Mike Maynard enters his third season as the UCLA Director of Track and field overseeing the men's and women's programs following three seasons as men's head coach as well as the throws coach for both the men's and women's squads. Prior to coming to UCLA, Maynard was head coach/throws coach at Boise State for nine years.

In his second season at the helm of both programs the Bruins made large strides on the national stage. The men's track and field program was headlined in 2014 by a dual meet win over rival USC and some impressive individual performances. Five Bruins earned USTFCCCA All-American honors. At the Pac-12 Championships sophomore Nicholas Scarvelis won the shot put title with a throw of 63-10.25, to win the event by over three feet. Senior Julian Wruck defended his Pac-12 discus title with a mark of 210-9. En route to earning All-American accolades, Wruck placed second at the NCAA meet in the discus, Scarvelis finished 10th in the shot put, Matthew Kosecki was 12th in the discus, Cody Danielson was 14th in the javelin and Nick Hartle was 6th in the 800m. During the indoor season, Marcus Nilsson and Mike Woepse earned USTFCCCA All-American honors after Nilsson placed eighth in the heptathlon and Woepse was 13th in the pole vault.

The UCLA's women's program showcased six student-athletes that were named USTFCCCA All-Americans. Leading the way for the Bruins at the NCAA Championships was junior Kylie Price in the long jump, who placed third to earn her third straight All-America honor. Senior Natasha Kolbo capped off her Bruin career with a 13th place finish in the pole vault. Junior Zibby Boyer made her first NCAA meet appearance and earned All-America accolades by placing 17th in the high jump. Junior Alexis Walker was named an All-American in just her first season competing in the heptathlon. A pair of UCLA hurdlers also garnered All-American honors as Brea Buchanan and Trinity Wilson made the finals in the 100m hurdles at the NCAA meet. During the indoor campaign, a trio of Bruins earned USTFCCCA All-American honors. Ida Storm was runner-up in the weight throw while Kelsey Smith placed 16th in the 3,000m and Kylie Price was 14th in the long jump.

Under his direct tutelage, Maynard was instrumental in the development of three javelin throwers that qualified for nationals. Newcomer Zaybree Haury tossed the third longest throw in school history en route to qualifying for the national meet while redshirt freshman Cody Danielson threw the ninth best mark and also qualified for the NCAA meet. Derek Eager came back from injury and also qualified for the national meet.

In the discus Wruck and Kosecki shined once again as and during the indoor season Ida Storm hit a big personal best to earn runner-up honors at the national championship.

In his first season overseeing both programs both the men and women finished in the top five of the Pac-12 with the men placing third and the women fourth. The men went

on to place 12th at the NCAA Outdoor Championships and the women placed in the top 25 with a 20th place finish. At the 2013 Indoor Championships, the women were 15th while the men placed 49th.

Individually, Julian Wruck posted one of the finest seasons in collegiate track, culminating in a NCAA title and an appearance at The Bowerman Trophy presentation, where he was one of three male finalists for the prestigious award. Wruck set the collegiate record in the discus and boasted the top 27 throws of any collegian in 2013.

At the NCAA Indoor Championships UCLA had four All-Americans. Mike Woepse (7th in pole vault), Kylie Price (4th in long jump), Brea Buchanan (5th in 60 mH) and Allison Koresell (5th in pole vault). At the outdoor championships, nine earned All-American honors. Wruck (1st in discus), Marcus Nilsson (3rd in decathlon), Alec Faldermeyer (7th in high jump), Dominic Giovannoni (13th in decathlon), Turquoise Thompson (3rd in 400mH), Ida Storm (5th in hammer), Kylie Price (6th in long jump/100m) and Brea Buchanan earned honorable mention All-American accolades. Woepse and Wruck also won Pac-12 titles in their respective events.

In 2012 the men continued to excel. At the Pac-12 Championships, the Bruin men finished fourth overall with 86 points as Alec Faldermeyer and redshirt Matthew Kosecki captured conference titles in their respective events. The men's team finished 17th overall at the NCAA Championships, led by impressive performances from three sophomores - Mike Woepse (2nd in pole vault), Alec Faldermeyer (3rd in hammer), and Marcus Nilsson (6th in decathlon), which earned all three first-team All-America honors. The 4x100m relay of Jamal Alston, Maxwell Dyce, R.J. Frasier and Laijon White earned second-team All-America honors (16th) along with discus thrower Matthew Kosecki (10th). Derek Eager (javelin) and Dyce (200m) earned honorable mention All-America honors in their respective events.

In the NCAA indoor Championships, the Bruins were represented by sophomores Alec Faldermeyer, Mike Woepse and Marcus Nilsson and freshman Dustin Fay. In the pole vault, Woepse finished 14th overall and earned second-team USTFCCCA All-American honors. In the 5000m, Fay did not race due to an injury. Faldermeyer placed fifth in the 35-lb weight throw and picked up the third first-team All-American honor of his career. Nilsson finished eleventh in the heptathlon and earned the first All-American (2nd team) of his career.

The 2011 season was highlighted by double All-American as a freshman, Alec Faldermeyer (weight/hammer) and standout half-miler Cory Primm (1:44.71, new school record). Faldermeyer also won the 2011 USAF Junior National hammer crown and a gold medal at the PanAm Junior Games. Maynard also coached Derek Eager, a redshirt during the 2011 season, to the USAF Jr. National javelin crown and a spot in the PanAm Junior Games. The men finished tied for third at the Pac-10 championships as Primm and Greg Woepse captured individual titles. Several athletes competed at NAAs and earned All-American honors as the men finished 37th as a team.

Maynard also coached then freshman hammer thrower, Ida Storm, to double All-American honors in the weight throw and hammer in 2011.

In his first year in charge of the men's program (2010), the Bruins found much success. During the indoor and outdoor season, UCLA athletes posted two school records and four marks on the all-time top-10 list. Cory Primm set the school record in the 800m (1:45.70), while the DMR team broke the indoor mark (9:31.70). The 4x100m relay, Primm, Scott Crawford (800m) and Dylan Knight (steeple) each competed at the NCAA Outdoor meet, with Primm placing fifth to earn All-American honors. The 4x100m relay also earned All-American honors after advancing to the relay final at Outdoors.

Three throwers redshirted the 2010 season, while others battled injuries throughout the year. Bo Taylor, Nigel Davies, Tom Nagengast and Mark Weber all competed in the post-season.

In his nine years as the head coach at Boise State, Maynard led a program which produced several historic events - back-to-back (2004 and 2005) national cham-

pionships by Gabe Wallin in the men's javelin, over 50 new school record performances and 30 All-American accolades. The Broncos enjoyed unprecedented success behind Maynard's direction.

During the 2009 season, the men's team won the WAC Indoor Championship, finished 27th at the NCAA Indoor Championships and 25th at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The women's team placed 19th at the NCAA Indoor Championships.

The top individual highlight was Eleni Kafourou becoming the first female student-athlete at Boise State to win a NCAA National Championship (long jump). Along with Kafourou's national title, Boise State earned a total of seven NCAA All-America awards in track and field that year.

Boise State also made its presence known at the national level with Maynard at the helm with four straight top 25 finishes for the men's team at the NCAA National Outdoor Championships. The Bronco men were 16th at the 2006 NCAA National Outdoor Championships, 14th in 2005, 15th in 2004 and 24th in 2003. In 2009, the Bronco men finished 25th at the NCAA Outdoor meet.

Maynard guided Bronco student-athletes to over 70 individual WAC Championships and over 90 marks on Boise State's all-time top three performance lists.

Maynard came to Boise State following an outstanding assistant coaching career at the University of Arizona. He was the associate head track and field coach for the Wildcat program for 13 years prior to joining the Broncos. While coaching at Arizona, Maynard guided 32 individual NCAA Division I All-Americans, including three NCAA National Champions.

Maynard's coaching resume also includes a two-year stint as the assistant strength and conditioning coach at Arizona, where he worked with the Wildcat football program as well as being responsible for the Arizona track and field, swimming and tennis teams. He began his collegiate coaching career at Mesa Community College (Ariz.) where he was the assistant track and field coach from 1982-84, and in 1987.

Maynard was also instrumental in bringing a world-class facility to Bronco Track & Field. During his first two years leading the Broncos, Maynard and Boise State were successful in purchasing a world championship caliber track and helped construct the building to put it in. The Mondo track was used by USA Track and Field and the Georgia Dome for the national indoor championships. The building is the Idaho Sports Center located in the Idaho Center complex in Nampa, Idaho. The track was purchased with a \$250,000 cash gift from John Jackson, President of Jacksons Food Stores in Meridian, Idaho. Boise State has hosted several major meets, including six WAC Indoor Championships. The facility hosted its first national meet in 2005 with the USA Indoor Master's Championships. Boise State has submitted bids to host future NCAA Indoor National Championships.

Outside the collegiate world, Maynard has coached a World Champion, five different Olympians, a Pan American gold medalist, five USA Track and Field Champions and three American Junior Champions. One of Maynard's former athletes Tony Washington (1990-96), won the World Championship in the discus in 1999. Washington also won the gold medal in the discus at the 1991 Pan American Games along with five USA National Championships.

Maynard is currently an Executive Committee member of the United States Track Coaches Association and the NCAA Division I Track and Field Executive Committee. Maynard was also the head coach for the USA Track and Field team in its dual meet against Germany in 1996. He has served USA Track and Field as the Regional Decathlon Chairman, the United States Olympic Committee as an Elite Throws Clinician, and has been the lead throws clinician for the USA/Visa Decathlon team.

Maynard resides in Valencia with his wife, Dee. They have a daughter named Allison and a son named Michael.



## JOHN FRAZIER

Men's Head Coach  
2nd Season  
UCLA '86

John Frazier enters his second season at UCLA as the head men's track coach. He also directs the throws, primarily the shot put and discus.

In his first season at the helm of the men's program, Coach Frazier helped lead the Bruins to a dual meet win over rival USC and some impressive individual performances on the national stage. Five Bruins earned USTFCCA All-American honors. At the Pac-12 Championships sophomore Nicholas Scarvelis won the shot put title with a throw of 63-10.25, to win the event by over three feet. Senior Julian Wruck defended his Pac-12 discus title with a mark of 210-9. En route to earning All-American accolades, Wruck placed second at the NCAA meet in the discus, Scarvelis finished 10th in the shot put, Matthew Kosecki was 12th in the discus, Cody Danielson was 14th in the javelin and Nick Hartle was 16th in the 800m. During the indoor season, Marcus Nilsson and Mike Woepse earned USTFCCA All-American honors after Nilsson placed eighth in the heptathlon and Woepse was 13th in the pole vault.

