

## JORGE SALCEDO

Head Coach • 2nd Year • UCLA ('02)



Former UCLA All-American and assistant coach Jorge Salcedo enters his second season as head coach for the Bruins.

In his first season, Salcedo earned Pac-10 Co-Coach of the Year honors after leading UCLA to its third-straight conference title. His Bruins ended the regular season ranked No. 3 by Soccer America and advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament, where they finished the year with a 14-4-2 record.

Salcedo was UCLA's assistant coach from 2001-03 and helped lead the Bruins to the 2002 NCAA Championship and to two Pac-10 team championships. In 2002, he served as acting head coach in a crucial road victory at Stanford in November that helped the Bruins capture their first-ever Pac-10 title. He also served as acting head coach in the spring of 2002 in the coaching transition between Todd Saldaña and Tom Fitzgerald and had served in a similar capacity after Fitzgerald announced his resignation. Salcedo made an immediate impact as head coach, snaring the No. 1-rated recruiting class in the country.



Salcedo, who is a scout for the U.S. National

Team, was the head coach of the 2002 U-16 SoCal ODP State team and was also the assistant coach of the U-17 team in 2001.

The Cerritos, Calif. native had an illustrious career at UCLA from 1990-93. Salcedo was a four-year starter, playing 74 games and tallying six goals and seven assists for 19 points. As a freshman, he scored the decisive penalty kick in the shootout during the 1990 NCAA Championship game to give UCLA its second national title. In 1993 as a senior, he earned NSCAA first-team All-America honors. He prepped at Cerritos HS, where he earned two *Parade* All-America honors.

Salcedo played for five years in Major League Soccer (MLS). In his first season in the league, he was a starter for the Los Angeles Galaxy and helped take his team to the MLS Championship game. He also played for Chicago, where he served as team co-captain, Columbus and Tampa Bay before returning to the Galaxy in 1999. Prior to his MLS career, he played with the LA Salsa in the APSL and then for F.C. Morelia of the Mexican First Division. Salcedo was also a member of the U.S. National Team program, earning three caps with the full national team, captaining the U-17 team at the 1989 World Youth Championships and the U-20 team at the 1990 CONCACAF Tournament.


Salcedo has had extensive ties to the Bruin program for many years. He graduated from UCLA with a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science and was part of three of the Bruins' four NCAA Championship teams. He was a ballboy for UCLA during its first championship year in 1985, scored the game-winning penalty kick in the 1990 Championship game and was an assistant coach for the 2002 squad. In addition, his father Hugo was a UCLA assistant coach from 1978-79 and a member of the 1972 U.S. Olympic team, and his brother Eddie was a UCLA letterwinner in 1995.

Salcedo and his wife Rebecca have been married for one year, and they are expecting their first child in February.

# PETER VAN DE VEN

Assistant Coach • 5th Year • Washington ('98)



Former University of Washington standout Peter van de Ven is in his fifth season as UCLA assistant coach/goalkeeper coach.

During his first four seasons at UCLA, he tutored All-American Zach Wells, who went on to set UCLA single-season records for saves (101 in 2001), victories (20 in 2003) and goals against average (0.52 in 2003).

Van de Ven was an assistant at Chapman University from 1999-2000, coaching both the men's andwomen'steamstothesecond round of the NCAA Tournament. From 1999-2001, he also served as assistant coach/goalkeeper coach at Mater Dei HS, which won back-to-backCIF Championships in 1999 and 2000. He also

has experience at the club level, coaching the Irvine Lasers U-17 and U-16 Boys and the San Juan Soccer Club U-17 Girls.

A first-team Academic All-American at the University of Washington, van de Ven led his team to the 1998 MPSF Championship and to NCAA Tournament berths from 1996-98. As a senior, he earned first-team All-MPSF acclaim after posting a 0.85 GAA with eight shutouts. He previously played two years at the University of Notre Dame, where he also helped his team reach the 1994 NCAA Tournament.

Upon graduating from Washington in 1998 with a B.A. in Psychology, van de Ven enjoyed a successful three-year profes-

sional career and spent parts of the 2000 season with the Los Angeles Galaxy. As a member of the Orange County Waves in 2000, he had five shutouts in 15 starts.

The Santa Ana native was the CIF Goalkeeper of the Year, as well as an all-county and all-league selection at Mater Dei HS, where he posted 16 shutouts and captained his squad to the CIF Southern Section title as a senior.

Van de Ven, who has a U.S. Soccer Federation "A" Coaching License, earned his Master's Degree in Sports Management at the University of San Francisco in 2005. He and his wife Rebecca were married in March 2005 and reside in West Los Angeles.

# Paul Bravo

Assistant Coach • 2nd Year • Santa Clara ('93)



Former Major League Soccer All-Star and U.S. National Team member Paul Bravo starts his second season as assistant coach.

Bravo was an assistant coach with the Colorado Rapids of Major League Soccerfrom 2002-03 after playing for the Rapids from 1997-2001. In his first season playing with Colorado, he helped lead the team to the 1997 MLS Cup championship game. The three-time MLS All-Star selection (1996 with the San Jose Clash, 1998 and 1999 with the Rapids) was the first player in Colorado history to record 100 career points and finished his six-year career with

131 points on 52 goals and 27

Bravo was the Director of Coaching for the Colorado Rush soccer club and an assistant coach for the Region IV 88s in 2003 and the 89s in 2004. He has an "A" Coaching License.

He earned four career caps as a member of the U.S. National Team from 1994-95. He played college soccer at Santa Clara University, scoring 26 goals with 13 assists in his career and leading the Broncos to the 1989 NCAA Co-Championship. He earned his degree in Political Science in 1993.

After finishing his eligibility at Santa Clara, he played professionally for the APSL's San Francisco Bay Blackhawks, where he earned Rookie of the Year honors in 1991 and helped his team capture the APSL Championship. He was also a member of the 1994 U.S. Open Cup champion San Francisco Greek-Americans squad and spent the 1995 season with the Monterey Bay Jaguars of the USISL, recording 19 goals and 13 assists in just 19 games.

Bravo and his wife, Sara, have two children, Maya and Luca.

# Jose Lopez

VOLUNTEER COACH • 11TH YEAR • UCLA ('73)



Jose Lopez, the first soccer player ever to be inducted into the UCLA Hall of Fame, enters his 11th year as a volunteer assistant coach. He has aided the Bruin soccer program with video taping since 1987

Lopez enjoyed a hugely successful playing career at UCLA, leading the Bruins to their first NCAA Championship games in 1970, 1972 and 1973 and playing on two regular-season undefeated teams. A two-time team captain, Lopez never lost a home game in his four years as a Bruin.

Following his senior season in 1973, he was selected to play in the College Senior Bowl and became UCLA's first-ever No. 1 professional draft choice when he was chosen by the Los Angeles Aztecs of the North American Soccer League. In his rookie season, he helped the Aztecs win the NASL title, and in his second year he was selected the Aztecs' Midfielder of the Year. Lopez has played with and against soccer legends like Pele, Franz Beckenbauer and George Best.

A UCLA Hall of Fame inductee in 1993, Lopez also played baseball and kicked on the freshman football team at UCLA. He lettered in baseball, football, basketball and track at Santa Ana Valley HS.

Lopez coached soccer and baseball at Santa Monica HS and now teaches AP Spanish Language and Literature. He has been married to his wife Sheri for 28 years, and they have two daughters who graduated from UCLA, Ashlei and Alexys.
