offense in 11 contests (9-2 record) ..... Over the last three-plus seasons, UCLA owns a 14-0 record when holding the opponent under 20 points ..... UCLA's record is 11-3 when it wins the turnover battle under coach Neuheisel ..... It is 10-26 when it ties or loses the turnover battle ..... The Bruin defense has held 10 opponents (Colorado, Oregon State this season) to less than 100 yards of rushing in the last three-plus years (record of 9-1).

**POST SEASON HONORS** — Senior running back Derrick Coleman was named to the second-team All-Pac-12 squad as a special teams standout. WR Nelson Rosario, RB Johnathan Franklin, C Kai Maiava and DB Andrew Abbott received honorable mention.

Redshirt freshman Tevin McDonald was named a Freshman All-America by Yahoo Sports (1st team), CBSSports.com (1st team), collegefootballnews.com (2nd team). Redshirt freshman linebacker Eric Kendricks was named an honorable mention Freshman All-American (collegefootballnews.com).

Thirteen Bruins merited 2011 Pac-12 All-Academic team honors. Sophomore running back Malcolm Jones was named to the first team. Sophomore F back Anthony Barr and junior punter Jeff Locke were on the second team. **LAST GAME** — Eighth-ranked North Division Champ Oregon topped South Division Champion UCLA in the first annual Pac-12 Championship contest, in Eugene, OR, by a score of 49-31. First-half Bruin fumbles led to three Duck touchdowns resulting from a short field, the longest UO scoring drive covering 52 yards in length. Patrick Larimore helped get UCLA on the scoreboard with a 35-yard interception return which had evened the score at 7-all. After the Ducks moved out to a 21-7 lead, quarterback Kevin Prince connected with Nelson Rosario on a 37-yard scoring play to bring the Bruins within a touchdown. Oregon came right back with a couple of scoring drives before Tyler Gonzalez booted a career-best 44-yard field goal on the last play of the first half to make it 35-17, Oregon, at the break. UCLA forced an Oregon punt on the first drive after the break and opened up the second half scoring on a short run by Prince which capped off a 43-yard drive and narrowed the gap to 35-24. However, Oregon scored on its next two possessions. UCLA finished off the night's scoring on a 19-yard touchdown pass from Prince to Rosario which capped off a 15-play, 94 yard drive. Rosario had six catches in the contest for 98 yards and the first multiple touchdown catch game of his career.

## THE BRUIN COACHING STAFF —

**Defensive Coordinator --- Joe Tresey** (Ohio State, '82), who has served as defensive coordinator at both the University of Cincinnati and the University of South Florida, was named the Bruins defensive chief in February of 2011. He spent the 2010 season as defensive backs coach of the Omaha Nighthawks of the United Football League. In 2009, Tresey's South Florida defense ranked 24th nationally in total defense (321.8 yds) and 19th in scoring defense (19.8 pts). His unit produced 23 turnovers that season. At Cincinnati in 2008, the defense ranked 31st nationally in total defense (321.9) and 25th in scoring defense (20.1) while winning the Big East championship and advancing to the Orange Bowl. In 2007, his UC Bearcat defense led the nation by forcing 42 turnovers and totaled 26 interceptions. UC finished 13th in scoring defense (18.8). He worked at Central Michigan in 2006 and his defenders forced 29 turnovers on the way to capturing the Mid-American Conference championship. Tresey has also coached at Georgia Southern (2004-05), Akron (2002-03), Virginia Military Institute (1999-2001) and Otterbein University in Ohio (1995-98). Prior to that, Tresey had a highly successful tenure as a high school football coach.

**Defensive Line --- Inoke Breckterfield** (Oregon State, '07), a former All-Pac-10 defensive lineman at Oregon State, is in his first season at UCLA. He came to UCLA after coaching the defensive line at Montana in 2010. The Grizzlies ranked first in the Big Sky and 14th in the BCS in tackles for loss (7.6); second in the league and 18th nationally in sacks (2.6). Breckterfield also served as an assistant coach at Weber State (2009) and at Oregon State (2007-08). An outstanding player at OSU, Breckterfield was named first-team All-Pac-10 and third-team AP All-American in his senior season in 1998. He was the defensive winner of the Pac-10's Morris Trophy as the league's best defensive lineman. Following his collegiate career, he played in the Canadian Football League for five seasons with the Toronto Argonauts and the Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1999-2003).

**Secondary --- Tim Hundley** (Western Oregon State, '74), rejoined the Bruin staff in 2009 after previously serving at UCLA in 1990-1995 as a linebacker and special teams coach. In 2008, Hundley had served as assistant head coach, defense at SMU. He spent the previous four years as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Texas-El Paso. Hundley, who has coached in 14 previous bowl games, has worked 18 overall seasons as a defensive coordinator at Idaho, Oregon State, Washington and UTEP. He was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame after an All-American football playing career at Western Oregon State.

