The same group of Bruins that lost a heartbreaking extra-innings final in the NCAA Championship Series last season will be back for another shot in 2006. UCLA had just one senior on last year's squad, bullpen catcher Nicole Sandberg, and many of the returning Bruins put in off-season work to improve for the upcoming season. Add to that mix three new players and a 19-player UCLA roster will be ready to open its 2006 campaign at the Campbell/Cartier Tournament in San Diego on February 9.

PITCHERS/CATCHERS

After turning in a record-setting freshman season, **Anjelica Selden** has spent the off-season fine-tuning her repertoire of pitches for the 2006 campaign. Last year, the Pac-10 Newcomer of the Year and Second-Team NFCA All-American set school single-season records for innings pitched and strikeouts as well as a 23-strikeout performance that is the highest single-game total by a Bruin pitcher from a 43-foot pitching distance.

"Jelly earned a wealth of experience last season," said UCLA head coach **Sue Enquist**. "She is capable of dominating any hitter who steps into the batters box and her challenge for this season is to maintain her level of excellence throughout the season."

Joining Selden in the circle will be junior **Lisa Dodd**, a two-time All-WCWS honoree whose athletic ability makes her a valuable asset for Enquist anywhere on the diamond. Although her finesse game from the pitching rubber does not yield the same high strikeout numbers as Selden, the change in style makes Dodd even more valuable to the Bruins.

"Lisa worked hard in the off-season to refine her pitches," said Enquist, "and she will be called upon this year to help lead the team in the circle. Lisa has great value to this team offensively as well as in the circle and elsewhere defensively."

Behind the plate will be a highly skilled, experienced group of catchers, led by senior All-Pac-10 selection **Emily Zaplatosch**. An All-WCWS selection last year, Zaplatosch led the Bruins in doubles and RBIs and was perfect defensively on 558 chances.

"Emily is a leader on this team," said Enquist. "She manages the highs and lows of the game extremely well and a lot of the players on this team look to her for leadership."

Joining Zaplatosch behind the plate is junior **Jaisa Creps**. Shoulder surgery during her freshman season and the

resulting rehabilitation has limited her playing time, but she is healthy for the 2006 season.

Junior **Shana Stewart** has a thankless job handling the Bruin pitchers in the bullpen, where she will be joined by sophomore **Jen Schroeder**, who also could see time DP and first base.

INFIELD

UCLA returns a very experienced group of infielders for the 2006 season. Around the horn, starters are expected to include senior **Andrea Duran** at third base, junior **Jodie Legaspi** at shortstop, senior **Caitlin Benyi** at second base and junior **Ashley Herrera** or Lisa Dodd at first base.

An All-Pac-10 first team selection a year ago, Duran continues to showcase her lightning-quick reflexes at the hot corner, where she turned in a .950 fielding percentage. Duran is also an outstanding offensive player, hitting in the critical leadoff spot for the second half of last season when she broke the UCLA single-season record with eight triples, tied for the team lead in steals and was second on the team with a .317 batting average.

"I believe that Andrea Duran is the best in the country at her position," said Enquist. "She has great reactions, a great glove and impressive versatility. She is a marquee player in this program, and when Dre does well, the team does well."

Legaspi enters her third season as UCLA's starting shortstop. An Honorable Mention All-Pac-10 selection last season, Legaspi was second on the team with nine home runs and 36 RBIs.

"I continue to be impressed by Jodie's commitment in the off season," said Enquist. "She is a step quicker both laterally on defense and down the line offensively. She is a go-to player in our offensive lineup and we will rely on her heavily to drive in runs."

A two-time NFCA All-American, Benyi was UCLA's top hitter last season, finishing with team-highs of a .333 batting average, 14 home runs and a .643 slugging percentage as well as anchoring the team defensively at second base.

"Caitlin's offensive skill combined with her defensive consistency and emotional leadership make her an important leader on this team," said Enquist. "She is an integral part of what we are going to try to accomplish this season."

Enquist has several options at first base.

Herrera spent a majority of the innings during UCLA's fall schedule at first base and should hold down that position when Dodd is pitching. Offensively,

Herrera hit in the bottom-third of the lineup last season, turning in six doubles and three home runs, including one in UCLA's WCWS opener against Cal. Herrera finished last season starting in left field and is expected to play there when Dodd is not pitching. "Lisa is our best utility infielder," said Enquist.

Kristen Dedmon is yet another option for Enquist at first base. Dedmon saw time at the position last season as well as at DP, turning in six home runs and 26 RBIs. Dodd finished the 2005 season as UCLA's starter at first base and could continue to see time there when she is not in the circle.