Frazier was instrumental in the development of Pac-12 champion Nicholas Scarvelis, who went on to place 10th at the NCAA championship in the shot put. He also developed Braheme Days into one of the top shot putters in the world at the junior level. Days won the USATF Junior Track and Field Championship in the shot put and was followed by newcomer Amir Patterson. Days set the American junior record in the shot put with a throw of 69-5.25 at the 2014 Imperial Section of USATF Championship a couple weeks prior. Days capped off his summer with a bronze medal at the IAAF World Junior Championships.

Frazier returned to his alma mater ('82-'86) as men's head coach after most recently spending seven seasons on the coaching staff at the University of Tennessee, where he was an associate head coach and coach for men's and women's throws.

"My fellow coaches, the entire team and I are excited to welcome John Frazier back to Westwood and the UCLA family," said Maynard. "John's professionalism and the coaching expertise he brings will certainly help us to continue to move the programs forward toward our goals. He is renowned for his ability to recruit and develop world-class talent, and I believe that his experience as a UCLA student-athlete, as well as his personal understanding of the academic and

athletic expectations here, will aid him considerably in his new role."

With over 25 years of experience in the track and field coaching community specializing in coaching throwers, Frazier brings with him experience from stops at the University of Florida, the University of Arizona and Tennessee, among others. Throughout his career at the collegiate level, Frazier has produced 43 All-American athletes as well as four NCAA champions. Most recently, Volunteer javelin thrower Kyle Quinn earned second team All-America honors for his tenth place finish in Eugene at the 2013 NCAA Outdoor Championships.

Frazier's return to Westwood is a well-deserved homecoming for one of the great Bruin throwers ever to compete at Drake Stadium. Under legendary coaches Jim Bush, Bob Larsen, and Art Venegas, Frazier was a three-time All-American in the shot put during his UCLA career, earning first team honors at both NCAA Indoors and Outdoors in 1985 as well as at the 1986 Outdoor Championships.

In his four years of Bruin collegiate competition (1982/1983/1985/1986), UCLA was 38-1 in dual meet contests, including an unbeaten 3-0 mark vs. USC (the 1982 UCLA-USC dual meet was non-scoring). As a freshman in 1982 and a senior in 1986, the Bruins were the top-ranked dual meet team in the nation. He currently holds two all-time UCLA records--first, the No. 9 mark all-time in Bruins shot put history (65-2.75) and second, the No. 10 mark all-time in the men's hammer throw (208-6).

Frazier graduated from UCLA with a bachelor's degree in political science in 1986.



## JACK HOYT

Associate Head Coach/Jumps/Multis  
3rd Season  
Seattle Pacific '87

Jack Hoyt is in his third year as the Bruins Associate Head Coach. Hoyt's coaching duties include all of the jumps and multi-events. He supervises the greatest group of volunteer coaches in Bruin history, which includes; Anthony Curran (pole vault), and Sharon Day (heptathlon). Hoyt brings to the Bruin program over 20 years of coaching at the collegiate level. "I am so excited to be a Bruin! Coach Maynard has compiled an amazing staff and the team is more motivated than any team I've ever been around. Great things are coming to Westwood, that's for sure."

In 2014 the multi-events and jumps continued to be a strength for the Bruins. Under Hoyt's guidance, three earned All-American honors during the outdoor season and two were honored for their efforts during the indoor campaign.

Kylie Price soared to first-team honors by placing third overall at the 2013 NCAA Outdoor Championships while Zibby Boyer and Alexis Walker garnered honorable mention accolades in the high jump. Price was twice named the Pac-12 athlete of the week and Walker earned the honor once. During the indoor season Marcus Nilsson placed eighth overall to earn All-American honors in the heptathlon with a career-best 5,760 points while Price was named to the second team in the long jump.

Walker secured the 10th best heptathlon in school history in her very first try by accumulating 5,409 points. She also cleared 5-11.50 for the 10th best high jump in school history. Cody Crampton cleared 7-2.50 for the sixth best high jump at UCLA.

He also coached UCLA volunteer coach Sharon Day-Monroe to a new American record in the pentathlon. Day-Monroe won the 2014 USA Indoor Track & Field Championships with a record 4,805 points.

In 2013, Hoyt's inaugural season at UCLA, personal records were set in every event area. Kylie Price was an All-American at both Indoor and Outdoor Nationals and set a personal best of 21-4 in the long jump. UCLA's All-American pole vaulter, Michael Woepse, jumped a personal best 18-4, while his female counterparts, Allison Koresel (All-American) and Natasha Kolbo both set personal bests at 14-1 and 13-6. The two Bruin heptathletes each improved by over 350 points to 5,691 and 5,165. UCLA's decathletes made even bigger improvements to their scores with two NCAA qualifying marks. Marcus Nilsson placed 3rd at the NCAA Championship meet and later competed at the World Championships in Russia. In the men's long jump, Michael Perry surprised



everyone with a 3rd place PAC 12 showing and a personal best improvement of over a foot to 24-8. Dillon Stucky added a foot to his triple jump at 51-1. Faith Anumba returned to form in the triple (41-7) and long jumps (19-7) following a stress fracture in 2012. In the women's high jump, 6 women surpassed their marks from the previous year, 3 of whom qualified into the first round of the NCAA Championship Meet. Cody Crampton, the lone male high jumper, redshirted and will be joined in 2014 by 3 new freshmen all in the 7-foot range.

Prior to UCLA, Hoyt spent 7 years as the coach of field events, men's decathlon and women's heptathlon at Cal Poly (San Luis Obispo). During that time, Hoyt coached Sharon Day to national stardom in the heptathlon and high jump. In the fall of 2012, Day followed Hoyt to UCLA and had her best season to date. She set personal records in 6 of the 7 heptathlon events and finished 2013 with the 3rd best heptathlon score in the world with her USA Championship winning score of 6,550.

Day had a successful high jump career, winning the NCAA women's high jump event (6-4) in 2005 and making the U. S. team at the 2008 Olympics (Beijing, China). In 2009, Day's first year of full time heptathlon training, she made the USA World Championship Team in both the high jump and heptathlon. Her heptathlon success continued with a second-place finish at the USA National Championship Meet in 2010 and the top spot on the podium in 2011. At the 2012 Olympic Games in London, Day was the top U. S. finisher in the heptathlon. Hoyt has been Day's coach in all seven of the heptathlon events. Along with Day, Hoyt had three other athletes who competed at the 2012 Olympic Trials (two in the decathlon and one in the javelin).

During his tenure at Cal Poly-SLO, Hoyt coached two Olympians, five NCAA Division I scoring athletes, 10 NCAA Championship Final meet qualifiers, 37 Regional qualifiers and 19 conference champions. He showed his versatility with conference champions in the pole vault, high jump, long jump, javelin, discus, shot put, heptathlon and decathlon.

From 1989-2005, Hoyt coached nearly every event at his alma matre, Seattle Pacific University. During that time, he personally coached Division II All-Americans in the 100 Hurdles, 400 hurdles, 400 meters, high jump, long jump, pole vault, heptathlon, decathlon, shot put and javelin. He was the Head Coach for the men's and women's teams from 1999-2005. In his final season at SPU, Hoyt led the Falcon women to 13th at the NCAA Div. II Outdoor Championships and eighth indoors. That year, he also coached Danielle Ayers-Stamper to an NCAA indoor high jump title and 2nd in the heptathlon, and Chris Randolph to the NCAA Div. II decathlon title. During his six seasons without a campus track & field facility, Hoyt's SPU teams won a total of five outdoor and indoor conference championships. At SPU he earned a Regional Coach of the Year honor, was a five-time Conference Coach of the Year and produced 36 Div. II All-America athletes and 102 conference champions.

Hoyt was an All-American decathlete at Seattle Pacific University in 1987. He competed at the 1992 Olympic Trials in the decathlon where he was coached by current UCLA Director, Mike Maynard. Hoyt has held the SPU high jump record for over 25 years, and in 1990 broke the American Record for the decathlon high jump at 7-2.75". In 2004, Hoyt set the American Record in the decathlon for the over-40 age group. Even at 40 years of age, he was still over 15 feet in the pole vault and 6-5 in the high jump. Currently, he has slowed his athletic career down to lifting weights with his athletes and playing with his family at Santa Monica Beach.



**JOANNA HAYES**

Assistant Coach/Sprints/Hurdles  
2nd Season  
UCLA '01

Olympic gold medalist and NCAA champion Joanna Hayes has returned to UCLA as an assistant track and field coach for sprints, hurdles and relays. Hayes enters her second season with the Bruins.

In her first season she coached the duo of Brea Buchanan and Triity Wilson to the NCAA finals in the 100m hurdles. For their efforts the two earned USTFCCCA All-American honors.

Hayes won a gold medal in the 100m hurdles at the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens, setting an Olympic record with a time of 12.37. She finished the 2004 season ranked No. 1 in the world and earned USA Track & Field's Jesse Owens Award that year. She was also a gold medalist in the 400m hurdles at the 2003 Pan American Games.

At UCLA, Hayes captured the NCAA 400m Hurdles title as a senior in 1999 and won a total of seven Pac-10 titles in the hurdles and relays. She was a six-time All-American and helped lead UCLA to three consecutive Pac-10 team titles from 1997-99 and two consecutive runner-up finishes at the NCAA Outdoor Championships from 1998-99. During her four years as a Bruin from 1996-99, her teams went 39-0 in dual meets.

"We are all very excited to welcome back yet another Bruin as a member of our full time coaching staff," said UCLA Director of Track & Field/Cross Country Mike Maynard. "As an athlete, Joanna's experiences will be an invaluable asset, and as a coach her technical expertise will ignite our student-athletes' development. The addition of Coach Hayes to our staff, in combination with the recent placement of Coach John Henry Johnson, underscores our renewed commitment to the impressive UCLA legacy and tradition in the sprints and hurdles."

Hayes, who graduated from UCLA in 2001 with a degree in Sociology, has been a track and field coach at Harvard-Westlake School in Los Angeles since 2008 and was a coach at the Brentwood Middle School in 2003. She has also started the Joanna Hayes Foundation, which provides support for programs and services that work to develop the whole child with healthy minds, bodies and spirits.

"Returning to UCLA as a coach is such an honor for me, and I would like to thank Mike Maynard, John Henry Johnson, and John Frazier for putting their trust in me and believing that I can benefit this program and help contribute to the exceptional legacy of UCLA track & field," Hayes said. "To return to my alma mater and have the opportunity to give back to the institution that has given so much to me is a dream come true. I am a Bruin for life!"

Hayes is the third UCLA track and field alum to join the Bruin coaching staff this summer, following the return of John Frazier (UCLA '86) as men's head coach and John Henry Johnson Jr. (UCLA '90) as women's head coach.