**Linebackers --- Clark Lea** (Vanderbilt, '05), is in his second season as a full-time assistant at UCLA. He had worked as a graduate assistant at UCLA before working as linebacker coach at South Dakota State in 2007 and 2008. He also had served as a graduate assistant at Vanderbilt from 2002-04.

**Tight Ends/F Backs/ Run Game Coordinator --- Jim Mastro** (Cal Poly, '94) is in his first year at UCLA after enjoying great success the previous 11 seasons at the University of Nevada, the home of the "pistol offense." Mastro helped build one of the nation's top running attacks at Nevada, with a 1,000-yard rusher in nine of his 11 seasons in Reno. Prior to joining the staff at Nevada, Mastro also worked at Idaho (1998-99) and Cal Poly (1989-93).

**Special Teams / Offensive Line --- Angus McClure** (Sacramento State, '93) is in his fifth season at UCLA and his first as special teams and offensive

**Mike Johnson**, who has 10 years of NFL coaching experience and three at the collegiate level, is in his first season with the Bruin program. He was selected to serve as interim head coach for the bowl game after the dismissal of Rick Neuheisel. Johnson had been serving as UCLA's offensive coordinator and wide receiver coach.

Johnson came to the Bruins after serving as first, quarterbacks coach and then offensive coordinator of the San Francisco 49ers in 2009 and 2010. He played a significant role in the development of quarterbacks Shaun Hill and Alex Smith. Prior to joining the 49ers, Johnson worked on the offensive coaching staff of the Baltimore Ravens where he was the receivers coach working with wideouts Derrick Mason and Mark Clayton. From 2002-2005, Johnson served as quarterbacks coach of the Atlanta Falcons, where he tutored Michael Vick. In 2000-2001, he worked on Mike Riley's staff as the quarterbacks coach for the San Diego Chargers and helped Doug Flutie compile career highs in season passing yards. Johnson also served on Riley's staff at Oregon State from 1997-1999 as coach of the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

Johnson played five pro seasons as a quarterback, beginning as a rookie free agent with the Arizona Cardinals in 1990. After being released in the team's final cutdown, Johnson went on to play two seasons for the San Antonio Riders of the World League. He moved to the Canadian Football League in 1992 and quarterbacked the British Columbia Lions for two seasons. From 1994-95, he played for the Shreveport Pirates of the CFL.

Johnson attended Arizona State in 1985 and 1986, before transferring to junior college. He then moved on to the University of Akron and played two seasons, 1988-89.



line assistant. For the previous three seasons, McClure worked as Director of On-Campus Recruiting. He coached the Bruin tight ends in 2007. McClure came to UCLA after serving as offensive line/ run game coordinator at the University of Buffalo (2006). He spent the two previous seasons (2004-05) as an assistant at the University of Nebraska. Prior to that, McClure served on the coaching staff at Sacramento State from 1997-2003. During his tenure, the Hornets set 52 NCAA Div. I-AA, Big Sky Conference or school records. In 1996, McClure coached tight ends at Nevada.

**Running Backs** --- **Wayne Moses** (Washington, '77) is in the fourth season of his second tenure as UCLA's running backs coach. He also had coached at UCLA from 1990-95. He most recently came to UCLA after serving as running backs coach of the St. Louis Rams in 2006 and 2007 where he tutored Steven Jackson. Prior to joining the Rams, Moses had worked 28-years in the collegiate ranks, working at five Pac-10 schools (UCLA, Cal, Washington, USC, Stanford). He played at Washington and was a member of the 1978 Rose Bowl championship team.

**Assoc. Head Coach/ Offensive Line** --- **Bob Palcic** (Dayton, '71), who has coached three Outland Trophy winners during his career, is in the fourth season of his second tenure at UCLA. He also was on the Bruin staff in 1993 (Jonathan Ogden). Palcic possesses 41 years of experience, including 25 in college, 12 in the NFL (Saints, Browns, Lions, Falcons), two in the CFL and two in high school. He also has coached at Wisconsin (Gabe Carimi, Joe Thomas), USC, Ohio State, Arizona, Ball State and Dayton.

**Quarterbacks** --- **Marques Tuiasosopo** (Washington, '01) has been elevated to assistant coach for the bowl game. He had been serving as an intern in the football office. An outstanding quarterback at the University of Washington, he became the first player in NCAA history to pass for over 300 yards and run for 200 yards in a game versus Stanford in 1999. He led the Huskies to the 2000 Pac-10 title and a trip to the Rose Bowl game. Tuiasosopo was then selected in the second round of the 2001 NFL draft by the Oakland Raiders.

## DID YOU KNOW...

Three Bruin coaches and 10 players, including 2010 inductee Randy Cross and 2008 inductee Troy Aikman, are enshrined in the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

UCLA has 13 former players currently working in the broadcast media - Troy Aikman, Charles Arbuckle, Wayne Cook, Randy Cross, Terry Donahue, Danny Farmer, David Norrie, Ron Pitts, Tom Ramsey, Matt Stevens, J.J. Stokes, Rick Walker, James Washington.