Enquist also has a trio of solid substitutes at her disposal for the four infield positions. Senior **Alissa Eno** is capable of stepping in defensively as well as playing a critical role for the Bruins as a pinch runner. **Danielle Peterson's** role expanded towards the end of last season, culminating in a game-winning RBI double during UCLA's comeback 5-4 victory over Georgia in game two of the NCAA Super Regionals. Junior transfer **Celina Rubalcaba** comes to the Bruins after spending two years at Fullerton College, where she earned NFCA All-America honors and Co-MVP notice from the Orange Empire Conference at shortstop.

OUTFIELD

Junior centerfielder Tara Henry returns to anchor the Bruin outfield. Last season, Henry had a team-high 10 stolen bases. "Tara has excellent instincts as a centerfielder," said

Enquist. "She has great speed and leadership in the outfield and is a strong threat offensively with her slapping game."

Sophomore Krista Colburn had a dream start to her college career, connecting for hits on her first eight plate appearances as a Bruin while starting all 60 games as a true freshman. Junior Whitney Holum will also vie for time in the outfield. Last season, Holum saw time in the outfield and at DP. Several other players have the potential to see playing time in the outfield, including Dodd, Herrera and Stewart.

In addition to UCLA's outfield speed, the team will have two other players who will primarily serve as pinch runners. Utility pitcher **Kelsey Enquist**, the niece of UCLA head coach Sue Enquist. **Maryn Oyoung** will join Enquist as one of UCLA's wealth of pinch runners this season.

OVERVIEW

The Bruins will begin their 2006 schedule at the Campbell/Cartier Tournament in San Diego, playing five games over the first four days of the season.

"I'm excited about this season because this team collectively understands what it means to respect the game," said Enquist.

"We have a wonderful complement in the circle with Dodd and Selden. We have competition behind the plate with Zaplatosch, Creps and Schroeder. We will have speed on the corners with Duran and Herrera and stability up the middle with Benyi and Legaspi. In the outfield, we will be fleet-footed with strong arms and great reads with five or six players vying for the three starting spots.

"Although we are top-heavy with experience for the first time in a long while, with either seven or eight upperclass starters depending on who is pitching, I look forward to this team showing its growth and working towards our goals as a team."