## FOREST BRADEN

Assistant Coach/Distance  
6th Season  
Boise State '07

Forest Braden enters his sixth year with the Bruins where he coaches the long distance runners. Prior to coming to Westwood, he spent the 2008 season as a volunteer assistant with Gonzaga University where he worked closely with stand-out distance coach Pat Tyson in recruiting and facilitating training sessions.

The distance squad under the direction of Braden had some standout performances in 2014. Kelsey Smith capped off her junior season in impressive fashion. She etched her name in the UCLA record books by running the second fastest 3,000m in school history en route to earning All-American honors. During the outdoor season she clocked the second fastest 5,000m time at UCLA with a 16:01.30 and was an NCAA qualifier in the event. In all, six distance athletes qualified for the NCAA meet. Nick Hartle opened his outdoor season with the sixth fastest 800m time in school history. For his effort he was named the Pac-12 runner of the week. Bronte Golick posted the second fastest 10,000m time in school history with a 34:34.55. Three in the steeple checked in at the UCLA top-10 as Meghan Marvin ran the sixth fastest time at UCLA while Emily Scharmann clocked the eighth and Sabrina Seay posted the 10th best marks.

In 2013, Lane Werley was the runner up at the PAC-12 Championships in the 5000m and qualified for the first round of the NCAA Championships in the event as well, running a 13:53. Dustin Fay ran a 13:51 indoors and qualified for the 10,000m at the first round of the NCAA Championships. Kelsey Smith ran the eighth best time ever at UCLA in the 5000m, qualifying for first round of NCAA's. Katja Goldring placed fourth in the 5000m at the MPSF Championships and placed 14th at the first round of NCAA's in the 10,000. Bronte Golick placed eighth at the PAC-12 Championships in the 10k and ran the ninth best time by a Bruin ever in that event.

In 2012, Braden worked with a strong group

of distance runners. Redshirt freshman Dustin Fay ran an indoor school record of 13:49 in the 5000m to qualify for the NCAA National Indoor Championship. He also qualified for the NCAA Preliminary Round outdoors. Junior Katja Goldring ran the second fastest 10,000m in school history with a time of 34:41.82 and placed 14th in the Preliminary Round of the NCAA Championships. Freshman Kelsey Smith ran a new personal record (16:41) to qualify for the Preliminary round of the NCAA's in the 5000m. For the first time, redshirt senior Kent Morikawa ran the steeplechase, placing fifth at the Pac-12 Championships and qualifying for the NCAA Preliminary round. Freshman Merissa Kado is tenth all-time at UCLA in the steeplechase after running a time of 10:58.48. Freshman Lane Werley ran one of the top junior times in the country in the 5000m (13:56). At the USATF Junior Championships, the Bruins were represented by Kado in the steeplechase, Nathaniel Cushing-Murray in the 10k and Werley, Annie Mooney and Bronte Golick in the 5000m. Werley and Cushing-Murray both finished fourth to lead the Bruin squad at the meet.

In 2011, the Bruins had two sub-9-minute steeplechasers in Jake Matthews (8:57.55) and David McDonald (8:59.30) as both scored at Pac-10s. The long distance runners thrived under Braden's leadership in his first season at UCLA as Dylan Knight led the way in the steeplechase. Knight ran a lifetime-best of 8:43.68 to move to fifth all-time in UCLA history, competed at the NCAA Outdoor meet and was the Pac-10 runner-up in the event. Spencer Knight (8:57.95) and David McDonald (9:10.80) also ran lifetime-best marks in the steeple. Marco Anzures moved to fifth all-time in the 10,000m (29:00.21) and also ran a lifetime-best of 14:07.69 in the 5000m. Alex Crabill was a provisional qualifier for the indoor meet in the 3000m (8:03.07) and also ran the No. 6 marathon time in UCLA history (2:20.38).

Prior to his coaching stint at Gonzaga, Braden was a three-time All-American runner for coach Mike Maynard at Boise State from 2002-2007, earning accolades in indoor and outdoor track as well as cross country. He also won seven West-ern Athletic Conference titles as a Bronco.

Braden also ran for Team Indiana Elite for one year and placed in the top-10 in five USATF Championship meets.



## DARRELL SMITH Jr.

Assistant Coach/Sprints/Hurdles  
1st Season  
UCLA '03

Entering his first season as a UCLA assistant coach is Darrell Smith, Jr., who brings 20 years of international coaching experience to the Bruin program and will specialize in the UCLA women's and men's high hurdles and 400m intermediate hurdles along with the sprint group.

Through the years, Smith has been a part of the winning tradition that is UCLA track & field. For two seasons (1992/1993) he was the Bruin track & field team student manager and earned his UCLA undergraduate degree in 2003. Darrell's uncle, John Smith, as a UCLA 400m runner helped lead the Bruins to two NCAA team championships (1971/1972) and as the head coach of Hudson Smith International (HSI), an elite track & field training group, produced some of the nation's and world's top sprinters, including Maurice Greene. Greene.

Smith, Jr. was appointed High Performance Hurdle Coordinator by the USA Track & Field Association (USATF) with duties that include staying up-to-date with qualified hurdlers across the nation and identifying to the USATF the up-and-coming hurdlers around the U. S.

Since 2002, he has been head sprint and hurdle coach and personal trainer for Threshold Athletics Group (TAG), responsible for the planning and execution of training programs for all athletes yearly training and competition.

As an assistant coach with HSI (1992-2002/2006-09) and the head sprint and hurdle coach for the Saudi Arabian Amateur Athletic Federation (1994/1998/2000-04), Smith has worked with some of the nation's and the world's top athletes. At the 2000 Olympics (Sydney, Australia), Smith coached Hadi Souvan al Somayli to the silver medal in the 400m hurdles, to become the first ever Saudi Arabian athlete to earn an Olympic medal.

At the 2008 Olympics in Beijing, China, he coached Tasha Danvers to a bronze medal in the 400m hurdles. Smith has also worked with world-class and Olympic gold medal winning athletes such as Jon Drummond (100m/200m/4 X 100m relay), Jason Rouser (400m/4 X 400m relay), Quincy Watts (400m/4 X 400m relay), Marie-Jose Perce (200m/400m/400m hurdles), Anthuan Maybank (400m/4 X 400m relay) and Inger Miller (100m/200m/4 X 100m relay).

Smith has helped coach and mentor several UCLA standouts, including Kevin Young, 1992 Barcelona Olympics champion in the 400m hurdles and world record holder 46.78; Kevin Craddock, a member of the U. S. 2012 World Indoor team with a 13.46 personal best in the 110m hurdles and Jonathan Williams, who represented Belize at the 2008 Beijing Olympics with a personal best 48.88 in the 400m hurdles.

**ANTHONY CURRAN**

Volunteer Coach/Pole Vault  
32nd Season  
UCLA '82

Former UCLA pole vault standout Anthony Curran enters his 32nd year at his alma mater, returning this season as the men's and women's volunteer jumps coach. Curran has become one of the premier vault coaches in the nation as he continues to produce All-American after All-American at UCLA. He has coached multiple Olympians, National Record Holders, and NCAA and Pac-10 Champions during his tenure at UCLA, a feat that has made UCLA a pole vaulting powerhouse. Curran also earned top honors in 2006 after being named the NCAA West Region Women's Jumps Coach of the Year.

In 2014 the tradition of excellence continued for Curran and the UCLA pole vaulters. Mike Woepse once again was named an All-American while Natasha Kolbo soared to new heights to earn All-American honors during the outdoor season. The pole vault crew continued to put together record breaking performances and personal bests. Woepse cleared a personal best 18-5.25 in the dual meet against USC to improve the third best vault in school history. Kolbo cleared a personal best 13-10.50 to rank seventh all-time while Elena Clarke hit a personal best of 13-6.25 to crack the UCLA top-10.

The UCLA vaulters continued their excellence in 2013. In his junior campaign Mike Woepse won the Pac-12 title with a vault of 17-11 and was an indoor All-American with a seventh place finish (18-0.50). Allison Koressel finished second overall at the Pac-12 championships with a 13-4.25 and placed fifth at the NCAA Indoor Championships. Her vault of 14-1.75 ranks fifth in the UCLA top-10.

In 2012, UCLA was ranked number one for combined pole vault programs in the country with the highest number of 17' and 18' foot male pole vaulters and the most 13' and 14' foot female pole vaulters. Sophomore Mike Woepse scored second at the NCAA's and went on to place sixth at the U.S. Olympic Trials recording a personal best of 18' 2 1/2. 17. Sophomore Natasha Kolbo and junior Allison Koressel vaulted 13'7" to rank in the top 10 all-time at UCLA. In addition, six

men's vaulters and decathletes registered personal bests in the pole vault. The Bruins recorded personal bests as four of the women's team's six pole vaulters registered marks over 13'. In the high jump, sophomore Alexis Walker jumped 5-10.75 and redshirt junior Dillon Stucky set a personal best of 50-9.25.

In the last 15 years, UCLA pole vaulters have scored more than "double" the points at NCAA's than any other program in the country including seven NCAA Champions and six Runner-up's. UCLA had two Bruins represented at the 2012 Olympics with vaulters Tori Pena and Yoo Kim. The Bruins also had four vaulters compete at the 2012 U.S. Olympic Trials in Megan Jamerson, Katy Viuf, Dustin Deleo and Mike Woepse.

In 2011, Curran coached Allison Koressel and Tori Anthony to equal marks of 13-7.25 during the outdoor season, a lifetime-best mark for Koressel. Those two, along with Liz Goodrich, competed at the NCAA Preliminary Round, but did not advance to NCAA's.

Curran also coached Greg Woepse to the Pac-10 crown in the pole vault, while Jonathan Clark was the runner-up finisher in the triple jumps. Woepse's younger brother, Mike, competed at the NCAA Outdoor Championships, along with Clark, as both earned second-team All-American accolades. Clark also earned indoor All-American honors (2nd-team) at the NCAA Indoor meet in the triple jump. Three Bruin vaulters posted marks above 17-feet during the 2011 season.

Nine male athletes have earned pole vault All-American honors under Curran's tutelage - Dustin DeLeo ('08 indoor); Mike Landers ('06/'07-outdoor); Yoo Kim ('04-outdoor, '03-outdoor); Pat Luke ('03-outdoor); Brian McLaughlin ('00-indoor); Johnny Quinn ('08 outdoor); Scott Slover ('98-indoor/outdoor, '97-indoor, '96-indoor/outdoor); John Sommers ('94-indoor) and Greg Woepse ('11 outdoor), while eight women have earned the honor - Tori Peña ('10 outdoor); Katy Viuf ('10 outdoor); Tori Anthony ('08 indoor); Chelsea Johnson ('06-indoor/outdoor, '04-indoor/outdoor); Ingrid Kantola ('07 indoor and outdoor); Jackie Nguyen ('04-outdoor); Tracy O'Hara ('02-'99-both indoor and outdoor all four years at UCLA); and Erica Hoernig ('98-indoor).