Twenty-two UCLA players have been selected to CoSIDA Academic All-America teams a total of 27 times. Offensive lineman Chris Joseph (2006, 2007) and wide receiver Cormac Carney (1981, 1982) were two-time first-team selections.

UCLA is the only school to produce six quarterbacks — Troy Aikman, Steve Bono, Billy Kilmer, Tommy Maddox, Tom Ramsey, Jay Schroeder — to have played that position on a Super Bowl team.

During the last 29 years (including 2010), UCLA has been ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 on 12 occasions, second only to USC (16) among Pac-10 schools. Washington is next with 10 rankings.

The selection of tight end Mercedes Lewis by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the first round of the 2006 NFL draft marked the 29th time a UCLA player has been taken in round one.

Quarterback Drew Olson finished eighth in the 2005 Heisman Trophy balloting. It marked the 21st time that a Bruin has finished in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy voting.

UCLA has had at least one former player participate in 28 of the last 31 Super Bowl games.

The only three-time consensus All-Americans in Pac-10 history are Bruins (LB Jerry Robinson and S Kenny Easley).

In the decade of the 2000's, UCLA had 12 finalists / winners of the National player awards --- 2009 Kai Forbath - Groza Award winner; 2005 Mercedes Lewis-Mackey Award winner; 2004 M. Lewis, Mackey finalist; 2002 Mike Seidman-Mackey finalist; 2004 Chris Kluwe-Ray Guy Award finalist; 2003 Dave Ball-Bronco Nagurski Award finalist; 2001 Robert Thomas-Dick Butkus Award finalist; 2000 Freddie Mitchell-Fred Biletnikoff Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Vince Lombardi Award finalist; 2006 Justin Hickman-Ted Hendricks Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Ted Hendricks Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Chevrolet National Defensive Player of the Year Award.

On May 13, 2007 UCLA became the first school in history to win 100 NCAA team championships. The Bruins currently have 107 NCAA titles to their credit (winning women's golf in 2010-11).

## UCLA ON THE RADIO

The 2011 season is UCLA's 15th with Clear Channel and the games are aired on AM 570 KLAC in Southern California. The games are produced by IMG, UCLA's corporate and media-rights holder.

The Los Angeles all-sports station's broadcast includes a two-hour pre-game show (one hour local, one hour network) and a post-game show. Chris Roberts, a four-time Golden Mike Award winner, is in his 20th season as the voice of the Bruins. Former Bruin quarterback Matt Stevens is in his 15th year on the broadcast team and his 11th as the analyst in the booth. Former Bruin quarterback Wayne Cook is in his 10th season as sideline reporter.

Stevens, Cook and David Vassegh host the one hour local pre-game show while Roberts, Stevens and Cook host the hour network pre-game and network post-game shows. Vassegh also hosts a post-game call-in show.

AM 570 KLAC also provides ancillary programming, including head coach and player interviews during game weeks. The half-hour Bruin Report, which highlights UCLA athletics, airs each Saturday following the post-game show (except for night games, when it airs prior to the pre-game show).

UCLA IMG network affiliates include KWDJ 1360 AM - Ridgecrest, KCTC 1320 AM in Sacramento. UCLA Sports Network from IMG games are also available nationally through an agreement with Sirius XM Satellite Radio, the Official Satellite Radio Partner of UCLA Athletics.

Thirteen Bruins merited Pac-12 All-Academic team honors. Sophomore running back Malcolm Jones was named to the first team. Soph F back Anthony Barr and junior punter Jeff Locke were on the second team. Senior PK Tyler Gonzalez, redshirt freshman LB Eric Kendricks, redshirt freshman LB Phillip Ruhl, redshirt freshman Jared Koster, redshirt junior long snapper Kevin McDermott, sophomore DL Owamagbe Odighizuwa, redshirt freshman quarterback Kevin Prince, sophomore OL Chris Ward and senior LB Sean Westgate received honorable mention. Locke has been listed on the Athletics Director's honor roll at UCLA following each academic quarter.

Seventeen current Bruins were named to the Athletic Director's Academic Honor Roll for the 2011 Spring Quarter --- OL Jeff Baca, CB Librado Barocio, DL Justin Edison, WR Taylor Embree, TE Luke Gane, LB Todd Golper, TE Austin Hill, LB Ryan Hofmeister, LB Jared Koster, P Jeff Locke, LS Kevin McDermott, LB Aramide Olaniyan, DB Dylan Price, QB Kevin Prince, PK Joe Roberts, LB Phillip Ruhl and TE John Young.

The UCLA football program has produced 17 NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners, 16 first-team Academic All-Americans (27 overall), eight National Football Foundation Hall of Fame Post-Graduate Scholarship recipients, two Rhodes Scholars and three members of the Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

## THE OFFENSE

**OFFENSIVE LINE** — Redshirt senior **MIKE HARRIS (#65)** has started at tackle in the first 13 contests in 2011. He started 10 games at right tackle in 2010 and has 41 career starts under his belt, most on the team.