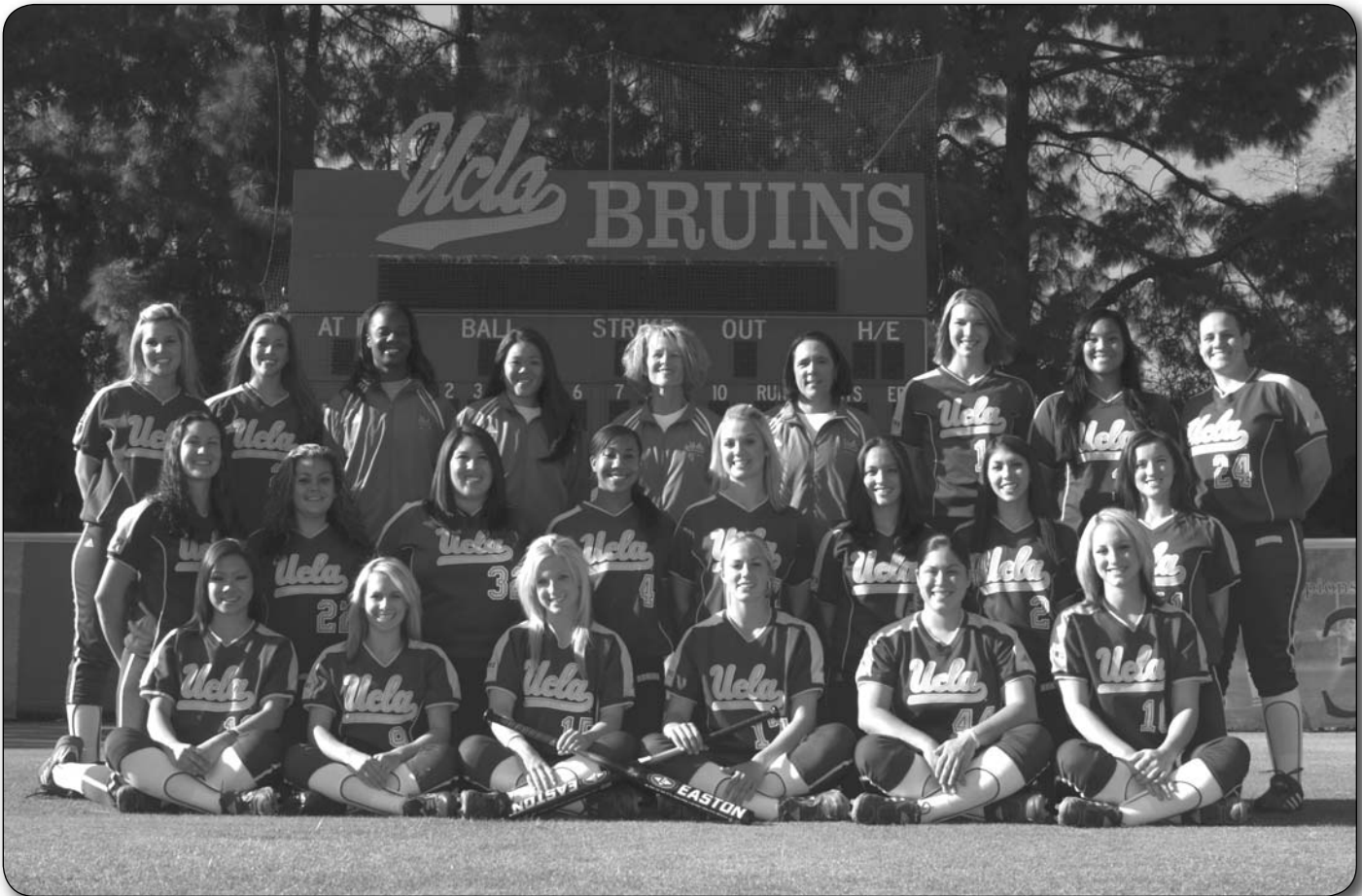

The 2006 season marks Sue Enquist's 18th campaign as head coach of the Bruin softball program. It is her 27th year as part of UCLA's softball coaching staff and her 30th year of involvement with the program as either a coach or player.

This is Enquist's 10th season as the sole head coach for the Bruins. Enquist took over that role beginning with the 1997 season, following the retirement of longtime Bruin mentor Sharron Backus. The two served as co-head coaches from 1989-96.

Before being named co-head coach, Enquist coached nine seasons (1980-88) as an assistant under Backus. As a student-athlete playing for Backus, Enquist led UCLA to its first National Championship in softball, a 1978 AIAW title. Enquist was the tournament's leading hitter as UCLA won its first softball National Championship.

Since that time, Enquist has been a member of the UCLA coaching staff for all of its 10 NCAA Championships, the most of any school. The NCAA brought women's sports under its umbrella beginning with the 1981-82 academic year. UCLA won that inaugural NCAA softball championship, and has since played in a record 17 championship games or series, winning titles in 1982, '84, '85, '88, '89, '90, '92, '99, 2003 and '04.

After graduating high school in December of 1974, Enquist went on to play four seasons for Backus from 1975-78. Enquist became the prototypical player for Bruin softball in terms of attitude, desire and will to win. UCLA's first softball All-American, Enquist led the Bruins in doubles three times and twice led UCLA in batting average and triples.

Enquist established the UCLA career batting average record with an impressive .401 mark, and was the first Bruin to complete her career with a batting average over .400. That career batting average record stood for 24 years, until Stacey Nuvean completed her illustrious career in 2002. Enquist's No. 6 jersey was retired on April 29, 2000, becoming the third number in Bruin softball history to be retired, joining the No. 16 of Lisa Fernandez and No. 1 of Dot Richardson.

A three-time ASA All-American for the Raybestos Braketts, Enquist helped lead that team to four ASA National Championships in 1976, '77, '78 and '80. She also enjoyed success as a player at the international level, earning gold medals at

three National Sports Festivals, the 1978 World Championships and the 1979 Pan American Games.

Enquist earned her bachelor's degree in kinesiology from UCLA in 1980. A native of San Clemente, Calif., Enquist surfed professionally from 1979-81 and continues to be an avid surfer. She currently resides in Huntington Beach, Calif.

The following is a list of Enquist's accomplishments and honors:

- Enquist was awarded the 2004 C. Vivian Stringer Coaching Award by the United States Sports Academy for her accomplishments at UCLA. The award pays tribute to those who have made significant contributions to sports, and is named in honor of C. Vivian Stringer, the Women's Basketball Hall of Famer who is the only coach to take three different schools to the Final Four.

- In December, 2005, Enquist was announced as a Hall of Fame Inductee by the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.