O'Hara won three NCAA titles - 2002 and 2000 Outdoor and 2000 Indoor. Johnson was the 2006 Indoor champion and 2004 Outdoor champion, and set the NCAA Collegiate Pole Vault Record (15-1) in 2006.

Curran's athletes have won nine Pac-10 titles, four on the men's side and five on the women's side, while he has coached every woman on UCLA's all-time top-10 and nine of the men on the all-time chart.

In recent years, Curran has coached six Olympians - Okkert Brits (South Africa), Yoo Kim (South Korea), Canadians Dana Ellis and Stephanie McCann, and American Mel Mueller. Ellis is the current Canadian National Record Holder (14-

7.25) and both her and Ellis were Canadian National Champions. Kim set a Korean National Record in 2004 with a mark of 18-4.50, a height which also ranks third all-time at UCLA.

Curran, was a four-year letterman and All-American from 1978-82. During his senior season, he won the Pac-10 title with an 18-2.50 vault, No. 4 in Bruin history. In '82, Curran also placed fourth in the NCAA. As a junior, he was second in the conference (18-0.50) and also placed second in the NCAA, his best collegiate finish. In 1981, he ranked sixth in the U.S. As a sophomore in 1980, he jumped 17-8.50 to again place second in the Pac-10 and was third at the NCAA Championship. During his freshman season, Curran placed second (17-3) at the conference level and fourth at the NCAA. Still active as a vaulter into the '90s, Curran cleared 18-8.50 (personal-best) in 1992 and that summer competed in the U.S. Olympic trials.

Curran, whose brother Tim was a Bruin vaulter in 1975-76, graduated from Crespi HS in Encino in 1978. During his senior prep season, he was the State champion (17-0.50, a CA State record at the time), and his 17-4.25 was a national prep record. As a junior, he vaulted 16-4, as a sophomore 15-9 and as a freshman in 1975, his best was 14-8.50.

Curran started his own track club, "No Limit Sport" in 1985. In 1989, he founded the Beach Pole Vault Association.

He has coached five elite women vaulters - 2000 Olympian Mel Mueller (15-1.75), No. 3 in the U.S.; Mary Sauer, ranked No. 10 in the World (15-3i), Canadian National Champion and Canadian National Record Holder Dana Ellis (14-8, 6th at the Athens Olympics), former Canadian National Champion Stephanie McCann (14-7.25, 10th at the Athens Olympics), Alexa Harz, fifth at the 2000 U.S. Olympic Trials (13-9.25) and O'Hara, who placed fifth at the U.S. Olympic Trials in 2004 (Personal-best 15-0 in 2005).

Curran began his own production company in 1995 and has produced seven surf movies sold worldwide. He also began the Curran Surf Camps in 1998, which he runs during the summer, in addition to holding two UCLA pole vault and track camps. In 2003, Curran, an avid musician, produced his first music CD. He wrote, arranged and performed all 13 songs.

Curran married Lisa Carlson in 1994, and they have five children - Sara, Tate and Marlow, Shaylee and Kai Lilly.





## SHARON DAY-MONROE

Volunteer Coach/Multi

Sharon Day-Monroe is in her third year assisting Bruin associate head coach Jack Hoyt with the heptathlon. A 2008 and 2012 U.S. Olympian in the high jump and heptathlon, Day-Monroe had a standout collegiate career as a high jumper at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo when Hoyt was the jumps/multi coach for the Mustangs.

In 2014, Day-Monroe set the American record in the pentathlon en route to winning the USA Indoor Track & Field title. Day-Monroe tallied a record 4,805 points to punch her ticket to the World Championships.

Day followed her coach to UCLA for the 2013 season and it paid off with USA National Titles at both Indoor and Outdoor Championship Meets, and personal records in 6 of the 7 heptathlon events. Her total score of 6,550 points was also a personal record and the 3rd best score in the World. She also made an immediate impact on the UCLA heptathlon group. Both Tatum Souza (5,691) and Kimmie Connor (5,165) improved by over 300 points from their previous best scores.

In 2009, Day's first year of full-time heptathlon training under Hoyt, she made the USA World Championship Team in both the high jump (eighth-place, 6-2.25) and heptathlon (10th-place, 6,126 points, highest placing American). Her heptathlon success continued with a first-place finish (6,058 points) at the 2011 USA Outdoor Championships and three USA Outdoor runner-up spots - 2009 (6,177 points), 2010 (6,006 points) and at the 2012 U. S. Olympic Trials (6,343 points).

At the 2012 Olympic Games in London, Day was the top U. S. finisher (16th place, 6,232 points) in the heptathlon. Also in 2012, Day was the USA Indoor combined event champion (4,567 points). Hoyt has been Day's coach in all seven of the heptathlon events.

Day started her athletic career as a high-jumper, winning two consecutive California State High School (CIF) championships at Costa Mesa, CA HS. During her Cal Poly SLO career, Day won the NCAA women's high jump (6-4) in 2005 and made the U. S. team in the women's high jump at the 2008 Olympics (Beijing, China). In 2004, Day was the NCAA Indoor (6-1.25) and Out-

door (6-2.75) runner-up. She holds the Cal Poly SLO school records in both the high jump (6-4.75, 2008) and heptathlon (5,614 points, 2008).

Her other high jump accolades include - 2003 Pan Am Junior gold medalist (6-0.75); 2004 USA Junior champion (6-0.75) and World Junior bronze medalist (6-3.25) and 2007 USA Outdoor runner-up (6-2.25).

A standout all-around athlete, Day was a seven-time NCAA track & field All-American at Cal Poly SLO who also played soccer for the Mustangs and in 2003 was the Big West Conference Freshman of the Year.

Day earned her undergraduate degree at Cal Poly SLO.



## JOHN HENRY JOHNSON

Director of Operations  
2nd Season  
UCLA '90

John Henry Johnson, Jr., the 2013 USTF-CCCA National Men's Assistant Coach of the Year, enters his second season with the Bruins and his first as the Director of Operations.

In his first season at the helm of the women's program six student-athletes that were named USTFCCCA All-Americans. Leading the way for the Bruins at the NCAA Championships was junior Kylie Price in the long jump, who placed third to earn her third straight All-America honor. Senior Natasha Kolbo capped off her Bruin career with a 13th place finish in the pole vault. Junior Zibby Boyer made her first NCAA meet appearance and earned All-America accolades by placing 17th in the high jump. Junior Alexis Walker was named an All-American in just her first season competing in the heptathlon. A pair of UCLA hurdlers also garnered All-American honors as Brea Buchanan and Trinity Wilson made the finals in the 100m hurdles at the NCAA meet. During the indoor campaign, a trio of Bruins earned USTFCCCA All-American honors. Ida storm was runner-up in the weight throw while Kelsey Smith placed 16th in the 3,000m and Kylie Price was 14th in the long jump.

Under his direction, the men's and women's 4x100m relay teams qualified for the NCAA meet while Jonny Moniz was a qualifier in the 400m. The hurdle duo of Brea Buchanan and Trinity Wilson made the NCAA finals in the 100m hurdles.

A former all-conference decathlete at UCLA, Johnson returns to his alma mater after 19 years as an assistant coach at USC, where he coached sprinters and served as the team's strength coach and recruiting coordinator. This past season, he helped lead USC sprinters Aaron Brown (100m, 200m) and Bryshon Nellyum (200m) to three All-America honors. Johnson's sprinters went 1-2-3 (Nellyum, Brown and Davonte Stewart) in the 200m, and 1-2 (Brown and BeeJay Lee) in the 100m at the 2013 Pac-12 Championships.

"What John Henry Johnson has done in the sprints

and hurdles at USC is widely recognized. Reviving UCLA's strength in the sprints and hurdles legacy and tradition is something that is important to our team philosophy," said Maynard. "I'm excited about John Henry's abilities as a coach, leader, and his drive and ability as a recruiter. Throughout our combined careers we've competed head to head on the track, and the recruiting front. In my opinion, Coach Johnson is one of the finest coaches and recruiters in the NCAA. He follows fellow Bruin and our recently named head men's coach John Frazier back to UCLA. I am very pleased to repatriate another Bruin back into the UCLA family."

Johnson's recruiting prowess has been well-documented, as each of USC's last 17 men's and women's recruiting classes have been ranked among the best in the nation. Johnson recruited the No. 1 men's class in 2009 and the No. 1 women's class in 2006 and also nabbed Top 3 classes in 2012 (women), 2011 (women), 2010 (men), 2008 (women) and 2007 (men).

Johnson recruited to USC stars such as Nellyum, Brown, Jerome Davis, Lionel Larry, Ahmad Rashad, Felix Sanchez, Denis Kholev, Charles Lee, Ryan Wilson and Julien Kapek on the men's side, and Angela Williams, Natasha Danvers, Brigita Lang-erholc, Grezyna Penc and Inga Stasiulionyte on the women's side. He has coached 24 All-Americans and guided a USC athlete to eight Pac-12 titles each in the 100m and 200m races.

A state champion in the decathlon at Long Beach City College in 1987, Johnson became an All-Pac-10 honoree at UCLA and a 7,000+ point scorer in the decathlon during his two-year Bruin varsity career (1989, 1990). He was a member of UCLA's 1988 NCAA Championship team as an injured redshirt junior. After graduating from UCLA with a degree in international relations in 1990, Johnson went on to serve as an assistant coach at Long Beach State from 1990-92, working with sprinters and throwers.

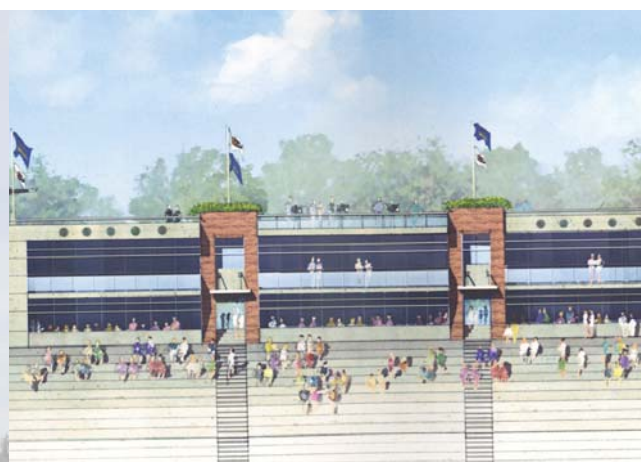

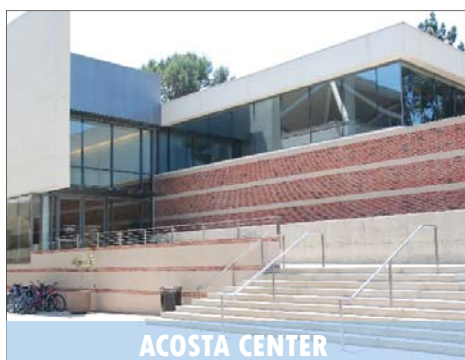
## DRAKE STADIUM

Drake Stadium, the home of UCLA track and field, will have a new look in the near future as a three phase upgrade has begun on the historic facility. The first phase was already completed before the start of the 2014 season as a new state-of-the-art Mondo surface was installed. Phase two of the Drake Enhancement Project includes the upgrade of the upper main gate to Drake Stadium and Marshall Field entry, placement of a UCLA track and field recognition area, and the placement of a new "state of the art" video scoreboard. The third phase of the Drake Enhancement Project includes upgrading the current press box area to include a media, TV production platform, and offices. A new state-of-the-art Daktronics video board was installed before the start of the 2015 season.