Redshirt senior **KAI MAIAVA (#51)** --- on the watch list for the Rimington Award (most outstanding center) --- sat out the 2010 season due to injury. He started at center in the 2011 opener at Houston, but missed the San Jose State game due to a violation of team rules. He returned to the lineup against Texas. He also started at Oregon State, at Stanford, versus Washington State, at Arizona, Cal, against Arizona State, at Utah, versus Colorado, at USC, at Oregon. Maiava fractured his ankle in a scrimmage on Aug. 21, 2010 and was forced out of the lineup. Maiava started at center for the Bruins in the first 12 games in the 2009 season.

Redshirt junior **JEFF BACA (#60)** returned to the field for 2011 spring practice after sitting out the 2010 season due to NCAA eligibility issues. However, he suffered a fractured ankle in the spring. Baca returned to game action for the first time since 2009, playing tackle against San Jose State. He has started at tackle against Texas, at Oregon State, at Stanford, WSU, at Arizona, Cal, ASU, at Utah, versus Colorado, at USC, at Oregon. Baca started at left guard in all 13 games in 2009 and has 32 career starts. In 2008, he appeared in nine games with eight starts at left tackle.

Redshirt sophomore guard **GREG CAPELLA (#64)** has started the first 13 games of 2011. He lined up at guard at Oregon, at USC, versus Colorado, at Utah, against ASU, Cal, at Arizona, against WSU, at Stanford, at Oregon State and versus Texas, started at center for Kai Maiava against San Jose State, and made his first career start in the 2011 opener at Houston, playing guard. He made his college debut a year ago at Texas.

Redshirt sophomore guard **ALBERTO CID (#62)** transferred into UCLA this fall from Citrus College and has started games against San Jose State, Washington State, at Arizona, versus Colorado, at USC, at Oregon.

Redshirt freshman guard **WADE YANDALL (#71)** has started three games. He started his first career game against Cal as the Bruins rushed for a season-high 294 yards. He started against Arizona State and the Bruins had 220 on the ground. He also drew the starting assignment at Utah.

True sophomore guard **CHRIS WARD (#75)** is out after undergoing left knee surgery on Dec. 13. He started at guard in the first two games of the season and again at Oregon State and at Stanford. He came off the bench at Arizona and against Texas. He made his first start in the 2011 opener at Houston and was in on all snaps. Ward made his debut in the fourth quarter of the 2010 win at Texas, taking over at right guard. He played in three games last season, including most of the second half against USC.

**QUARTERBACKS** — Redshirt junior **KEVIN PRINCE (#4)** has started the last seven games and a total of 25 for his career. He has 455 yards rushing this season which is the most by a Bruin quarterback since Jeff Dankworth racked up 815 in the 1976 season.

He is eighth on the all-time career total offense list at UCLA. He ranks 67th in the nation in total offense (208.20/g) and 49th in passing efficiency (137.27).

Prince made his 25th career start at Oregon in the Pac-12 Championship contest and completed 13 of 26 passes for 164 yards and two touchdowns. He also ran 15 times for 31 yards. Prince completed 21 of 33 passes for 261 yards at USC. He rushed for 34 yards on 17 carries. Against Colorado and completed 15 of 19 passes for 225 yards and four touchdowns while running 10 times for 84 yards. It was his **first 300-yard total offense game** since a 390-yard effort against Washington State in the 2009 season. The four scoring passes were a personal best total and the most by a Bruin quarterback since Ben Olson connected on five touchdown aeriels against Stanford in 2007.

Prince started at Utah and passed for 146 yards (two interceptions) and ran for 10. Against Arizona State, he passed for 196 yards and ran for 61 more. He hooked up with Nelson Rosario on his **longest career pass**, a 76-yard play. Against Cal, he ran for 163 yards and threw for 92 more yards. The 163 yards rushing marked the first time a Bruin quarterback had rushed for at least 100 yards in a game since Jeff Dankworth in 1976. It was the **most rushing yardage by a quarterback** since John Sciarra totaled 178 versus Tennessee in 1974. Prince's 92 throwing yards helped to push him over the 3,000-yard mark for his career.

At Arizona, Prince threw for 286 yards and a touchdown. He was the team's leading rusher with 13 yards. He came off the bench to replace an injured Richard Brehaut in the second quarter of the Washington State game and helped lead the team to a 28-25 win. Prince completed eight of 13 passes for 173 yards and a couple of fourth quarter scoring passes (Josh Smith nine yards, Shaq Evans seven yards). The toss to Evans came at the 3:26 mark and put UCLA into the lead at 28-25.

