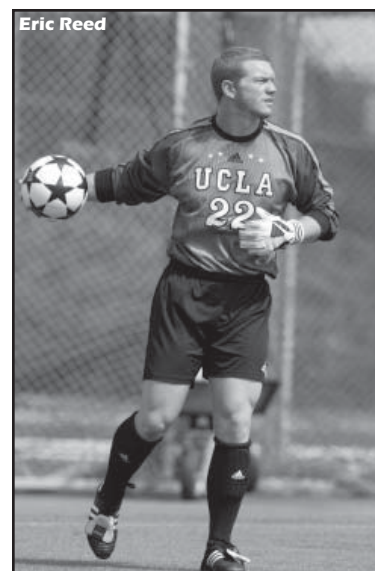

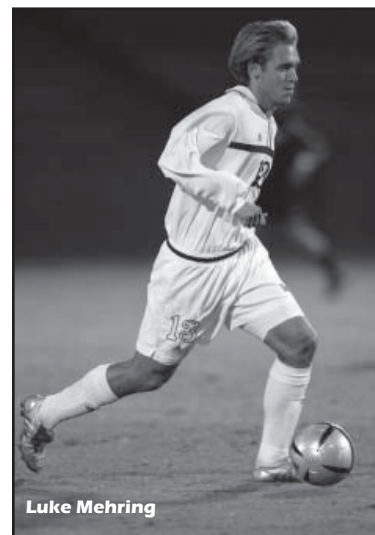

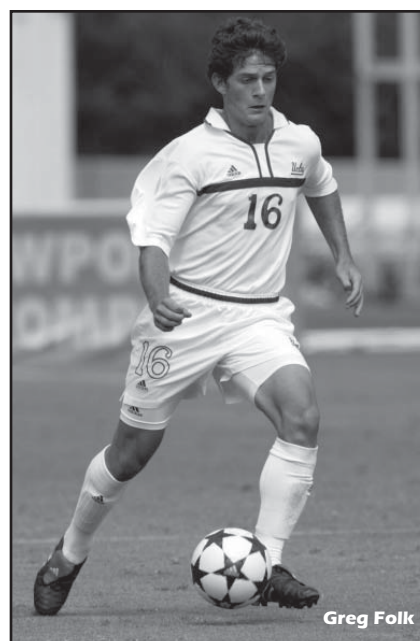

2004 SEASON IN REVIEW

Bruins

With a new head coach, the loss of six starters and three All-Americans, a rebuilding year was to be expected from the 2004 Bruins. What the squad brought, however, was a resilient spirit that led to a third-straight Pac-10 title and a 22nd consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament.

The Bruins, which spent the off-season playing and defeating several professional teams, including the LA Galaxy twice and the Chivas reserves in Guadalajara, entered the season with a pre-season No. 2 ranking by Soccer America. UCLA proved worthy of its ranking with a pair of opening-week victories at the Cal State Fullerton SoccerTown Classic over Oakland (2-1 in overtime) and UC Riverside (1-0). Freshman Kamani Hill made his presence known, earning tournament Most Outstanding Offensive Player honors. Junior Jordan Harvey received defensive honors.

UCLA got its first taste of defeat the following week at the UNLV Invitational, falling to Creighton, 3-2. Despite the loss, however, the Bruins showed a fighting spirit that would be a sign of things to come during the year. Down 3-0 with six minutes to play, UCLA mounted a comeback. A Richard Flores header cut the lead to 3-1 at 83:59, and Benny Feilhaber pulled UCLA to within one with a goal with 23 seconds to play, but time ran out on the Bruins' comeback effort. Fortune smiled upon the Bruins in the following game, when an own goal gave UCLA a 1-0 overtime win over host UNLV.

A trio of games against local rivals Cal State Northridge, Loyola Marymount and Cal State Fullerton to close out September brought a split decision. UCLA won the first contest, defeating Cal State Northridge 3-1 behind a pair of Mike Enfield goals. The offense sputtered in the next two games, however, resulting in ties against LMU (0-0) and Cal State Fullerton (1-1), which sent the Bruins out of the NSCAA rankings.

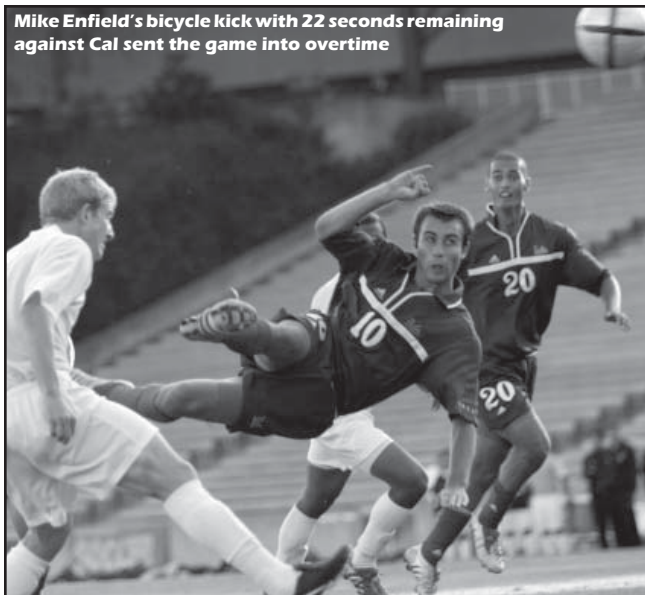
The start of Pac-10 Conference play again saw mixed results. After UCLA defeated Oregon State, 3-1, the Bruins dropped a 1-0 decision to Washington at home, UCLA's first Pac-10 loss since Nov. 8, 2002.