### Directions To UCLA and Drake Stadium

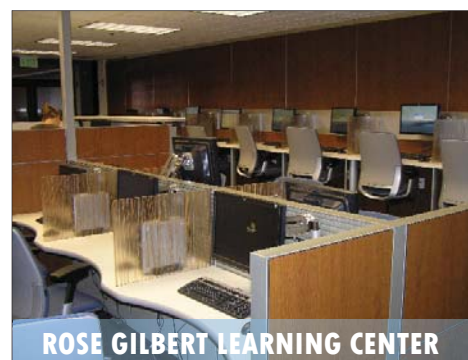

ROSE GILBERT LEARNING CENTER

The two-story Acosta Athletic Complex serves a variety of needs for UCLA's highly competitive intercollegiate athletics program. The Center, which was remodeled in 2006, features UCLA's Athletic Training and Rehabilitation Room, the Center for Athletic Performance, varsity locker rooms, and The Bud Knapp Football Center. This state-of-the-art facility provides UCLA student-athletes and coaches all of the advantages needed to maximize athletic performance. The Athletic Performance Center underwent a major renovation/remodel in late December of 2010. The upgraded weight room now features 31 flat screen tvs, including a 100-inch monitor which features highlight films, new platforms and racks, one-of-a-kind neck machines, new lat pulldown/row machines and leg press machines.

The Rose Gilbert Learning Center is located in the J.D. Morgan Center and houses the Academic Services staff and computer lab (which was remodeled in the Summer of 2008). This unit provides comprehensive academic support for nearly 700 student-athletes in 22 sports. Teams are assigned academic counselors who will assist them with course selection, degree declaration, and College and University policies and procedures.

Drake Stadium, one of the finest track and field facilities in the world, is now in its 43rd season as the on-campus home of the Bruin men's and women's track and field teams.

The stadium took on a new look almost eight years ago (August-December 1999) when it was transformed into a state-of-the-art soccer/track and field facility, adding the Frank W. Marshall Field at Drake Stadium. The stadium provides seating for 11,700 spectators. The cost of the project was \$1.5 million and was made possible by a lead gift from Frank Marshall and Kathleen Kennedy. All the money was raised from private funds; no state money was utilized.

The track in the facility has been converted from a conventional American 400-yard eight-lane oval with a 106-degree radius turn to a new European 400-meter nine-lane (48" width lane) with a 136 degree radius on the turn. The surface is tartan provided by Martin Surfacing. There is 13mm of surface material on top of an asphalt base. A track/field drainage system is flush mounted to the inside of lane one. Also on the inside of lane one is an electrical/timing chase that will house the Lynx timing system for the track.

Other track and field enhancements include: the steeplechase pit has been moved "inboard" of the track on the north turn; the field events include shot, discus and hammer rings at both the north and south ends of the infield and a javelin runway is also located on both ends to accommodate for the prevailing winds for all these events. A new top of the line hammer and discus cage was erected in the Spring of 2007. In addition, the high jump area has been moved to the south end of the track stadium on its own tartan surface. The north end of the facility has practice pits for the shot, hammer and discus. The stadium has four long/triple jump pits, featuring 38-foot-long sand-filled pits. There are two practice pole vault pits and one infield runway that can accommodate the pit on either the north or south end to take advantage of the wind.

Thanks to the change in the configuration of the track, the grass infield is now wide enough to house a regulation 75-yard by 120-yard soccer field, the Frank W. Marshall Field.

Another enhancement for Frank W. Marshall Field at Drake Stadium is a scoreboard which measures 25-feet high by 29-feet wide and costs \$180,000. The board was a gift of Kay and Paul Seider. It is a matrix board, allowing for scoring and

statistics to be presented for track and field, soccer and football. The system can be connected to the Lynx timing system, which will give instant time and place formation for race finishes. The board will always keep the time of day and has the capability of measuring and displaying temperature and wind direction/speed for track meets.

Since its inaugural meet on Feb. 22, 1969, the stadium has been the site of numerous championship meets, including the National AAU in 1976-77-78, the Pacific-8 Championships in 1970 and 1977 and the California CIF High School meet in 1969-71-77. In 1988, Drake Stadium hosted the Pacific-10 Track and Field Championships, and in 1994, the facility hosted the first-ever California-Nevada Championships. Drake Stadium again hosted the Pacific-10 Track and Field Championships in 1996 and 2005. The stadium also has been the home for UCLA women's track teams since 1975. It was the site of the National Collegiate T&F Championships (the AIAW) in 1977. It also is used each year for special campus events, such as the annual UCLA Commencement Exercises in June.

In 1973, it was officially named Drake Stadium in honor of a legend at UCLA, Elvin C. "Ducky" Drake, who had been associated with his alma mater as a student-athlete, track coach and athletic trainer for over 60 years. Drake died in Los Angeles of a heart attack on Dec. 23, 1988. He was 85.

Bruin alum John Godina had the No. 1 throw in the U.S. and the World in 2005 (72-10) and has been ranked in the top-10 in the World and United States for most of his career.

In 2002, he was No. 3 in the world in the shot put and No. 2 in the U.S. in the discus. In 2001 in the shot put, Godina won the World Outdoor, World Indoor and USA Championships, was ranked No. 1 in the World and for the second time in his career, was given the Jesse Owens Award.

In 2000, he was ranked No. 3 in the world in the shot put and won a bronze medal in the event at the Summer Olympics.

In 1999, Godina won his second consecutive USA shot put title. In 1998, in world rankings he was No. 1 in the shot put and No. 3 in the discus. At the '98 USA Outdoor Championships, Godina became the first thrower since Parry O'Brien in 1955 to win both the shot put and discus.

**Florence Griffith-Joyner**

Florence Griffith-Joyner was a two-time Olympian, earning five medals in the process. At the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics, FloJo won silver in the 200m. In 1988 at the Seoul Olympics, FloJo made history, setting a new 200m World Record and by winning three gold medals (100m, 200m, 4x100m) and a silver (4x400m). Her 100m (10.49) and 200m (21.34) World Records still stand today.

**Evelyn Ashford**

Evelyn Ashford was a four-time Olympian, winning four gold medals and one silver during her career.

**Jackie Joyner-Kersey**

Jackie Joyner-Kersey is the most decorated female track athlete in American history. JJK won six Olympic medals, including three gold, and still holds the World Record in the heptathlon today.