- Enquist and the Bruin coaching staff earned the National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) National Coaching Staff of the Year award following the 2004 season. She was also named the National Coach of the Year in 1992.

- The Bruin coaching staff was chosen as the 2000 and 2004 NFCA Pacific Region Coaching Staff of the Year. The Bruin staff also received the Regional honor in 1991 and '92.

- She is a two-time Pac-10 Coach of the Year, earning the honor in 1995 and '99.

- Enquist was the first softball inductee to the UCLA Hall of Fame, as a member of the Class of 1993. There are currently seven Bruin softball players in the Hall of Fame, including Enquist, Debbie Doom, Dot Richardson, Sheila (Cornell) Douty, Tracy Compton, Lisa Longaker and Lisa Fernandez. Former head coach Sharron Backus was inducted in 2001, her first year of eligibility.

- As one of eight softball coaches chosen to work with the U.S. National Team, Enquist was involved in the preparation of the gold medal winning U.S. Olympic Team for the 1996 Summer Games in Atlanta, GA, the inaugural Games for softball as an Olympic medal sport.

- Enquist was the head coach of the 1993 Olympic Festival Championship team, and coached the USA Pre Elite National Team in July, 1994.
- She was also a member of the coaching staff for the gold medal winning 1994 World Championship team, contested in Canada.
- Enquist was among the list of "20th Century Bruins" put together by *UCLA Magazine* at the close of 1999.
- Since Enquist's elevation to co-head coach in 1989, 31 players have earned 55 All-American honors.
- Enquist was UCLA's first All-American, earning the honor in 1978 after being named All-Region in 1976, '77 and '78.
- Seven former Bruins participated with the gold medal-winning 2000 U.S. Olympic Team. All seven (Christie Ambrosi, Jennifer Brundage, Sheila Cornell Douty, Lisa Fernandez, Stacey Nuve-man, Dot Richardson and alternate Amanda Freed) were coached by Enquist during their UCLA careers.
- Five Bruins, again all coached by Enquist, won gold medals at the Athens Olympics in 2004, including Fernandez, Freed, Tairia (Mims) Flowers, Nuve-man, and Natasha Watley.
- All three of UCLA's current assistant coaches (Kelly Inouye-Perez, Gina Vecchione and volunteer assistant Natasha Watley) are UCLA graduates and were coached by Enquist during their Bruin careers.
- Completed a series of 20 instructional videos, released following the 2003 collegiate season.
- Has partnered with former UCLA and MLB catcher and current Detroit Tigers hitting coach Don Slaught on the RightViewPro hitting instructional software.
- Invented the SB401 training bat and the Kwik-Slide Sliding Wrap
- Inducted into the Capistrano Unified School District Hall of Fame in October, 2000.
- Enquist has 1,264 wins in her Bruin softball career as a player and coach, combined.

Kelly Inoue-Perez begins her 13th season as an assistant coach for the Bruins. Inoue-Perez graduated from UCLA with a psychology degree in 1993 after competing as the starting catcher on three Bruin NCAA Championship teams in 1989, '90 and '92.

Inoue-Perez works primarily with the pitchers and catchers, but also provides assistance in all aspects of the program, including the identification of and communication with prospective student athletes. She also oversees and administers year-round camps and clinics both locally and nationwide and is responsible for coordinating the Diamond Club, UCLA Softball's booster organization. Inoue-Perez has done instructional videos on catching, which were released following the 2003 collegiate season.

A three-time All-Pac-10 selection (1989, '90 and '92), Inoue-Perez was an exceptionally strong fielder for the Bruins. She posted perfect fielding percentages her junior and senior seasons and committed only eight fielding errors in her entire four-year career. In ASA competition, Inoue was on four national championship teams, with the Panthers (1984, '85 and '89) and the Raiders (1986). She also competed on an international level in Japan in 1985 and in Peru in 1987 (Pan American Tournament).

As a player, her career can be characterized by her comeback after sitting out the 1991 season recovering from shoulder surgery. She went on to enjoy her best season in 1992, earning all-tournament honors after catching every game in the College World Series.

During her playing career, Inoue-Perez caught several elite pitchers, including Lisa Fernandez, Lisa Longaker and DeeDee Weiman and is able to draw on that experience while coaching the Bruins.

Inoue-Perez and her husband, Gerardo Perez, currently reside in Cerritos. Along with Kelly's exploits on the diamond, Gerardo competed as a catcher/DH for Cerritos College from 1988-90 and helped lead the Falcons to the 1989 Junior College National Championship. After a stellar career at Cerritos, he went on to compete at nearby Loyola Marymount University, earning first-team All-West Coast Conference honors his junior and senior seasons. He currently teaches at Lexington Junior High School and coaches baseball at Gahr High School in Cerritos. The couple has two children, Michael (six years old) and Kylie (one).