Prince had not seen action in the first two conference games of the season. Against Texas, he threw for 26 yards (three interceptions) and ran for 26 more. He did not see action vs. San Jose State. In the 2011 season-opener at Houston, he completed his first three throws before being forced to the sidelines in the second quarter due to a concussion suffered following a rushing attempt.

Prince appeared in five games in 2010, all starts. He was sidelined for the balance of the season after undergoing arthroscopic surgery on his knee on Oct. 23. Prince started and played every snap in last year's opener at Kansas State despite missing the bulk of pre-season camp with a muscle strain (oblique). Against Houston,

he directed five scoring drives (four tds, one fg). He was the team's second-leading rusher (60). At Texas, he ran for 50 net yards and threw a one-yard scoring pass to Ricky Marvray. Prince's knee was sore and swollen the week following the Texas game and he did not see action versus WSU. He returned to the lineup at Cal. He did not play at Oregon due to the injury and decided to undergo knee surgery.

In 2009, Prince started all 11 games in which he played. He became **just the second Bruin freshman (redshirt) quarterback to open a season** under center, and the first to win a season-opener, when he took the first snap in the San Diego State game. He became the **second freshman quarterback in UCLA history** to pass for over 300 yards three times in a season (Tommy Maddox, 1990). He was third on the team in rushing (165) and his 2,229 yards of total offense rank No. 14 on UCLA's single-season list (No. 2 freshman behind Maddox), his 179 completions rank T-No. 11 (No. 2 among freshmen) and his 2,050 passing yards rank No. 18 (No. 2 among freshmen).

In 2009 at Oregon State, he **passed for a career-high 323 yards** and rallied the Bruins from a 19-3 deficit to tie the game at 19-all. He threw scoring passes of 58 yards to Nelson Rosario (8:06) and seven yards to Taylor Embree, on fourth-and-seven, with 2:06 remaining. In the final quarter, he completed nine of 13 passes for 198 yards and the two touchdowns. In the first half against Washington, he completed 13 of 17 passes for 212 yards with one touchdown. However, with 5:07 remaining in the half, he was injured on a helmet-to-helmet hit at the end of an eight-yard run and did not return. At Washington State, he recorded his third 300-yard passing game. He completed a career-high 27 passes and led the Bruins in rushing (76), including a 68-yard touchdown scamper, the longest run by a Bruin quarterback since John Sciarra had a 71-yard non-scoring run against Tennessee in 1971. His **390 yards total offense rank No. 9** (tied) on the single-game total offense list.

True junior **RICHARD BREHAUT (#12)** came on briefly for Kevin Prince in the Conference Championship game at Oregon and completed one of two passing attempts for 13 yards. He also suffered his first interception of the season (last int. came in 2010 v. USC and it snapped a streak of 141 passing attempts without a pick). He worked his way back into practice during the Colorado week after recovering from a broken leg suffered in the Washington State game (10/8/11).

He made his **11th career start**, the fourth of this season, in the win over Washington State. He threw for 28 yards and ran for 11 yards before leaving the game in the second quarter with a fractured lower left leg. At Stanford, he threw for 202 yards and a pair of touchdowns (Joseph Fauria 13, 12 yds). At Oregon State, he totaled 146 passing yards, including a 62-yard aerial to Josh Smith and a 22-yard scoring toss to Taylor Embree, and rushed for a touchdown. He came on in relief of Kevin Prince against Texas and threw for 150 yards while completing 8-19 attempts. In the start against San Jose State, Brehaut threw for 145 yards (12-23 att) and a touchdown (Fauria 14 yds) and ran for 44 yards. He came off the bench in the second quarter at Houston and threw for 264 yards and rushed for 87. He threw two touchdown passes, completing 17 of 26 tosses and ran for one score.

Brehaut appeared in nine games, with seven starts, in 2010. He **started the final six games of the season**. On the year, Brehaut ranked ninth in the Pac-10 in passing yards (144.00) and passing efficiency (110.22) and 10th in total offense (150.78). Brehaut made his first career start versus Washington State and completed 12 of 23 passes for 128 yards. On the day, he engineered seven scoring drives - five tds and two fgs. He also scored the go-ahead touchdown on a one-yard run.

Against Arizona, he threw for his first two career touchdown passes. His 68-yard scoring toss to Randall Carroll was the team's longest since Ben Olson and Brandon Breazell hooked up on a 69-yard scoring play versus Oregon State in 2007. Brehaut also connected on a 49-yard touchdown pass with Josh Smith on a flea-flicker play.

Brehaut led a last-second game-winning field goal drive against Oregon State. UCLA started its final possession on its own 17-yard line with 48 seconds remaining and he moved the Bruins 49 yards, setting up Kai Forbath's game-winning kick. He completed four of six passes (37 yards) on that drive.

At Arizona State, he set school records with his 33 pass completions (old record, 32 by Troy Aikman v. USC in 1988) and 56 pass attempts (old record, 51 by Dennis Dummit v. Cal in 1970). He also set personal bests with 321 passing yards and three touchdown passes.