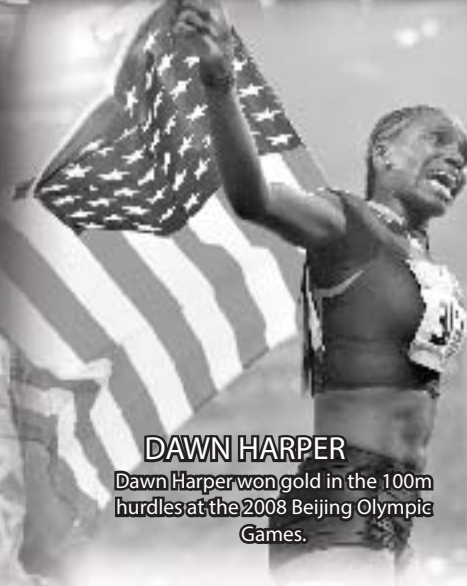

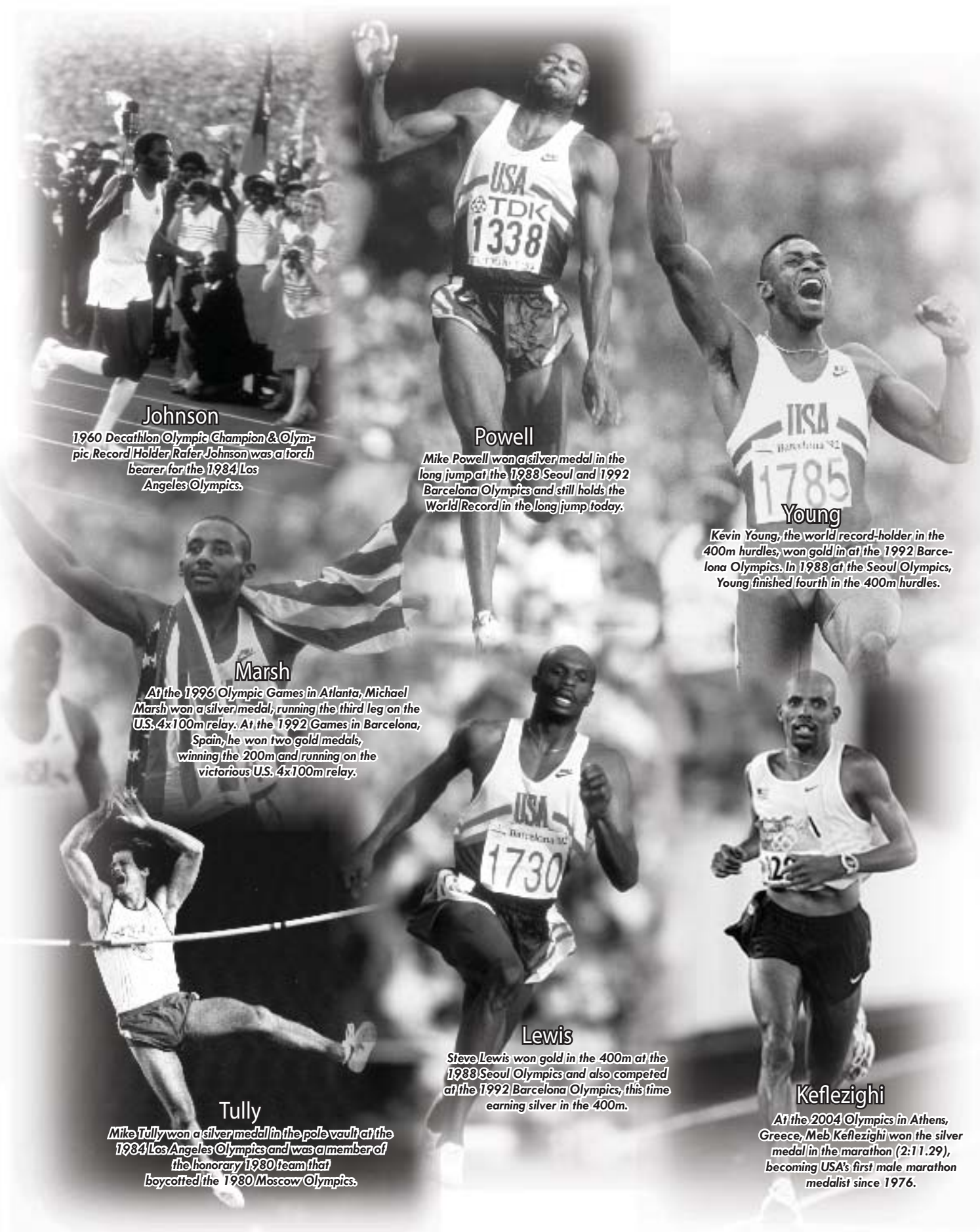

## JACKIE JOYNER-KERSEE

Since leaving UCLA after her final year of collegiate competition in 1985, Jackie Joyner-Kersee dominated women's track and field for 13 years. On three different occasions (1994, '87, '86) she was the Track & Field News World Athlete of the Year and on five occasions the top American (1994, '92, '91, '87, '86). In 1997, JJK was the inaugural recipient of the USA Humanitarian Athlete of the Year and, in 1986-87, she received the Jesse Owens Award. JJK still holds the world record in the heptathlon (7291) and the American records in the heptathlon and long jump (24-7 twice).

In Olympic competition, JJK won six medals, including three gold, moving her to the head of the U.S. list, over Bruin alums Florence Griffith-Joyner and Evelyn Ashford, each with five, and Marion Jones, who won five medals, including three gold, at the 2000 Games. In 1996 in Atlanta, JJK could not finish the heptathlon because of a painful right hamstring injury, but came back to win a bronze medal in the long jump. She won a second straight gold medal in the heptathlon and a bronze medal in the long jump at the 1992 Summer Olympics in Barcelona, Spain. At the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, South Korea, JJK won gold medals in the heptathlon (world record) and the long jump. At the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles, while still at UCLA, she won her first Olympic medal, a silver in the heptathlon, just missing the gold by five points.

Jackie Joyner-Kersee, the world's greatest female athlete, retired from heptathlon competition in 1998, winning the event at the Goodwill Games. She did return to long jump competition at the 2000 U.S. Trials in an effort to make her fifth consecutive U.S. women's Olympic team, but placed sixth (21-10) in the final.

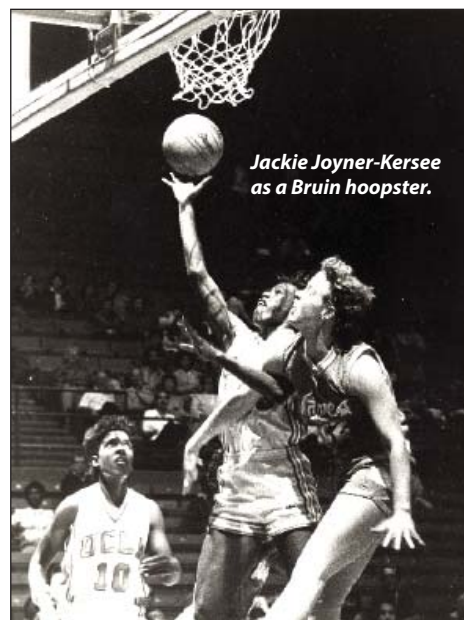
On December 3, 2004, JJK was inducted into the U.S. Track and Field Hall of Fame. Her world record-breaking performance (7,215 pts.) in the 1988 Olympics was named the ninth-best USATF moment of the last 25 years. She also had the 25th-best USATF moment after becoming the first woman to break 7,000 points in the heptathlon.

Joyner-Kersee was also a four-year starter on the UCLA women's basketball team, playing from 1980-83 and 1984-85. She is still listed among the Bruins' best in career scoring, rebounding and assists. JJK continued her basketball career in 1996, playing for Richmond in the ABL.

Known worldwide for her interest in helping others, JJK raised more than \$12 million to build the Jackie Joyner Kersee Youth Center Foundation in her hometown of E. St. Louis, IL. She also keeps busy as the Chairperson of the St. Louis Sports Commission, and the Co-Founder of Jackie Joyner Kersee Racing (NASCAR).

The March 2002 issue of Ebony included Joyner-Kersee on its list of the Top-10 Greatest African-American Women Athletes. In January of 2001, Sports Illustrated for Women named JJK the Greatest Female Athlete of the 20th Century.

In 2003, the UCLA track and field programs hosted the first annual Rafer Johnson/Jackie Joyner-Kersee Invitational, named after two of the greatest Bruin athletes in school history.

## GAIL DEVERS

*Gail Devers (1985-1988) has been a four-time Olympian, winning two gold medals in the 100m (1996 Atlanta, 1992 Barcelona). She has won four World Outdoor titles (1999-100mH, 1995-100mH, 1993-100mH/100m) and two World Indoor titles (1997, '93-60m) during her professional career.*

*Devers ranked No. 1 in the world in the 100m hurdles on seven different occasions (top-10 ranking 10 different years) and ranked No. 1 in the world in the 100m in 1993. In all, Devers was ranked in the top-10 in the world in the 100m seven different times. Nationally, Devers was the top 100m hurdler 10 different times (top-10 13 times). In the 100m, she ranked in the top-10 14 times (twice ranked No. 1).*

*While at UCLA, Devers won nine Pac-10 titles and two NCAA crowns. In all, she earned 13 All-American accolades. Today, her top times of 10.97 (100m) and 12.61 (100mH) still stand as school records. Her 200m time of 22.71 ranks third all-time, long jump mark of 22-2.50 ranks second and her 400m time of 52.66 is 10th all-time.*

*Devers holds the American Record in the 100m hurdles (12.33), set at the Olympic Trials in 2000, as well as the Drake Stadium and Collegiate Record (12.61), set at UCLA in 1988.*

*In 2005, Devers took time away from the track to have her first child. She raced in a few indoor meets in 2007 before taking another break to have her second child.*

## JOANNA HAYES

*Joanna Hayes (1996-1999) was a standout hurdler and sprinter for UCLA during her career, winning the NCAA Outdoor 400m hurdle crown in 1999 (55.16). In all, Hayes won four Pac-10 titles, three in the 100m hurdles (1998, '97, '96) and one in the 400m hurdles (1997). She was also a member of three Pac-10 Champion relay teams.*

*In NCAA competition, Hayes was an NCAA Indoor All-American in the 55m hurdles in 1997 (3rd) and four time Outdoor All-American in the hurdles and relays.*

*On the UCLA all-time top-10 list, Hayes ranks third in both the 100m hurdles (12.89) and 400m hurdles (54.57). Hayes also holds the 100m hurdles (12.93) and 400m hurdles (56.02) UCLA/USC Dual Meet Records.*

*In 2004, after her gold medal-winning and Olympic Record-breaking performance in Athens, Hayes ended the season with the No. 1 100m hurdles time in the world and nation (12.37). In the 400m hurdles, Hayes ranked in the U.S. top-10 on four different occasions - 1997 (10th), 1999 (5th), 2000 (4th), and 2003 (4th), and was also ranked in the top-10 nationally in the 100m hurdles in 2003 (10th).*

*In 2004, Hayes was bestowed the Jesse Owens Award, USA Track & Field's most prestigious honor for her outstanding accomplishments on the track. She continues to race in the high hurdles, but had a down year due to injuries in 2007.*



## SEILALA SUA

*Seilala Sua is the most decorated female ever in NCAA Track & Field. During her four-year (1997-2000) career at UCLA, Sua won a combined seven NCAA Outdoor and Indoor individual throwing titles, including six in Outdoor competition, making her the winningest women's athlete in NCAA Outdoor history. She won four consecutive Outdoor discus crowns, becoming only the second woman in Outdoor history to win four straight individual titles in the same event. During her NCAA Championship career, Sua scored a school record 107 points. In Pac-10 competition, Sua won six individual throwing championships and was a two-time Pac-10 Women's Track and Field Athlete of the Year. On the all-time list, Sua ranks second in the discus (212-10), fifth in the shot put (57-11), ninth in the javelin (161-2) and fifth in the hammer (198-10).*

*During her professional career, Sua has been a two-time Olympian in the discus (2004-Athens, 2000-Sydney), four-time USA National Champion in the discus, one-time USA National Champion in the shot put and three-time World Championships competitor.*

*For the past eight years, Sua has ranked in the top-10 in the Nation in the discus and had the No. 6 mark in the world in 2001. While she threw the shot put, Sua ranked in the top-10 in the Nation for seven consecutive years.*

*In 2005, Sua took over coaching duties of the Bruin women's throws program, and in the Summer of 2006, was named the men's and women's throws coach at Cal State Northridge. She retired from competition in 2006 to focus on her coaching career.*

## ATO BOLDEN

While competing for UCLA from 1993-1996, Ato Boldon won two NCAA titles - 100m in 1996 and 200m in 1995. His school records of 9.90 in the 100m and 19.80 in the 200m still stand atop the Bruin record books. At the Pac-10 Championships in 1996, Boldon set a new Drake Stadium record in the 200m (20.00), a mark that has yet to be broken. >>>

After graduating from UCLA, Boldon went on to compete for his native Trinidad/Tobago, winning the World Championship 200m title in 1997. In 1999, he was the No. 1 200m runner in the world (19.88) and No. 2 in the 100m (9.86).

At the Sydney Olympics, competing for Trinidad/Tobago, Boldon won his third and fourth Olympic career sprint medals, winning the silver in the 100m (9.99) and bronze in the 200m (20.20). At the 2001 World Championships, Boldon just missed a medal in the 100m with his fourth-place finish. In 2004, Boldon competed in his final competition as he retired from track and field at the Athens Olympics.

During his career, Boldon was ranked in the top-10 in the world in the 100m seven times and in the 200m five times. Boldon has served as a Senator for Trinidad's main opposition party and currently does commentary for television broadcasts of track meets, including the 2008 Beijing Olympics for NBC. He was inducted into the UCLA Athletics Hall of Fame in October of 2011.