The Bruins regrouped after a week off and came back renewed against the Bay Area schools, both of whom were ranked in the Top 15 in the *Soccer America* polls. UCLA first handed No. 13 California a 3-0 defeat at Berkeley. Enfield had a hand in all three goals, scoring two and assisting on the other. Two days later at Stanford, UCLA notched another shutout, 2-0, against the 10th-ranked Cardinal. Goalkeeper Eric Reed recorded the shutout after making five saves, and Feilhaber and Enfield provided the scoring.

UCLA hosted the same two teams the next week and again produced two victories, but in much more dramatic fashion. Against Stanford, the Cardinal jumped out to a 1-0 halftime lead, scoring on its only shot of the game, a direct free kick at the top of the box at 30:10. The Bruins scored two second-half goals, however, to claim the comeback victory. Jonathan Bornstein equalized in the 57th minute, and Chad Barrett scored the game-winner at 87:16.

The Bruins wrote the book on comebacks in the Cal contest, miraculously erasing a

two-goal deficit with less than 10 minutes to play and winning the game in overtime, 4-3. The 2004 senior class was responsible for the comeback, as each scored a goal in the final 12 minutes of play. The comeback began at 81:50 when Ahmed Khalil scored on a header in the box to narrow Cal's lead to 3-2. Then with 22 ticks on the clock, Enfield netted a stunning bicycle kick for the equalizer. Khalil assisted on the play with a header to Enfield. Finally, 3:04 into overtime, UCLA earned a penalty kick after a Cal defender was red-carded for an intentional handball on a Feilhaber scoring opportunity. Aaron Lopez's penalty kick was blocked by the Cal goalkeeper, but Lopez followed through on his shot and kicked in the rebound to score the golden goal.

Holding momentum after that stirring comeback, the Bruins shut out UC Irvine 1-0 and then traveled to the Pacific Northwest to not only avenge its only Pac-10 loss of the year but to try to clinch the Pac-10 title against Washington. UCLA had to come back again in this game, spotting the Huskies a 1-0 lead at halftime before scoring two unanswered goals in the second half. Khalil equalized in the 65th minute, and Feilhaber slammed home the game-winner in the 80th minute.

With their third-consecutive Pac-10 Championship in hand, the Bruins closed out conference play at Oregon State with an anti-climactic 1-0 loss that could have cost them a chance at a Top 4 seed in the NCAA Tournament. Instead, after ending the regular season with a pair of non-conference wins over San Diego (4-0) and UC Davis (3-1), the Bruins found themselves with a No. 6 seed and a date with rival Loyola Marymount in the second round. UCLA easily handled the Lions, earning a 3-0 victory on goals from Luke Mehring, Enfield and Ryan Valdez. Reed earned the shutout and made four saves.

The Bruins faced a tough challenge in round three, facing 11th-seeded St. John's, the 2003 NCAA runner-up, under rainy conditions. In typical UCLA fashion, the Bruins fell behind, 2-0, after goals in the 41st and 60th minute. UCLA made its patented comeback in the second half, notching eight of its 12 shots in the final 23 minutes of play. Enfield put the Bruins on the scoreboard for the first time with a goal in the 73rd minute, but St. John's goalkeeper Bill Gaudette came up with big-time saves in the final minutes to keep UCLA from equalizing.

UCLA ended its season with a 14-4-2 record, and Enfield earned first-team NSCAA All-America honors to give UCLA an NSCAA All-American for the 22nd consecutive year. Patrick Ianni received Pac-10 Co-Player of the Year honors, and rookie head coach Jorge Salcedo was selected the Pac-10 Co-Coach of the Year.

BRUINS IN THE CONFERENCE

Men's soccer is in its sixth year as a Pacific-10 Conference sanctioned sport. Six Pac-10 teams comprise the Pac-10 Men's Soccer Conference - UCLA, California, Oregon State, Stanford, Washington and 2005 addition San Diego State.

In 2004, three conference teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament - UCLA, Washington and Cal. The Bruins won their third consecutive Pac-10 title, posting a 6-2 league mark. First-year

head coach Jorge Salcedo earned Co-Coach of the Year honors, and sophomore midfielder/defender Patrick Ianni was named the Co-Player of the Year.

The Pac-10 branched out of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) after the 1999 season to form its own conference. Since 2000, the Pac-10 has had at least three teams advance to the NCAA Tournament every season.
