## **UCLA Women's Water Polo – 2007 NCAA Champions**

The 2007 UCLA women's water polo team enjoyed tremendous success, winning both the MPSF Tournament title and the NCAA Championship, the Bruins' third-consecutive NCAA title. Senior attacker Kelly Rulon broke the school's all-time scoring record, registering 70 goals for the third consecutive season to finish with 237 career goals.

UCLA's NCAA Championship marked the final collegiate game for five Bruins - Molly Cahill, Emily Feher, Kacy Kunkel, Jenna Murphy and Kelly Rulon. All five players contributed to each of UCLA's NCAA championship seasons in 2005, 2006 and 2007. Rulon, who redshirted the 2004 season while training for the summer Olympics in Athens, Greece, helped lead the program to the 2003 NCAA title as a true freshman.

The 2007 Bruins raced to a 10-0 record by late February, registering wins against California, Hawaii, Indiana, USC, Pacific, Santa Clara and UC Irvine. In the team's final contest at the UC Irvine Invitational, UCLA dropped its first match of the season to Stanford, 8-4. In early April, the Bruins faced both USC and Stanford on consecutive weekends in MPSF play. UCLA registered a crucial 8-7 victory against USC on April 7, before dropping a 7-6 decision to Stanford in overtime the following Saturday.

With a mark of 20-2 after that loss, the Bruins never looked back. In the MPSF Tournament, UCLA cruised past Long Beach State, 17-5, on day one. In their semifinal match against USC, the Bruins won by a 10-9 margin. In the MPSF Championship match, UCLA recorded an impressive 9-3 win over Stanford, a team that finished the regular season with a 12-0 MPSF record. After routing Pomona-Pitzer, 22-0, in the NCAA Tournament, the Bruins registered wins over USC and Stanford to win the program's ninth national championship.

## Mountain Pacific Sports Federation

The Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) was established during the 1992-1993 academic year to serve the competitive needs of member institutions from the Big West, Pacific-10, Mountain West, Western Athletic and West Coast Conferences and other selected universities in the western United States, and to provide championship competition for Division I intercollegiate Olympic sports in a conference setting. The MPSF was originally formed to provide enhanced competition and championship opportunities for sports without conference affiliation; to contain the costs of competition; and to ensure the survival of sports impacted by Title IX and other fiscal pressures. The Federation has served as an incubator for emerging women's sports and as a safe harbor for sports impacted by conference realignments. In 2006-2007, the Federation celebrated its 15th year of competition and is affirmed that is more relevant today than at any other time since its inception. As a testament to its viability, the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation continues to successfully manage the ever-changing face of college sports by fostering contraction and expansion of its intercollegiate athletics portfolio to meet the dynamic needs of its member institutions and conferences.

In 2007-2008, the MPSF will again sponsor nine Olympic intercollegiate sports while serving over 1500 student-athletes and approximately 75 head coaches from 31 universities in 12 western states. All MPSF teams compete at the NCAA Division I level in men's soccer, men's and women's water polo, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's gymnastics, women's lacrosse and men's volleyball. All MPSF champions are eligible to compete in NCAA Championships with MPSF men's soccer, men's

and women's water polo, and men's volleyball champions earning automatic qualification into NCAA championship events. The MPSF portfolio of teams for 2007-2008 season will remain the same with the Federation serving 31 institutions sponsoring 74 Division I teams in nine sports. 2007-2008 will be a water-shed season as the Federation looks to do a makeover, redesigning its logo and graphic presentation, and launching a new website during the Fall of 2007. The MPSF will also look to more technological advances as it upgrades its level of conference services to participating member institutions.

In 2006-2007, four MPSF teams won NCAA championships while almost a score of teams and hundreds of student-athletes competed in NCAA post-season competition. UCLA won its historic 100th NCAA team title in women's water polo after winning the MPSF title, in contrast to UC Irvine, which won its first NCAA team title by taking the 2007 NCAA National Collegiate Championship in men's volleyball after pulling out its first-ever MPSF men's volleyball championship. California won the NCAA men's water polo championship for the first time since the MPSF's inaugural season in 1992-1993 after winning the MPSF championship, and Arizona State beat the field to win the NCAA Women's Indoor Track and Field Championship in Fayetteville, Arkansas, also after taking the MPSF title.

Other Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Champions for the 2006-2007 season includes New Mexico's third-consecutive conference title in men's soccer and the Lobos' fifth in six years; Washington earned its second-consecutive MPSF men's indoor track and field championship with Seattle Pacific was also the

champion in women's gymnastics for the second year in a row; while Stanford collected a MPSF title three-peat in women's lacrosse.

Al Beaird has been the Federation's only executive director, taking the reigns after being selected by the MPSF Administrative Committee in 1998. Beaird's position was established as a result of the Federation's successful growth and well established tradition of NCAA and national championship caliber play. The former Director of Youth and Community Programs for UC Davis Athletics, Beaird oversees the administration of all Federation sports, while working closely with head coaches and administrators from over 30 universities competing in Division I athletics. Beaird oversees all aspects of MPSF competition, including scheduling, officiating, championships, media relations, broadcasting, NCAA relations, and sponsorships, while also facilitating conference legislation, annual coaches' business meetings and Federation Administrative and Executive Committee meetings. In 2004, Beaird completed a four-year term, including three years as chair of the NCAA Men's Water Polo Championships and Rules Committee and also currently serves as liaison to the USOC and national governing bodies for amateur athletics in the United States.

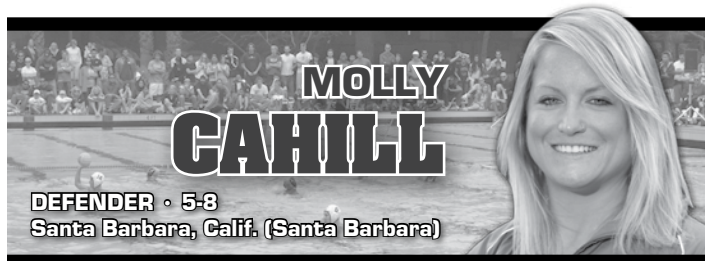

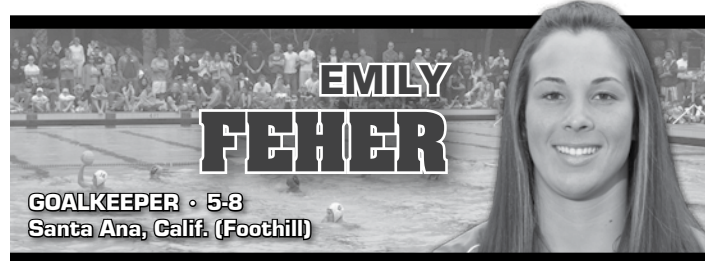