## MEBRAHTOM KEFLEZIGHI

From 1995-1998, Mebrahtom "Meb" Keflezighi became one of the most prolific all-time distance runners at UCLA. During his career as a Bruin, Meb was an NCAA Cross Country Champion, two-time Pac-10 and District 8 Cross Country Champion, three-time NCAA Indoor All-American, NCAA 5000m Indoor Champion, NCAA Outdoor 5000m and 10,000m Champion and two-time Pac-10 5000m Champion. He holds the school record in the 10,000m (28:16.79), the junior and senior class records in the 10,000m, and all four class records in the 5000m.

Since his graduation, Keflezighi has brought American distance running back into the limelight. He is a three-time USATF 10,000m Champion (2004, '02, '00), most recently having won the USA Olympic Trials competition in 2000 and 2004. In 2001, Meb broke the American Record in the 10,000m (27:13.98), a record which still stands today.

At the 2004 Athens Olympics, Keflezighi won a silver medal in the marathon, becoming America's first marathon medalist since 1976. Keflezighi has also competed in the New York Marathon the last three years, having placed second in 2004, third in 2005 and 21st in 2006.

Today, Keflezighi trains with former Bruin Coach Bob Larsen in the Mammoth Lakes, CA area. He was sixth at the 2011 ING New York Marathon (2:09.13) and then won the 2012 U.S. Olympic Trials with another lifetime-best run of 2:09.08. He became the first American man to win the New York Marathon and the Olympic Trials. With his win at the Trials, Keflezighi qualified for his third Olympic team.

Meb won the 2014 Boston Marathon, becoming the first American in 31 years to win the event. He was later named the Jesse Owens Athlete of the Year.

## JOHN GODINA

Arguably the most decorated male thrower in American history, John Godina is a shoe-in for the USATF Hall of Fame. During his career at UCLA, Godina was a three-time Outdoor and two-time Indoor NCAA Champion, 10-time All-American, six-time Pac-10 Champion and set the Collegiate Record in the shot put (72-2.25, still stands). In his final year at UCLA, Godina won his first World Championship shot put title, as well as NCAA shot put and discus crowns.

After his graduation, Godina continued to shine in his professional career. A three-time Olympian, Godina won his first shot put medal, a silver, at the 1996 Sydney Olympics, and followed that up with a bronze at the 2000 Olympics. He is a three-time World Outdoor Shot Put Champion (2001, '97, '95), three-time USA Outdoor Shot Put titlist (2001, '99, '98), one-time USA Discus Champion (1998) and two-time Jesse Owens Award recipient (given by USATF to the most outstanding male track and field performer).

In 2000, Godina became the first American men's track and field athlete since 1924 to make the U.S. Olympic team in both the shot and discus. He also became the first man since Parry O'Brien in 1955 to win both the shot put and discus titles at the U.S. Outdoor Championships. During the 2005 season, Godina posted the top mark in the world in the shot put, 72-10.75.

He took the 2006 season off to recover from shoulder surgery and returned in 2007, posting the No. 6 shot put mark in the U.S. He was ranked fifth in the U.S. in the discus in 2008.

Today, Godina owns and operates the World Throws Center in Phoenix, AZ, a state-of-the-art training center for elite athletes. He also coached Dan Taylor to a spot on the World Championship team in the shot put. >>>

In all, six women have been inducted into the National Track & Field Hall of Fame - Kate Schmidt (1994), Florence Griffith-Joyner (1995), Francie Larrieu Smith (1998), Evelyn Ashford (1997) Jackie Joyner-Kersey (2004) and Gail Devers (2011).

Kate Schmidt

Kate Schmidt was inducted into the USA Track & Field Hall of Fame in 1994 and was UCLA's first woman inductee. Schmidt won the NCAA javelin title in 1975 (198-1) and still holds the UCLA school record with a throw of 209-7, which she also set in 1975.

Nicknamed "Kate the Great" with good reason, she completely dominated the American women's javelin throwing scene for a decade. She broke the American javelin record 10 times, culminating with a throw of 227' 5" that has held up as the record for more than a quarter century. At the time, that throw was a world record and established her place on the international scene. Schmidt was third at the 1972 and 1976 Olympic Games and was also a member of the 1980 Olympic team that didn't compete. She just missed making the 1984 team when she placed fourth at the U.S. Trials. She won seven national titles and placed in the top three in 12 of 13 national championships from 1972 to 1984.

Florence Griffith-Joyner won the NCAA 200m championship in 1982 and the 400m title in 1983. She was a silver medalist in the 200m at the 1984 Olympics and also medaled at the 1987 World Outdoor Championships, taking second in the 200m and running on the winning 4x100m relay team. At Seoul in 1988, she won three gold medals (100m, 200m, 4x100m relay) and one silver (4x400m relay), setting a world record in the 200m. It was Flo-Jo's golden moment and it will be tough to repeat.

She still holds the women's world record of 10.49 for 100 meters and 21.34 for 200 meters and no one has come close to threatening them. Her 10.49 at the 1988 Olympic Trials in Indianapolis was one of the most eye-popping performances in track and field history.

She won the Sullivan Trophy in 1988. Flo-Jo married Al Joyner, 1984 Olympic triple jump champion, in 1987. She died on September 21, 1998 at the age of 38.

Francie Larrieu Smith's running career spanned four decades and 35 U.S. distance records from 1000m to two miles. In 1998 she was inducted into the USA Track & Field Hall of Fame.

Larrieu Smith was on 28 national teams and won 21 national titles. She was a member of five Olympic teams, starting in 1972 when she ran the 1500m. Larrieu Smith also ran the 1500m at the 1976 Games and was a team member at that distance in 1980. She missed out on the 1984 team but ran the 10,000m at the 1988 Games, taking fifth. Larrieu Smith moved up to the marathon for the 1992 Games. At the '92 Games, she carried the U.S. flag at the Opening Ceremonies.

She has been nationally ranked in every event from 800m to the marathon. Larrieu Smith also ran in the 1987 and '91 World Track and Field Championships in the 10,000m.

While at UCLA, Larrieu Smith won the 1974 AIAW Outdoor titles in the 880, mile and two-mile and still leads the UCLA chart in the 3000m (9:03.2).

In 1997, Evelyn Ashford was inducted into the USA Track and Field Hall of Fame. She was inducted into the UCLA Athletics Hall of Fame in 1990. Ashford ranked No. 1 in the world four times in the 100m and was the top-ranked American seven times, including four in a row from 1981-84.

A competitor at the 1976 Olympic Games while attending UCLA, she also competed in the 1984, 1988 and 1992 Games, winning four gold medals and a silver. She was a two-time World record holder in the 100m.

While at UCLA, Ashford won four national collegiate titles in the sprints and relays and led the Bruins to the 1977 national championship.

In 2003, she was named to the Board of Directors for the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency, and in November of 2005 was named to the U.S. Olympic Hall of Fame Class of 2006.

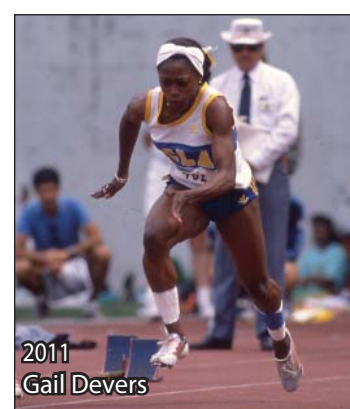

Jackie Joyner-Kersey

Jackie Joyner-Kersey was honored in April 2001 by the Honda Award as the Top Women's Collegiate Athlete of the Last 25 years. In January 2001, she was named the World's Greatest Female Athlete of the 20th Century by *Sports Illustrated for Women*. Joyner-Kersey was named the Summer Olympian of the Century by the *Associated Press* in December 1999. The world record-holder in the heptathlon, JJK's six Olympic medals, including three gold, is the highest total ever won by a U.S. woman. (Bruin alumnae Florence Griffith-Joyner and Evelyn Ashford are second with five apiece). JJK was inducted into the UCLA Athletics Hall of Fame in 1996. In 1987 and '86, she was given the Jesse Owens Award.

In 2003, the UCLA track and field programs hosted the first annual Rafer Johnson/Jackie Joyner-Kersey Invitational, named after two of the greatest Bruin athletes in school history. JJK was inducted into the U.S. Track and Field Hall of Fame in December of 2004. She also had the ninth and 25th top moment of the past 25 years in track and field. Her world record breaking heptathlon total of 7,215 points was the ninth best moment, while becoming the first woman to break the 7,000 point barrier was ranked 25th.

In 2006, Joyner-Kersey was inducted into the California Sports Hall of Fame as a member of the inaugural class.

Gail Devers (1985-1988) has been a four-time Olympian, winning two gold medals in the 100m (1996 Atlanta, 1992 Barcelona). She has won four World Outdoor titles (1999-100mH, 1995-100mH, 1993-100mH/100m) and two World Indoor titles (1997, '93-60m) during her professional career.

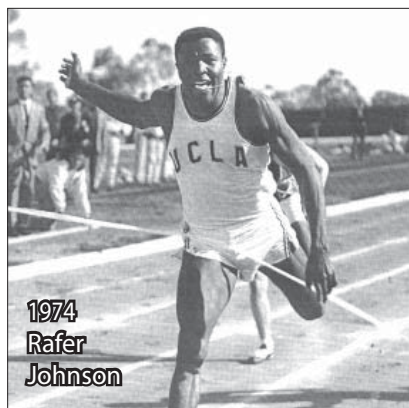
Devers ranked No. 1 in the world in the 100m hurdles on seven different occasions (top-10 ranking 10 different years) and ranked No. 1 in the world in the 100m in 1993. In all, Devers was ranked in the top-10 in the world in the 100m seven different times. Nationally, Devers was the top 100m hurdler 10 different times (top-10 13 times). In the 100m, she ranked in the top-10 14 times (twice ranked No. 1).

While at UCLA, Devers won nine Pac-10 titles and two NCAA crowns. In all, she earned 13 All-American accolades. Today, her top times of 10.97 (100m) and 12.61 (100mH) still stand as school records. In all, 10 UCLA men have been inducted into the USA Track & Field Hall of Fame - Rafer Johnson (1974, inaugural class), Jim Bush (1987), Dwight Stones (1998), Greg Foster (1998), Willie Banks (1999), Mike Powell (2005), Kevin Young (2006), Elvin C. "Ducky" Drake (2007) and John Godina and Coach Bob Larsen (2013).



Former world record-holder in the decathlon Rafer Johnson won the gold medal at the 1960 Olympics in Rome, Italy. At the 1956 Melbourne Olympics, Johnson, competing with an injury, won the silver medal in the decathlon. For the remainder of his career, he would not lose another multi-event competition.