Redshirt junior **NICK CRISSMAN (#18)** missed most of the 2008 and 2010 seasons following surgeries on his right shoulder. Crissman came on at the end of the Colorado game to lead the team to its final score of the day. He had seen his only previous playing time in a 2009 win at Washington State.

True freshman **BRETT HUNDLEY (#17)** graduated early from Chandler HS in Chandler, AZ and joined the Bruins in Winter Quarter 2011 (January). He took part in spring practice at UCLA, but was limited in the fall camp due to a summer knee injury. Hundley has not seen action this season.

He threw for 2,348 yards as a senior in high school with 20 scoring passes, two interceptions. He also led his team in rushing with 856 yards and nine touchdowns. Following his senior prep season, he won the passing competition at the Under Armour All-America Game Skills Challenge. As a junior, he threw for 1,517 yards and 16 touchdowns with two interceptions. Hundley rushed for 1,208 yards and 12 touchdowns. He was named Arizona's Gatorade Player of the Year in 2009.

**RUNNING BACKS** — Redshirt junior tailback **JOHNATHAN FRANKLIN (#23)** -- on the watch lists for the Maxwell Award (most outstanding college football player), Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back) --- ranks 10th in the Pac-12 in rushing yards per game (72.85) and earned honorable mention all-conference honors. He moved up to **ninth on the all-time Bruin career rushing list** in the game at USC.

Franklin carried nine times for 35 yards at Oregon. He rushed eight times for 55 yards at USC. He compiled his **10th career 100-yard rushing game** against Colorado (15 carries-162, one touchdown). Franklin ran 17 times for 89 yards at Utah. He had 41 yards, including an 11-scoring jaunt, against Arizona State. Franklin went for 45 yards on 13 carries against Cal, including an 11-yard scoring dash. He had six carries for 11 yards at Arizona, and caught two passes for 40 yards and a touchdown. He rushed for 96 yards on 12 carries at Stanford. He had 36 yards on six rushes at Oregon State before heading to the sidelines in the second quarter with a hip contusion. He totaled 58 yards on 15 carries against Texas. He had 81 yards rushing, including a one-yard scoring run against San Jose State. Franklin opened the 2011 season with an 128-yard effort (16 carries) at Houston. Franklin scored the first Bruin touchdown of the day on an 18-yard dash.

Franklin appeared in all 12 games and made 10 starts in 2010. He led the Bruins in rushing with 1,127 yards (5.3 ave), the **10th-best season mark in school history**. He was fifth in the Pac-10 and 27th in the NCAA (93.92/g). Franklin also topped the team with eight touchdowns. He was ninth in the Pac-10 in all-purpose yards (99.17) and 14th in total offense (93.92). He became UCLA's first 1,000-yard rusher since Chris Markey in 2006 (1,107), and totaled the highest yardage total by a Bruin since Skip Hicks (1,282-1997.) He rushed for 100 or more yards five times in 2010 and he did it in **three straight games** (Houston, Texas, WSU). The last time a Bruin had rushed for over 100 yards in three consecutive games was Maurice Jones-Drew versus Illinois, Washington and San Diego State in 2004.

In the 2010 win over Washington State, he rushed for a **career-high 216 yards** (13th on UCLA list) and one touchdown on 30 carries. His 216 yards were the most by a Bruin since Jones-Drew ran for 322 at Washington in 2004. He ran for 118 yards against USC to become the first Bruin back to hit the century mark versus the Trojans since DeShaun Foster in 1998.

Franklin saw action in all 13 games in 2009, making eight starts. He led the team with 566 rushing yards, 12th in the Pac-10. Franklin ranked No.6 on UCLA's freshman rushing list. He recorded two 100-yard games (Kan. St.-119 and Cal-101).

True senior **DERRICK COLEMAN (#33)** has 11 touchdowns this season, the most by a Bruin since Maurice Jones-Drew scored 20 in 2005 (13 rushing, 4 receiving, 3 punt returns). He was named to the second-team all-conference team as a special teams performer.

Coleman led the Bruins with 16 carries for 83 yards in the Championship game at Oregon. He also caught one pass for six yards. He ran three times for four yards at USC and caught two balls for six yards. He had 11 carries for 54 yards against Colorado. He ran 12 times for 43 yards at Utah. Coleman ran for 119 yards (**third 100-yarder of the season** and fourth of his career) and two touchdowns against Arizona State. He ran for 81 of his yards in the second half of play, including 65 yards on the winning scoring drive which culminated in Coleman's one-yard scoring run with 49 seconds left in the game.

He totaled 80 yards on 16 carries against Cal and found the end zone on three of the runs (two, 20, 24 yards). Coleman had five rushes for 13 yards at Arizona. He carried 11 times versus Washington State and gained 27 yards while scoring twice on a pair of one-yard runs. The senior recorded exactly 100 yards at Oregon State on a career-high 20 carries. Coleman ran for two touchdowns against Texas, both one-yard scores, and had 47 yards on seven carries. He led the Bruins with 135 yards rushing on 14 carries in the win over San Jose State. Coleman carried seven times in the 2011 opener at Houston for 17 yards and a score.

