A Look Back at 2006...

UCLA finished its 2006 season with a 17-6 overall mark and a 6-2 MPSF record. Not only did the Bruins take third place in the MPSF regular-season standings, but UCLA also grabbed third-place finishes in the NorCal Tournament, the SoCal Tournament and the MPSF Tournament.

Led by seven seniors, the Bruins defeated conference-rival Stanford in each of four meetings, marking the first time UCLA totaled a 4-0 record or better versus the Cardinal in program history. Senior Logan Powell led UCLA's balanced scoring attack with 34 goals, and sophomore Krsto Sbutega continued to blossom as he registered 30 goals on a team-high 92 attempts.

Among the team's most memorable performances came from the return of senior Michael March, who missed the 2005 campaign with a back injury after helping lead UCLA to the 2004 NCAA Championship. March collected 25 goals on 69 attempts and finished second on the team with 16 steals and 15 assists. A three-time All-MPSF honoree, March earned first-team All-America honors at the conclusion of the season.

Goalkeeper Chay Lapin emerged as a weapon in the cage for UCLA, as the freshman assumed starting goalkeeping duties midway through the season. Lapin finished the 2006 season with 110 saves in 15 games (all starts). His 4.87 goals against average ranked second-lowest among MPSF goalkeepers.

UCLA received 20-goal efforts from six players, including redshirt freshman Scott Davidson, who finished the season with 22 goals on 51 attempts. Centers Marco Santos and Grant Zider both provided excellent play from the two-meter position, as Santos tallied 27 goals and Zider netted 22 goals in his senior season.

The Bruins won six of their first seven games, and defeated Stanford three times in a span of five games

(from Sept. 17 to Oct. 14). UCLA powered past the Cardinal, 7-6, in the third-place game of the NorCal Tournament before defeating Stanford, 10-8, at the Rose Bowl Aquatic Center two weeks later. The two conference rivals met again in the SoCal Tournament opener, as UCLA again knocked off Stanford, 9-6. The Bruins earned their fourth victory against Stanford in overtime of the MPSF Tournament's third-place match.

UCLA ended its 2006 campaign having won seven of eight matches. The Bruins' quest for a ninth NCAA Championship ended in an MPSF Tournament semifinal contest against California. UCLA assumed a quick 2-0 lead against the Golden Bears, who defeated the Bruins in both contests earlier in the season. UCLA

led 4-3 at the intermission before California crawled back to win 8-5.

Seven Bruins earned All-MPSF recognition, as March and Sbutega headlined the group on the All-MPSF first team. Lapin and Santos captured All-MPSF second-team honors, Zider gained All-MPSF third-team recognition and Powell and Justin Johnson achieved All-MPSF honorable mention status.

Mountain Pacific Sports Federation

The Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) was established during the 1992-1993 academic year to serve the competitive needs of member institutions from the Big West, Pacific-10, Mountain West, Western Athletic and West Coast Conferences and other selected universities in the western United States, and to provide championship competition for Division I intercollegiate Olympic sports in a conference setting. The MPSF was originally formed to provide enhanced competition and championship opportunities for sports without conference affiliation; to contain the costs of competition; and to ensure the survival of sports impacted by Title IX and other fiscal pressures. The Federation has served as an incubator for emerging women's sports and as a safe harbor for sports impacted by conference realignments. In 2006-2007, the Federation celebrated its 15th year of competition and is affirmed that is more relevant today than at any other time since its inception. As a testament to its viability, the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation continues to successfully manage the ever-changing face of college sports by fostering contraction and expansion of its intercollegiate athletics portfolio to meet the dynamic needs of its member institutions and conferences.

In 2007-2008, the MPSF will again sponsor nine Olympic intercollegiate sports while serving over 1500 student-athletes and approximately 75 head coaches from 31 universities in 12 western states. All MPSF teams compete at the NCAA Division I level in men's soccer, men's and women's water polo, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's gymnastics, women's lacrosse and men's volleyball. All MPSF champions are eligible to

compete in NCAA Championships with MPSF men's soccer, men's and women's water polo, and men's volleyball champions earning automatic qualification into NCAA championship events. The MPSF portfolio of teams for 2007-2008 season will remain the same with the Federation serving 31 institutions sponsoring 74 Division I teams in nine sports. 2007-2008 will be a water-shed season as the Federation looks to do a makeover, redesigning its logo and graphic presentation, and launching a new website during the Fall of 2007. The MPSF will also look to more technological advances as it upgrades its level of conference services to participating member institutions.

In 2006-2007, four MPSF teams won NCAA championships while almost a score of teams and hundreds of student-athletes competed in NCAA post-season competition. UCLA won its historic 100th NCAA team title in women's water polo after winning the MPSF title, in contrast to UC Irvine, which won its first NCAA team title by taking the 2007 NCAA National Collegiate Championship in men's volleyball after pulling out its first-ever MPSF men's volleyball championship. California won the NCAA men's water polo championship for the first time since the MPSF's inaugural season in 1992-1993 after winning the MPSF championship, and Arizona State beat the field to win the NCAA Womens' Indoor Track and Field Championship in Fayetteville, Arkansas, also after taking the MPSF title.

Other Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Champions for the 2006-2007 season includes New Mexico's third-consecutive conference title in men's soccer and the Lobos' fifth in six years; Washington earned its second-consecutive MPSF men's indoor track

and field championship with Seattle Pacific was also the champion in women's gymnastics for the second year in a row; while Stanford collected a MPSF title three-peat in women's lacrosse.

Al Beard has been the Federation's only executive director, taking the reigns after being selected by the MPSF Administrative Committee in 1998. Beard's position was established as a result of the Federation's successful growth and well established tradition of NCAA and national championship caliber play. The former Director of Youth and Community Programs for UC Davis Athletics, Beard oversees the administration of all Federation sports, while working closely with head coaches and administrators from over 30 universities competing in Division I athletics. Beard oversees all aspects of MPSF competition, including scheduling, officiating, championships, media relations, broadcasting, NCAA relations, and sponsorships, while also facilitating conference legislation, annual coaches' business meetings and Federation Administrative and Executive Committee meetings. In 2004, Beard completed a four-year term, including three years as chair of the NCAA Men's Water Polo Championships and Rules Committee and also currently serves as liaison to the USOC and national governing bodies for amateur athletics in the United States.