In 1974, he was inducted into the National Track & Field Hall of Fame and, in 1984, was a charter inductee into the UCLA Athletics Hall of Fame. As a Bruin, he won Pac-10 Championships in the 220y low hurdles in 1956 and in the javelin in 1958. Johnson lit the Olympic torch at the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles. His daughter Jenny was an All-American volleyball player for the Bruins. As a Bruin senior, his son Josh placed second (248-7) in the javelin at the 1998 USA Outdoor. Johnson currently serves as the Chairman for the Board of Directors of the Southern California Special Olympics.

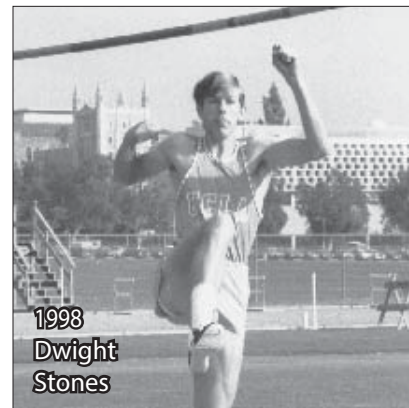
In 2006, Johnson was inducted into the California Sports Hall of Fame as a member of the inaugural class.



During his tenure as UCLA's men's head coach from 1965-1984, Bush led the Bruins to an impressive 20-year dual meet record of 151-21-0 (.879), seven national dual meet titles, seven Pac-10 crowns and five NCAA championship team titles. In 1966, his Bruins recorded UCLA's first ever dual meet victory over USC, winning 86-59 at the Coliseum. From 1968-88, 23 of his athletes competed in the Olympics, winning four gold, five silver and three bronze medals.

In 1987, Bush was inducted into the National Track & Field Hall of Fame. In December 1996, he was inducted into the U.S. Track Coaches Association Hall of Fame. And, the following year (1997), he was inducted into the UCLA Hall of Fame.

In the February 2000 issue of *Coach & Athletic Director* magazine, Bush was listed as one of the 13 most influential collegiate track and field coaches for the 20th century.



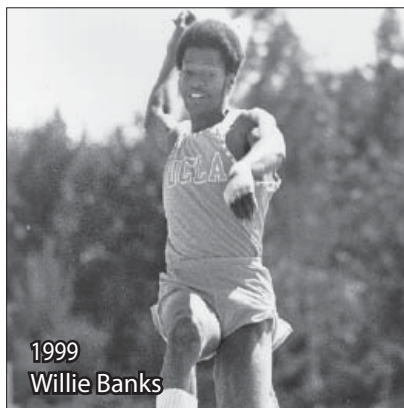
Dwight Stones, a former world record-holder in the high jump, was one of the world's top jumpers from 1973-84. He represented the U.S. in three Olympic Games, winning the bronze in both 1972 and '76 and placing fourth in 1984. An 11-time national champion, Stones, who attended UCLA and Long Beach State, set his first world-record in Munich, Germany in 1973 by clearing 7-6.50. That jump also made him the first "flop" jumper to set a world high jump record. He raised the world record to 7-7 in 1976 and added another quarter inch to the record two months later. He won the Olympic Trials in 1972 and '84. While at UCLA, Stones placed third at the 1972 NCAA Outdoor Championships. He is now one of television's top track and field analysts.

In 2003, Stones was presented a Lifetime Achievement Award by the Los Angeles Track & Field Organizing Committee.



Greg Foster was one of the world's greatest hurdlers from 1981-91. He was a national collegiate champion while at UCLA in both the high hurdles (1978, '80) and 200m (1979), and still leads the All-time Bruin chart in the high hurdles (13.22).

After college, Foster won 10 national titles, both indoor and outdoor, and he won the first three world outdoor championships (1983-87-91). Foster's best Olympic Games showing was a silver in 1984. He was world-ranked for 15 of 16 years from 1977-92, achieving top-five rankings five times. He was world-ranked in the 200m in 1979 and set world indoor hurdles records in 1986 and '87. He was a member of 12 international teams, and was the 1991 world indoor champion and the 1981 World Cup winner.



In his first competition since retiring in 1992, Bruin great Willie Banks set a world triple jump record in the 45-49 age group in June 2001 (47-8.75). In 1999, the former world record-holder in the triple jump, was inducted into the USA Track & Field Hall of Fame. One of the greatest triple jumpers ever produced by the U.S., Banks had his best moment on June 16, 1985 when he set a world record of 58-11.50 at the USA Outdoor Championships in Indianapolis, IN. That was merely the culmination of a career that started in Oceanside, CA. After graduating from high school, Banks attended UCLA and was twice runner-up in the NCAA Championships (1977-78) and won two Pac-10 titles (1977-78).

After college, he achieved his greatest success, setting his first American record in 1981 and increasing that record six more times. Banks represented the U.S. in 18 international competitions and was a member of the 1980, '84 and 1988 Olympic teams. He was also on the 1983 and '87 U.S. World Championship teams. In 1985, Banks was the *Track & Field News*' and U.S. Olympic Committee Athlete of the Year. He also served USA Track & Field as chair of the Athletes' Advisory Committee, in addition to serving as an organization vice president.



In 2005, Mike Powell became the 11th Bruin member inducted into the USATF Hall of Fame.

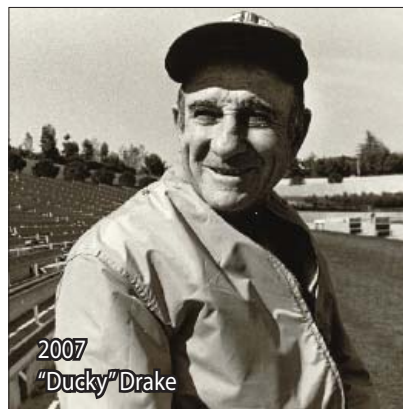
In what many consider the greatest head-to-head competition in track and field history, Mike Powell won the 1991 World Outdoor Championships men's long jump gold medal over fellow Hall of Famer Carl Lewis by setting the world record of 8.95 meters/29 feet, 4.50 inches, in Tokyo, Japan. The mark broke the previous standard set by Bob Beamon in 1968. Powell, who also won the World Outdoor Championships gold medal in 1993, was a two-time Olympic silver medalist and six-time USA Outdoor champion. Ranked #1 in the world on four occasions, he won 34 consecutive competitions in 1993 and 1994.



Kevin Young was inducted into the USA Track & Field Hall of Fame in December of 2006. Young had an incredible career highlighted by a gold medal finish in the 400m hurdles at the 1992 Barcelona Olympics where he set a new World Record, 46.78, a time that has yet to be broken. He is the only man in track and field history to run sub-47 seconds. At the 1988 Seoul Olympics, Young finished fourth in the hurdles.

While at UCLA, Young won the 1987 and 1988 NCAA 400m hurdles titles, was the NCAA runner-up in the intermediate hurdles in 1986 and was a member of two 4x400m relay NCAA Championship teams (1987/1988). He was a three-time Pac-10 Champion in the 400m hurdles. Today, his school record (47.72), junior (48.15) and senior (47.72) class records still stand at UCLA.

Young won the USA Track & Field Senior National 400m hurdles title in 1992 and 1993 and was the No. 1 ranked American intermediate hurdler in 1989, 1992 and 1993. For eight straight seasons (1986-1993), Young was ranked in the U.S. top-10 list, as well as in 1996 and 1998. He was the No. 1 world-ranked hurdler in 1989, 1992 and 1993, and was ranked in the top-10 in the world on eight total occasions.

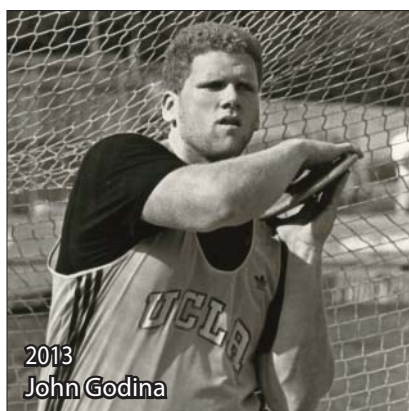


Elvin "C" Ducky Drake was inducted into the USA Track & Field Hall of Fame in December of 2007, becoming the 13th Bruin to join the Hall of Fame after a storied career at UCLA.

In 19 seasons under Drake, UCLA had a dual meet record of 107-48-0 (.690) and won one NCAA Championship and one Pac-10 title. Drake was a charter member into the UCLA Hall of Fame in 1984 and was inducted into the USA Track & Field Track & Field Hall of Fame.

In 1973, the Bruin track and field complex was officially named "Drake Stadium" in honor of the UCLA coaching legend who had been associated with UCLA as a student-athlete, coach and athletic trainer for over 60 years.

Some of Drake's star athletes include Rafer Johnson, C.K. Yang, George Stanich, Craig Dixon and George Brown.



John Godina finds his name near the top of a long list of dominant American men in the shot put. A total of four times in his career he finished the year ranked No. 1 in the World in the event and finished no worse than second in the World from 1995 until 1998.

His career is highlighted with a Silver Medal at the 1996 Atlanta Olympic Games, a Bronze Medal at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games and winning a trio of World Outdoor Championships Gold Medals ('95, '97, '01).

A standout for Bob Larsen and throws coach Art Venegas at UCLA, Godina won five NCAA individual titles in his Bruin career, including the indoor shot put and outdoor discus titles in 1994, indoor and outdoor shot put and outdoor discus championships in 1995 and setting the collegiate outdoor shot put record (72-2.5). He was a 10-time All-American in the shot put and discus and six-time Pac-10 champion. Godina is a 2005 inductee into the UCLA Athletics Hall of Fame.

He also won the 1998 World Cup title in the shot put and earned World Indoor Championships Gold in 2001 and Silver Medals in 1999 and 2003. Retiring in 2008, Godina was elected to the National Track & Field Hall of Fame the first year he was eligible.



Legendary coach Bob Larsen was named NCAA track & field or cross country Coach of the Year four different times at UCLA before coaching Mebrahtom Keflezighi to the 2004 Olympic silver medal in the marathon. Larsen was selected in the coaches category.

During the 15 seasons Larsen served as coach of the UCLA Bruins men's track & field and cross country teams, he led 12 individuals to a total of 20 NCAA titles and directed UCLA to back-to-back NCAA Outdoor track & field team championships in 1987 and 1988.

In a brilliant career that has spanned six decades, Larsen overall would coach 13 athletes to a total of 25 national championships. As UCLA's head coach, he held a 118-3-1 record in dual meets and was selected PAC-10 Coach of the Year nine times. He was selected the Team USA distance coach for the 2004 Olympic Games where he coached Keflezighi to a silver medal in the marathon and later helped him to win the 2009 New York City Marathon.

Three times in his career Larsen was selected NCAA track & field Coach of the Year ('87, '88, '95) and once in cross country ('80). As the UCLA men's cross country coach for 20 years (1980-99), he directed the Bruins to two conference titles ('80, '81) and six NCAA appearances, including fifth-place finishes in 1980/1981.
