

2009 IN REVIEW

Under the direction of first-year head coach Adam Wright, the UCLA men's water polo team won the MPSF Tournament for the first time since 2000 and secured its first NCAA Tournament berth since winning the NCAA championship in 2004. The Bruins went 23-7, collecting victories in 11 of 12 games before losing the NCAA title contest.

Led on offense by senior Scott Davidson and backed by senior goalkeeper Chay Lapin on defense, the Bruins won their first eight games before falling to Stanford in the first-place game of the NorCal Tournament. UCLA struggled through October, dropping their first two MPSF contests and posting a three-game losing streak to conference challengers USC, Stanford and California.

Knowing that an at-large berth to the four-team NCAA Tournament was no longer a possibility, Wright began focusing the team's training regimen on the upcoming three-day MPSF Tournament with four weeks to go in the season. Wright and the Bruins understood that an MPSF Tournament title would be UCLA's only ticket to the national tournament.

UCLA got its regular season back on track with consecutive wins against Loyola Marymount, UC Irvine, Pacific, Chapman and Pepperdine in the final weeks of October before defeating Long

Beach State the first day of November. After a 7-6 loss to USC at home, UCLA marched on with wins over UC Santa Barbara and Pepperdine in MPSF action to enter the conference tournament as the No. 4-seeded team.

UCLA won the MPSF Tournament in dominating fashion at crosstown rival USC. The Bruins defeated No. 5-seed Pepperdine on Friday afternoon, 8-5, paving the way for a fierce showdown against the Trojans in USC's home pool. After falling behind, 2-0, to USC in the first quarter, the Bruins used a 5-1 scoring run to build a 5-3 lead and never looked back. After four quarters, UCLA had earned an impressive 10-6 victory and sealed a berth in the conference tournament's title game.

The Bruins entered the MPSF Tournament's title match against California having lost the only meeting between the two schools earlier in the season (at UCLA). But tweaks and improvements along the way allowed UCLA to ensure a different outcome in the conference championship contest. In a game that featured three lead changes, UCLA opened a four-goal lead by the fourth quarter and held on for a thrilling 10-7 win over the Golden Bears.

The drama continued the following weekend, as UCLA and Loyola Marymount staged an epic overtime contest in the NCAA

Tournament semifinals. Tied 4-4 at halftime and leading, 7-5, through three quarters, UCLA could not hold the Lions at bay in the final period. LMU outscored the Bruins by a 3-1 margin in the fourth quarter, sending the game to two three-minute overtime sessions. Senior Cole Consani's goal with 32 seconds left in the game helped UCLA push through to the NCAA championship contest against USC.

The Bruins opened the NCAA title match by falling behind, 3-0, after the first quarter. Unfazed, UCLA battled back on goals from juniors Emilio Vieira and Ben Hohl and freshman Griffin White to trail by just one goal. After USC padded its margin to 6-3, UCLA answered with consecutive goals, slicing the Trojans' cushion to 6-5. Trailing 7-6 with 16 seconds to play, the Bruins were unable to fire a last-second shot and had to settle for second place.

At season's end, Davidson earned MPSF Player of the Year honors in addition to securing first-team All-America acclaim. Hohl and Lapin were named second-team All-America honorees, while Consani, White and Cullen Hennessy were named honorable mention All-America selections.

MOUNTAIN PACIFIC SPORTS FEDERATION

The Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) was established during the 1992-1993 season to serve the competitive needs of member institutions from the Big West, Pacific-10 and Western Athletic Conferences, as well as other selected universities in the western United States; and to provide championships competition for Division I intercollegiate Olympic sports in a conference setting. The founding principles on which the MPSF was originally formed were to provide enhanced competition and championship opportunities for sports without conference affiliation; to contain the costs of competition; and to ensure the survival of sports impacted by Title IX and other fiscal pressures. The Federation has also served as an incubator for emerging women's sports and as a safe harbor for sports impacted by conference realignments. Since its inaugural season the Federation has seen its primary conference membership grow by the addition of the Mountain West and West Coast Conferences and their respective member institutions, as well as the addition of women's water polo, women's gymnastics, women's lacrosse and men's and women's swimming. As a testament to its viability, the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation continues to successfully navigate the ever-changing sea of college sports by fostering contraction and expansion of its sports portfolio to meet the dynamic needs of its members. As the MPSF begins its 19th year in 2010-2011 and continues its legacy of championship competition, it affirms the vision of its founders and the relevance of its three founding principles, particularly during today's tumultuous economic times.

In 2010-2011, the MPSF will sponsor competition in 11 intercollegiate Olympic sports, adding men's and women's swimming for the first time, while serving approximately 1,800 student-athletes on 86 teams from 38 universities in 12 western states. All MPSF teams compete at the NCAA Division I level in men's soccer, men's and women's water polo, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's gymnastics, men's and women's swimming, women's lacrosse and men's volleyball. MPSF champions are eligible to compete in NCAA

Championships with MPSF men's soccer, men's and women's water polo, and men's volleyball champions earning automatic qualification into NCAA championship events. Joining the Federation for the first-time in women's swimming is Northern Colorado and University of San Diego, while former MPSF members Loyola Marymount and Cal Poly have also elected to compete for the Federation's women's swimming championship. UC Irvine will rejoin the MPSF in women's indoor track and field after a half-decade absence.

During the 2009-2010 season, the MPSF teams won four NCAA championship team titles, bringing the Federation's total to 61 since the first season of competition in 1992-93. In 2009-10 USC led the charge by winning both the NCAA men's and women's water polo titles while Stanford took the NCAA men's volleyball crown with Oregon's women's indoor track and field team winning its first-ever NCAA Championship team title. UCLA won three MPSF titles including men's and women's water polo, as well as men's indoor track and field. In addition to its men's volleyball title, Stanford won its sixth consecutive women's lacrosse championship. Oregon also took the women's indoor track and field crown while Oklahoma won its 10th MPSF men's gymnastics championship in 12 years. Sacramento State grabbed its first-ever MPSF men's soccer title while UC Davis nabbed its second women's gymnastics title in three seasons.

Al Beard has been the Federation's only executive director, taking the reins after being selected by the MPSF Administrative Committee in December 1997 after a national search. Beard's position was established as a result of the Federation's continued growth and emerging tradition of NCAA and national championship caliber play, including 43 NCAA team championships during his tenure. Beard, who formerly served on the athletics staff at his alma mater, UC Davis, where the integration of student and athlete is a long-rooted philosophy, oversees the administration of all Federation



sports, having worked closely with administrators and coaches from more than 45 different universities over the course of his administration. Beard presided over the transition of the Federation from what was initially a scheduling alliance to what is now nationally recognized as the most successful NCAA Division I Olympic sports conference. Beard directs all aspects of MPSF competition, including championships, officiating, rules compliance, scheduling, media relations, broadcasting, sponsorships and NCAA relations, while also shaping conference legislation, facilitating annual meetings and providing direction and communication for the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Administrative and Executive Committees. In 2004, Beard completed a four-year term, three years as chair, on the NCAA Men's Water Polo Championships Committee and one year as chair of the inaugural NCAA Men's and Women's Water Polo Rules Committee. Beard feels privileged to work with coaches and student-athletes who compete at the highest levels, including those who compete on USA national teams as coaches or players in international and Olympic competition. With his in NCAA Olympic sports, Beard has been called upon to serve as liaison to the national governing bodies for amateur athletics in the United States and the United States Olympic Committee. Beard received his undergraduate degree in physical education from UC Davis before attaining his Masters of Business Administration from California State University, Sacramento. Beard, who lives in Woodland, California, has two daughters who have been active in high school and club sports.