Coleman appeared in 11 games in 2010 and made two starts. He ranked second on the team with 487 yards and his 44.3 average ranked 13th in the Pac-10. Coleman was second on the team with five touchdowns. He also made 10 tackles on special teams. Coleman compiled a **career-high 185 yards** on the ground against Washington State and three touchdowns (one, one, four yards), also a career best. His 73-yard run was the longest of his career.

Coleman, a member of the 2009 AFCA Good Works Team, appeared in all 13 games in 2009 and made one start (WSU). He was second on the squad with 244 yards. In 2008, he played in the final 10 games of the season, made one start (at Wash.), and was second on the squad with 284 yards.

Redshirt junior **JOSEPH FAURIA (#8)** (FOUR-ee-aa) was added to the Mackey Award watch list (best collegiate tight end) at midseason. He hauled in his fifth and sixth scoring passes of the season against Colorado (5, 15 yds). The total of six touchdown receptions this season is the **most by a Bruin receiver since Mercedes Lewis had 10 in the 2005 season**.

Fauria hauled in four passes at Oregon (50 yds). He grabbed three passes at USC (39). He made four catches against Colorado (49), two for touchdowns. He caught four passes (64) at Utah, with a long of 32 yards. He had two catches (12) against Arizona State. He had one reception against Cal (15). Fauria had three catches (20) at Arizona. He started at Stanford and grabbed three balls (43) and had a pair of touchdowns (13, 12 yds). He started versus Washington State and at Oregon State, but had no catches. He made two catches (29) versus Texas and grabbed a 14-yard touchdown pass from Richard Brehaut in the win over San Jose State. **WIDE RECEIVERS** — True senior **NELSON ROSARIO (#83)** -- on the Watch List for the Biletnikoff Award for the nation's outstanding receiver-- is now **fifth all-time on the school list with 143 catches** and in **fifth place in receiving yards**. Rosario became the **seventh Bruin to reach 1,000-receiving yards in a season** at USC and became **UCLA's 10th 2,000-yard receiver** during the Colorado game (currently at 2,307) while averaging 18.1 yards a catch this season on 61 receptions. Rosario was named honorable mention all-conference.

Rosario has started 12 games and ranks first on the team with 61 catches. He grabbed six passes for 98 yards and a couple of touchdowns (37, 19). It was

his first career multiple touchdown game. He caught seven passes for 118 yards (**sixth career 100-yard receiving game**, fourth of 2011 season) at USC, the second time in his career that he has totaled at least 100 receiving yards in back-to-back games. He hauled in six balls against Colorado for 102 yards and a touchdown while becoming the 10th Bruin to go over the 2,000 career receiving yards mark. Rosario caught two passes (23) at Utah. He caught five balls for 151 yards against ASU, including a 76-yarder for a touchdown. Rosario caught five balls (56 yds) against Cal. He caught four passes (78) at Arizona. Rosario grabbed three balls (120) in the win over Washington State. He made a season-high eight catches at Stanford (83). Rosario had four catches (48) at Oregon State. He topped the team with four catches against Texas (68). Rosario led the Bruins with four grabs vs. San Jose for 74 yards (long 43). Rosario caught three balls at Houston (87, long 54).

Rosario saw action in nine games in 2010 and made eight starts. He finished second on the team with 29 receptions and 309 receiving yards. Rosario had two receptions (15) at Texas and broke the 1,000-yard barrier for career receiving yardage. At Arizona State, he collected a career-high nine receptions (65), including a 21-yard touchdown. He made five catches (94) against USC.

Rosario appeared in all 13 games in 2009, with two starts. He led the team with 723 receiving yards. He was second on the squad with 42 receptions. He finished 2009 on a roll making 30 catches for 526 yards (avg. 88 yds/g; 17.5 yds/catch) in the last six games. He earned honorable mention All-Pac-10 honors.

Rosario had a breakout game in a 2009 start at Oregon State, making a team-high six receptions for 152 yards and his first career touchdown, a 58-yard catch and run. His 152 receiving yards were the **most by a Bruin since Craig Bragg totaled 230 versus Oregon in 2002**. In the win over Washington, he led the Bruins with seven receptions and 111 yards becoming the first Bruin since Mercedes Lewis in 2005 to record 100+ receiving yards in back-to-back games and the first wide receiver to do it since Craig Bragg in 2003.

True senior **TAYLOR EMBREE (#82)** ranks **eighth on UCLA's all-time school list** for receptions with 136 and he is 14th on the receiving yards list at 1,760.