In her seventh season as a member of the Bruin coaching staff, Gina Vecchione will continue her work with the Bruin outfielders and hitters, as well as coordinating UCLA's travel arrangements among other duties. When the UCLA coaching staff was tabbed as the 2000 NFCA Pacific Region Coaching Staff of the year, it was the second consecutive such honor for Vecchione, who was a member of the Oregon State staff that earned the same award in 1999.

Since Vecchione joined the Bruin coaching staff, UCLA has played in the NCAA Championship game or series in five of her six seasons, winning back-to-back NCAA titles in 2003 and '04.

Prior to her return to Westwood in the summer of 1999, Vecchione spent five seasons at Oregon State (1995-99), and was the top assistant to former Bruin Kirk Walker when she left for UCLA. Oregon State was named the 1999 National Fastpitch Coaches Association Coaching Staff of the Year, as the Beavers finished fourth in the Pac-10 before advancing to the NCAA Regional at LSU, forcing a second Regional Championship game with Southwest Missouri State for a trip to the College World Series.

Vecchione also has instructional videos to her credit, with the most recent release having followed the 2003 collegiate season.

Vecchione's coaching career also includes three seasons as an assistant coach for the ASA's California Commotion, a team that won three consecutive women's major fastpitch national titles. After the conclusion of her collegiate career, Vecchione played 12 seasons with the Raysbestos Brakettes

of Stratford, Conn., winners of eight ASA titles and three World titles. Vecchione was named to the ASA All-America team seven times, and was the top hitter at the 1988 national tournament with a .444 average.

Vecchione's playing career at UCLA included All-Region selections in 1980, '81 and '82 as an outfielder for the Bruins. In 1981 and '82, Vecchione shared the team lead in triples and RBI, and was the team leader in doubles for the 1981 campaign. In her senior season, 1982, Vecchione was a member of the All-College World Series Team along with teammates Debbie Doom (MVP), Barb Booth, Dot Richardson and Barb Young, as the Bruins won the inaugural NCAA Softball Championship. The Bruins defeated Fresno State, 2-0 in eight innings to earn the title that year. Additionally, Vecchione earned second-team All-America honors.

Vecchione earned softball's top honor in 1997, when she became the first UCLA player inducted into the Amateur Softball Association's Hall of Fame. Former Bruin head coach Sharron Backus is the only other Bruin in the ASA Hall of Fame.

Immediately after the conclusion of her collegiate playing career, Vecchione remained in Westwood, serving as a volunteer assistant coach for the softball program while working in event management at UCLA. She was also a member of the 1983 U.S. National Team for the 1983 Pan American Games. A native of New Rochelle, N.Y., Vecchione earned a bachelor's degree in sociology from UCLA in 1984.

Olympic Gold Medalist Natasha Watley returns to UCLA this season as the team's volunteer assistant coach.

A four-time first-team NFCA All-American at shortstop during her playing career at UCLA, Watley was named the Honda Award winner for the sport of softball at the conclusion of her senior season in 2003 and went on to become the second softball recipient of the Honda Broderick Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top collegiate female athlete. She joins USA Softball teammate and former Bruin Lisa Fernandez as the only softball recipients of the Honda Broderick Cup.

During her UCLA career, Watley set numerous school records including hits (395), runs scored (252), at-bats (878), triples (21) and stolen bases (158). Her total for career stolen bases is more than triple that of the second-best total in UCLA history (Olympic Gold Medalist Amanda Freed with 51). She also owns three of the four 100+ hit seasons in UCLA softball history,

reaching triple figures in each of her final three seasons as a Bruin.

Watley's collegiate career ended in dramatic style as Watley led the Bruins to the 2003 NCAA Championship, the 10th National Championship in program history.

Following her collegiate career, Watley was named to the 2004 U.S. Olympic Team, where she would go on to start at shortstop and hit .400 (12-for-30) for the United States in the Olympic Tournament. Watley started all nine games for Team USA, turning in a double, a triple and five stolen bases in those starts.

Watley continues to train with the U.S. National Team in preparation for the 2006 World Championships and 2008 Beijing Olympics. She also played professionally last summer for the NY/NJ Juggernauts of the National Pro Fastpitch league and is signed to play for the NPF's Philadelphia Force during the summer of 2006.