Embree grabbed one pass at Oregon (18 yds). He caught three balls at USC (29). He made two catches against Colorado (13). Embree caught one pass (15) at Utah. He made two catches (16) against Arizona State. He had an eight-yard catch against Washington State. He also had a catch at Stanford. He scored his third career touchdown on a 22-yard scoring grab at Oregon State. He had two catches (23 yds) versus San Jose. He came off the bench in the opener at Houston to make five catches (60).

He saw action in all 12 games in 2010 and made 11 starts. On the year, he made a

Redshirt senior **JOSH SMITH'S (#7)** total of 80 career kickoff returns ranks second all-time at UCLA. His season total of 1,117 kickoff return yards is a school record mark, as is his total of 48 returns in 2011. He ranks eighth in Pac-12 in kickoff return average (23.3).

Smith returned five kickoffs at Oregon (85 yds). He brought back five kickoffs at USC (125). He returned two kicks against Colorado (39) and three (54) at Utah. He had four returns against ASU (146), including a Bruin career-best 78-yarder. At Arizona, he made two catches (62), including a 55-yard catch-and-run, and returned five kickoffs for a 29.4 yard average. Against Washington State, he caught two passes (20) and returned seven kicks (129). His nine-yard scoring grab in the fourth quarter cut the Cougar lead to 22-20. He then caught an 11-yard pass on third-down which enabled the Bruins to run out the clock on WSU. Smith had a seven-yard run for a touchdown at Stanford and five kickoff returns (111). He caught two passes (76), including one for 62 yards at Oregon State. He also returned three kickoffs (77), long of 42, against the Beavers. The senior had one rush (6 ) versus Texas and added four kick returns (115).

Smith appeared in 10 games in 2010. He ranked eighth in the Pac-10 with his 22.59 kickoff return average. His 723 kickoff return yards ranked fourth on the all-time Bruin season list. Against Arizona, he tied for the team lead with three receptions(74) and scored his first Bruin touchdown on a 49-yard pass from Richard Brehaut.

Smith sat out the 2009 season after transferring from Colorado. He earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors as a kick returner in 2008 after recording the school's second-highest all-purpose yardage total for a single season. In that 2008 season, Smith totaled 1,987 all-purpose yards and set a school record with 50 kickoff returns for 1,276 yards. He brought one return back 93 yards for a score against Colorado State.

True senior safety **TONY DYE (#6)** --- on the watch lists for the Lott (top defensive player) and Nagurski Trophy (most outstanding defensive player); Bednarik and (top defender), Thorpe Awards (top DB) --- shifted to free safety in 2011 after starting all 12 games in 2010 at strong safety. He started games at USC (two tackles, then left with ankle injury) and against Colorado (two tackles) after sitting out the previous seven games (neck soreness). Dye then sat out the game at Oregon with the ankle injury. He had 10 tackles in the 2011 opener at Houston.

Last season, he led the team with 96 tackles and ranked fourth (tied) in the Pac-10 (8.0). He also paced the team with nine pass break ups. Dye made a career-high 15 tackles in the opener at Kansas State. Against USC, he topped the team with 13 tackles, 0.5 for loss, and made his first career interception.

Dye started all 13 games in 2009 and ranked fourth on the squad with 73 tackles. At Arizona, he scored his first career touchdown when he scooped up a lateral and returned it 28 yards for the score.

## THE KICKING GAME

Redshirt junior punter **JEFF LOCKE (#18)** ranks sixth in the Pac-12 and 14th in the nation with a 44.14 average. He punted four times for a 48.2 yards average at Oregon, with two kicks inside the 20. Locke kicked to a 45.2 average at USC with three punts inside the 20, two inside the 10-yard line. He had a 44.0 average against Colorado. He put three of his four punts inside the ASU 10-yard line. He booted seven punts for a 44.3 yard average against Cal, placing three inside the five-yard line. He also had five kickoffs for touchbacks. His total of 19 touchbacks ranks second in the Pac-12 this season. Locke kicked his first career field goals (51, 49 yds) against Texas and had a long punt of 70 yards (best in the Pac-12 this season). He was named to the 2011 second-team Pac-12 All-Academic squad for the third straight season.

In 2010, Locke helped UCLA lead the nation in net punting (41.27). He ranked first in the Pac-10 and fourth in the NCAA (45.84). Locke earned third-team All-America acclaim from Rivals.com and was the punter on the ESPN Academic All-District 8 team as well as Pac-10 All-Academic first team.

In 2009, Locke was a semifinalist (only freshman) for the Guy Award, presented to the nation's top punter. He was selected second-team All-Pac-10 by the league's coaches and was a first-team Pac-10 All-Academic selection. He was named first-team Freshman All-America by Collegefootballnews.com and second-team by *Phil Steele Publications*. He averaged 43.63 yards (16th in NCAA and second in Pac-10) on 70 punts with 20 inside the 20-yard line. UCLA was 20th nationally and first in the Pac-10 in net punting (37.76). Only 23 kicks were returned (170 yds.). Locke had 20 touchbacks on kickoffs, most in the Pac-10.
